Commitment includes an awareness of necessity and importance of decision even though life looks bleak and despondent -- for "God

comes at last when we think He is farthest off." Those who believe in God often make the mistake of thinking that by commitment they are giving something to God. But He appears to be the Giver, man is the receiver. His love is a gift to which we must be committed in our own personal way, not because we give something but because we are receiving, reacting through

commitment to what has been given us. God calls through revelation, staking a claim on that which He has created. The real initiative, then, lies not in the person but in his Creator. To be committed to what has been given one who believes in the Almighty is to be in relationship with God.

Commitment can be living in responsible obedience to what we consider of utmost importance in life. This may not be God, for we may not have discovered Him meaningful in our lives. Yet we will never find Him unless we search through the commitment of what we thus far believe.

Having convictions is one's way of viewing life, even if in the eyes of society they are not acceptable. If seems better to be committed to the wrong thing than to nothing at all, for this means that one is receiving something and cares enough about himself to reveal it. Life without commitment is merely existing from day to day.

Commitment proves its worth by whether or not we can live by it. Decisions through commitment may bring about better understanding of ourselves. They awaken a fresh consciousness of the needs and impulses of human nature which need satisfaction.

Commitment to a faith even if we are not completely sureand who is ever completely certain? -- can lead to knowledge of what life is really all about. We can control our own destiny through decisions of faith because we are not predestined to be damned or saved. We chose through commitment. Even if we do not accept the widely-held views concerning ways.
