If his views are true, man is reduced to an insecure neurotic, an insignificant form of being grasping for psychological comfort in belief in a deity. But man is essentially an optimistic being, striving for spiritual satisfaction in life.

Bellef in God stems from the discovery that man is an imperfect being, depending on something infallible for his existence. This is not fear; it is realization of one's own limits.

"Fear is the basis of the whole thing," he continues, "fear of the mysterious, defeat and death. Fear is the parent of cruelty, and therefore it is no wonder that cruelty and religion have gone hand in hand."

Religion cruel? This can hardly be held a reasonable assertion by an open-minded person. For centuries religion has been a source of strength when all other institutions have failed. It is true that fear is related to cruelty, but these two types of emotion cannot be identified with religion. Belief in God is not an emotion; it is a total outlook on life.

The student gives his solution to the problem of understanding the world by citing science. "Science can help us get over this craven fear in which mankind has lived for so many generations. Science can teach us to no longer invent allies in the sky, but rather to look to our own efforts to make this world a fit place to live in, instead of the sort of place that ignorance in all these centuries has made it.

Scientists would readily dispute this theory. Science cannot provide all the answers. It will never give us the first cause, the ultimate purpose in life, the unmoved mover, the moral law or the meaning of faith. This is why many scientists also believe in God and participate in forms of worship.

He says that we should use our own efforts to better the world situation, that religion has made it aplace of ignorance. To the contrary, religion keeps man's head above water when all else falls. Man makes the world a better place by acting according to the revelation of God in the scriptures. Cultivating a love and respect for one another makes life worthwhile and satisfies man's mental needs, as well as developing a better place in which to live.

"Blind faith in God is the pre-requisite for anyone who wishes a productive relationship with God," the student states, "I cannot accept this blind faith in any doctrine; this is dogma, a trusted ally of religion."

Obviously, his interpretation of the definition of faith is erroeous. No religion demands "blind" faith previous to communion with God. Faith is acquired in many different ways, but always openly. It is too much a part of man's search for a philosophy of life. Granted, there are a few who acceptGod because they are alraid of the consequences if they reject Him. But this minority does not have faith. Faith is a concept of a personal God.

"Man created god, God never created man ... " this student affirms. Man's mind may have formed concepts of God, but who created man's mind? We are always forced to return to the question of a first cause.
