"We started at 6 a.m. Saturday and finished at 6 p.m. Sunday," he said.

Thirty five men took part in this snow removal operation, including men in truck and tractor plows and the men who shoveled the intersections, he said. These men operated 17 various pieces of snow removal equipment, he said. There were 2 motor graders, 3 truck plows, 10 sidewalk units and 2 salt trucks in use.

Clearing all this snow entails covering 40 miles of roads, 60 miles of sidewalks and 90 acres of parking lots, Ferris said, The entire operation of snow removal costs approximate \$500 per inch for every appreciable amount of snow that falls on the campus, he said. Included in the operation is the cost of some 400 to 500 tons of rock salt to be used this year. In addition to labor and equipment oper-





The assumed "Mr. France", President Charles de Gaulle, got his way again Tuesday as he worked slowly toward his "Europe of Fatherlands"

Meeting with Konrad Adenauer, soon-to-retire chancellor of West Germany, the towering French leader signed a historic Franco-German alliance which he claims opens the door "to a new future ... for the whole world."

The whole world except Britain, that is, Admittedly, de Gaulle has done a masterful

job of rebuilding France from the rubble of a divided nation.

National unity, which fell apart so miserably before the war, has been restored.

But de Gaulle is not all the prince of salvation that he would have "the whole world" belleve.

He has built his reputation as a great leader on British-won time of the early days of World War II, and he has usurped the British and Allied credit for the winning back of his homeland for himself and the French people.

He has turned his back on Britain, now caught in the economic meshes of history, and refused her the position she now needs on the continent, s place in the Common Market.

The main reason for his "broad-back" policy would seem to be that he fear's that Brutish

The following article was written by I.C. Shah, a graduate student from Bombay, India. Before coming to Michigan State, Shah attended the law school at the University of Bombay where he studied constitutional law for one year.

The Republic of India celebrates its 14th Republican Day Saturday. It was on Jan. 26, 1950, that 550 princely states were incorporated in the Republic.

For the Indian people, adoption of a constitution was difficult, indeed. The country was in the process of political, economic and social revolution when it acquired independence.

The most remarkable thing about the constitution of India is that it was drafted by an untouchable, Dr. B.R. Ambedkar.

The Indian Constitution is based to a large extent on the American and British models. The American model has been followed in making the constitution the supreme law of the land and giving the courts the powerful weapon of judicial review.

On the other hand, the British model has been followed in setting up the governmental machinery both at the federal and state levels.

The Executive is elected by the legislature and is directly responsible to that body.

For parliamentary government to succeed, a strong opposition and an alternative government are essential. In the past, India has lacked both of these elements. Fortunately, the party in power has a true democrat as its leader -- Prime Minister Nehru -- who will not permit the one-party rule to degenerate into a tyranny. Having a bicameral legislature, the lower house (Lok Sabha) is elected on the basis of adult suffrage. The upper house (Raj

Sabha) represents the states according to population.

include the Fundamental Rights. These are the inalienable rights

to which every individual is entitled to maintain his dignity. Part three is a vast section dealing with equality before law, prohibition against discrimination of any kind and freedom of speech and expression.


The constitution is written not only to achieve political democracy, but also to achieve social and economic democracy. As one of its objectives, India has set out to build a socialistic pattern of society, to remove the stigma from the lower classes and to create a casteless society.


In part four of the constitution there are directive principles of state police stand at improving living conditions for its people.

The Indian Constitution sets up a secular state. There is no state religion and all religions are treated alike. Often misunderstood by Americans, India is not a Hindu state.

Freedom of conscience and of free profession, practice and propagation of religion are guaranteed.

During the last 13 years, this constitution has undergone many crucial trials; but it continues to play its vital role in the political, social and economic development of the Republic.

Fight Slated For TaxReform

WASHINGTON (P - Congressional leaders said Thursday they see a rough fight for President Kennedy's tax revision program. Reducing taxes by \$13.6 billion would be easy, they said. The hard part comes in the President's proposals for knocking out some special benefits and deductions to raise an off-setting \$3.4 billion.

"The president should not feel confident he is going to get thatwithout a hard fight," said Sen. Frank Carlson of Kansas, second ranking Republican on the Senate Finance Committee.

A Democrat, Sen. A, Willis Robertson of Virginia, predicted that "What we will get out of all this is a deficit at least as big as the President predicted, and probably bigger tax relief for those in the low income brackets, and no tax reforms whatsoever." Kennedy's own party leaders

in the House and Senate took a cautious stance as the President's 12,500-word special message, outlining his proposals in detail, was delivered on Capitol Hill.

House speaker John W. Mc Cormack, D-Mass., told newsmen "I am confident that a bill will pass this year." but he did

The search for faith on campus becomes increasingly complex when we try to fully comprehend the nature of God. We are frustrated when we find that it is not possible to draw & character sketch of our Supreme Creator?

The easy way out is the rejection of bellef in God. Because we cannot understand every aspect of God, we sometimes reject Him completely. If He does not exist, we do not need to trouble our thoughts with questions about His nature. He simply does not exist in our lives. Then we can turn our thoughts to material interests. But this is a narrow, illegical viewpoint. Just because we cannot psychologically analyze God does

not mean He is non-existent. Belief in no God is contrary to science, philosophy, history, humanity and conscience. Next week we will examine specific proofs for His-existence.

We cannot completely know God because He is infinite. He is eternal, always existing because it is His very nature to exist. Main is a finite crusture, placedres a tomer level than God in a different dimension. However, history has demonstrated that we can know something of the nature of God because we, having been created by Him, are His dependent "creatures."

God and man are both of mixed perfections. God's infiniteness lies in the belief that His imperfections are purified by His goodness. Although God created man in His own image, He gave him freedom in his life on earth. As a result of this act, man is finite; evil and imperfections arise when he misuses this gift of freedom.

Those who reject God because they cannot fully comprehend Him place themselves on an equal level with His nature. They become a law unto themselves and are responsible to no higher authority because they cannot see it.

Only when we realize our dependence upon God as finite beings, can we begin to learn something about His personality. An amount of humility is involved, a virtue that many of us fail to realize the impact in our daily living.
