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

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


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Johnson Hits At Racial Bias

Romney Takes Reins

Urging bipartisan support and harmony in the state government, George Romney became the first Republican governor in Michigan in 14 years on New Year's Day.

Never once mentioning the word "Republican," Romney told a shouting, stomping crowd of 3,000 before the capitol building in Lansing, that he will devote himself to the solving of Michigan problems.

The new governor, who has tried to dispel speculation that he will be a candidate for the GOP presidential nomination in 1964, made an attempt to discourage such talk.

One of his guides as governor, he said, would be "concentration on the job at hand, not campaigning constantly for re-election, and dedication to that job without an eye for greener pastures somewhere else."

The job at hand, Mr. Romney indicated, would include revamping of the state's tax structure and adoption of the proposed new state consti-

Although Romney did not spell out the specifics of his programs, he said during the campaign that any new fiscal policy probably would include

a state income tax. Romney also called for "coalitions of concerned citizens" to help him promote the state's economic growth and to "restore the confidence of the nation and the world in Michigan."

Spectators interrupted Romney's inaugural message 15 times with applause and broke into · loud cheers when he spoke out for the proposed :

Democrats, whose leaders have taken a firm stand against it, sat in silence on their side of the aisle on the Capitol steps when the new Governor sounded his appeal.

Romney, a delegate at the Constitutional Convention last year, said adoption of the new document by voters at the April I election "can dramatically prove that Michigan is not a problem state but a problem-solving state."

The new governor took his oath of office from Michigan Chief Justice Leland W. Carr.



Farm machinery designers need to know the thrust of a seedling for the best combination of soil moisture and soil compaction for the plants. Plant breeders need the information to produce stronger seedlings in the future. Drew estimates that the thrust

of an average corn seedling is approximately six-tenths of a "If you put a half-pound box

of candy on top of the ground, a growing corn seedling could probably lift the box and push it out of the way. However, the seedling would begin to buckle if it had to lift the box very high."

Drew says the six-tenths figure is only an "educated guess." He feels more information is necessary before passing it along to other agricultural scientists.

The report predicts that opportunities for advanced degree candidates in business and liberal arts fields will increase 25-30




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
