

The University asked for \$31,242,112 for general operational expenses in the budget it submitted last fall. This marked a \$6,791,107 increase over the current appropriation of \$24,451,005.

The operating appropriation recommended by the governor earmarked \$25,497,823 for MSU. \$1,562,515 for MSU-O, \$2,482,877 for cooperative extension and experiment stations.

The University's requests for the 1963-64 fiscal year were based on an anticipated enrollment of 28,544, compared to 26,477 this year.

In seeking the additional \$6,791,107 for operational expenses, the University outlined uses to be made of the money. The largest portion -- \$4,058,039 -would have been used for an increase in the salary budget. With it, the University planned to hire 222 new faculty members, 150 graduate assistants, seven members for the library staff, 70 ex-\$2,903,501 for agricultural tension researchers and 21 members for the clerical and tech-

nical staffs. Other new items on the proposed academic budget were a \$270,966 increase in the labor budget for part-time help and wage adjustments for those paid on an hourly basis, \$741,508 for supplies and services and \$651,532 for additional equip-


