**President Expected To Request** 

### More Defense, Moon Shot Funds

WASHINGTON (UPD--President Kennedy is expected to tell Congress in his State of the Union message today that spending for defense and the US Man-In-Moon project will increase this year. Advance word is that the President will attach great significance to this country's effort to put an astronaut on the moon by at least 1970.

He doesn't want the United States to come in second again, Mr. Kennedy will follow his **Delta-U-M** State of the Union address by sending to Congress Thursday a budget for the fiscal year start-ing July 1st. It is expected to Merger call for record spending of about \$99 billion.



"We wanted to involve the students in this meeting and give them the opportunity to share with the faculty in the things he (Heanah) will discuss," Nonnamaker said


