"The Russians have a deep appreciation of the effects of nuclear war, and Khrushcherhas emphasized its dangers," he said. "On the other hand, the Chinese present an extraordinary danger to the world because they do not understand nuclear

Although the Chinese are believed to possess no nuclear weapons, it is estimated they will begin atomic tests sometime this: year, he said. Perhaps when they do get nuclear armament, they will realize its potential dis-




