

Harvard, Radcliffe Disagree On Sex Study

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. F - The President of Radeliffe and the editors of the Harvard student newspaper don't agree on what the President said about sex among college students. Harvard and Radcliffe adjoin each other in this city of higher education. Their students mingle freely, even attend some classes together although they are enrolled in separate

The Harvard Crimson had a reporter at a news conference held by Mrs. Mary I, Bunting, Radcliffe President. The paper carried a story

saying she asked for a study of premarital assess selections among undergraduates. Thursday a Radcliffe spokesman quoted Mrs. Bunting as replying that the Crimson story

doesn't represent her views accurately. The college news bureau said Radcliffe has

no plans for such a study on the school's campus. It added that Mrs. Bunting is now out of town and unavailable for further comment. The Crimson quoted Mrs. Bunting as saying:

sar, spoke out strongly, the Crimson said, against pre-marital sex relations, and that she believed it wrong for any unmarried Vassar student to engage in sexual intercourse.

The genius of a major prophet in the twentieth century is reflected in The Psychiatric Study of Jesus.

Albert Schweitzer discovers that the essential nature of the spiritual is truth. Of his exposition he says, "I am certain that truthfulness in all things belongs to the spirit of Jesus." In his study he refutes the theory that Jesus suffered from .

No one is better qualified to speak about Jesus' mind that the man who has been most Christ-like in his love and concern for humanity. Schweitzer's aim is "to depict the figure of Jesus in its overwhelming heroic greatness and to impose it upon the modern age and theology.

The author points out that contemporary society tries to make Jesus harmonize with its own ideals of life and conduct. But he can only be understood in the light of his own time.

He discusses the religious beliefs of Jesus' time as primary factors in his ministry. Jesus had the gospel of love to teach his contemporaries. He uncovers the fact that Jesus was not dogmatic; in fact, he asked his listeners to meditate upon reli-

Schweitzer's personal evaluation of Jesus' divinity is found IN his opening dedications

"In the knowledge that he is the coming son of man, Jesus lays hold of the wheel of the world to set it moving on that last revolution which is to bring all ordinary history to a close. It refuses to turn, and he throws himself upon it. Then it does turn and crushes him ... The wheel rolls onward, and the mangled body of one immeasurably great man who was strong enough to think of himself as the spiritual ruler of mankind and to bend history to his purpose, is hanging upon it still. That § is his victory and his reign."

The comment of the state of the Faith On Campus

The Atheistic Challenge

Once we have determined our faith, we often feel the need to witness, to express our beliefs to others in the hope that they might be inspiced by our degrees experiences. When we call . front an atheist, we are often disillusioned by the rejection we

There are five general types of atheists. One does not openly deny the existence of God, but lives without regard for His moral law. An approach of describing God in a manner making him impossible is pantheistic. The agnostic professes that God is unknowable. Belief that man is the only superior being is held by the humanist. The type most difficult to communicate with is the one who declares openly, "There is no God."

Discussion with an atheist often leads us to think our witness is futile. We become confused and upset. It is sometimes like talking to a repeating phonograph needle. It plays the same words over and over; our words do not change the endless reiteration. But it is important to the strength of our faith that we understand some of the characteristics of atheistic beliefs.

Non-believers wish to father the thought. They acknowledge no supreme being or creator. It can be said that they often break the moral law by promising unlimited freedom, since they have no one to reckon with other than their own conscience. If they do not believe in God, their conscience is not infuenced by any revelation.

The atheist denies the proof of causality for the existence of God. He either claims that there was no first cause, "some things just are," or that the beginning happened by chance. This belief implies a closed mind. He not only rejects the need for an eternal being who has in himself the reason for existence, but he cannot give the cause of his own atheism.

The atheist is often blinded by passion. He shrinks from honest inquiry into the nature of man, who has instilled within himself the need for a purpose in life. If the non-believer's parents were extremely dogmatic in their approach to religion, the church represents a tyranny to him. His inherent feeling of independence causes him to reject this religion and the God associated with it. Or he may have been raised in an environment totally bereft of any religious concern. It is difficult for him to see the importance of a faith absent in his up-bringing.

The atheist cites war, human sacrifice and other cruel actions of man in the past to prove that a good and perfect God could not have created the universe. He does not seem to realize that God has given man free will; the choice to deny or take up a faith in his own. The perverted treatment of humanity is the result of man's abuse of his freedom, not the result of God's Some atheists do study all facets of religion and still reject

the existence of God. His investigation could not have been completely spen minded then, for he would have discovered that man's whole being craves more life. Human existence cannot be aimless and worthless and looked upon as a desirable cessation. For the atheist there is no hope of happiness beyond the grave. His beliefs do not satisfy the intellect or the heart. He destroys the need for courage in misfortune.

It is strange that the atheist often finds it necessary to repeatedly defend his beliefs. If he is truly convinced that most men are in error, why doesn't he sit back and laugh at the futile attempts of humanity, past and present?

It is no sin to doubt. Man must question all sides of the argument before he makes his decision. He cannot acquire certitude until he considers all evidence. But if he seeks a purposeful, happy, moral life, after weighing proofs on both sides and understanding revelation, he must acknowledge his own limitations and the existence of a perfect being.


