Gretzinger 'Baby' Of Team

Comeback Chance In NCAA

The "baby" of the 400-yard freestyle relay team is sophomore Dick Gretzinger, who replaces Doug Rowe.

As a member of the relay team, Gretzinger put in a time of 1:49.4 to help State tie Yale's record of 3:14.4 set early in the season, which tops the Spartan's national mark set last year.

Yale's relay team swam away with the AAU title last week by cutting six seconds off the previous record. Minnesota, which swam a 3:13.4 race to take the Big Ten title, placed third at the AAU.

State hopes for a comeback in the NCAA meet Friday. Gretzinger along with teammates Bill ...

complete Thursday through Saturday at North Carolina State. Last year State finished sixth in the Nationals.

After a bout of pneumonia in junior high, Dick was unable to go out for basketball so he took up swimming.

In high school he was co-captain of the 1961 Plymouth High School state championship team. He held the 200-yard individual medley high school record and was named to the high school all-American team in the 200-yard freestyle.

In his freshman year at State, "Gretz" as he's known by his teammates, set a freshman swimming record in the 200-yard ...

ternity outstanding freshman swimmer award of 1962. At State he competes in the individual medley and the freestyle relay team. According to Coach McCaffree:

"Gretz" can be used most anywhere."

In past summers he has competed and won two Canadian records in the 400-yard individual and the 200-yard butterfly. He has also worked as a swimming counselor and last summer worked as a life guard at the Huntington, Ind., YMCA.

Gretz is a physical education major and would one day like to

coach.

He is a member of Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity; Porpoise Fraternity; men's swimming honorary, and writes the swimming newsletter.

His other interests include golf.

As a sophomore looking ahead to the future, Dick says when he's a senior, "We could beat Indiana."

"The present freshman team is good," he says, "and the entering freshman class in the fall also has some good swimmers."

He feels the rough practice sessions will be advantageous in the Nationals.

"I think we have a good chance to win the 400-yard freestyle relay event in the Nationals. We should do better than in dual meets, too," he said.

Gretzinger placed third and fifth in the 200 and 400-yard individual medley, respectively, in the Big Ten championship last week.

The key to successful swimming, he feels, is to remain calm and cool.

This formula seems to be working for Dick, who is compiling an excellent record in his sophomore year.

Team Captain Jack Lamers led his teammates by capturing two awards. He won the Indianapolis Alumni Association award for the best free throw shooter and the Ingham County Alumni Association leadership trophy.

Senior, center Ted Williams was voted winner of the most valuable player award. Lamers, forwards Bill Schwarz and Bill Berry were recipients of the other two awards.

Schwarz won the sportsmanship award for making the greatest sacrifice for the good of the team, and Berry was the initial winner of the President's award for the most improved player.

Lamers and Williams, the only seniors on the team, recently went from Spartans to Tartans when they joined the Toledo Tartans of the Midwest Basketball League in time for the championship playoffs.

The remaining team members and three managers were awarded miniature basketball tokens for their participation.

The all-opponents team selected by vote of the Spartans was released Tuesday. Heading the

list were Indiana's Jimmy Rayl and Ohio State's Gary Bradds.

Rayl bombarded the Spartans with 100 points in two games and set a new Big Ten single game scoring record of 56 points in the second MSU-Hoosier encounter. Bradds, who won the Big Ten individual scoring title, netted 31 points against State.

The remaining spots were given to Mel Garland of Purdue, Dave Downey of Illinois and Wayne Estes of Utah State.

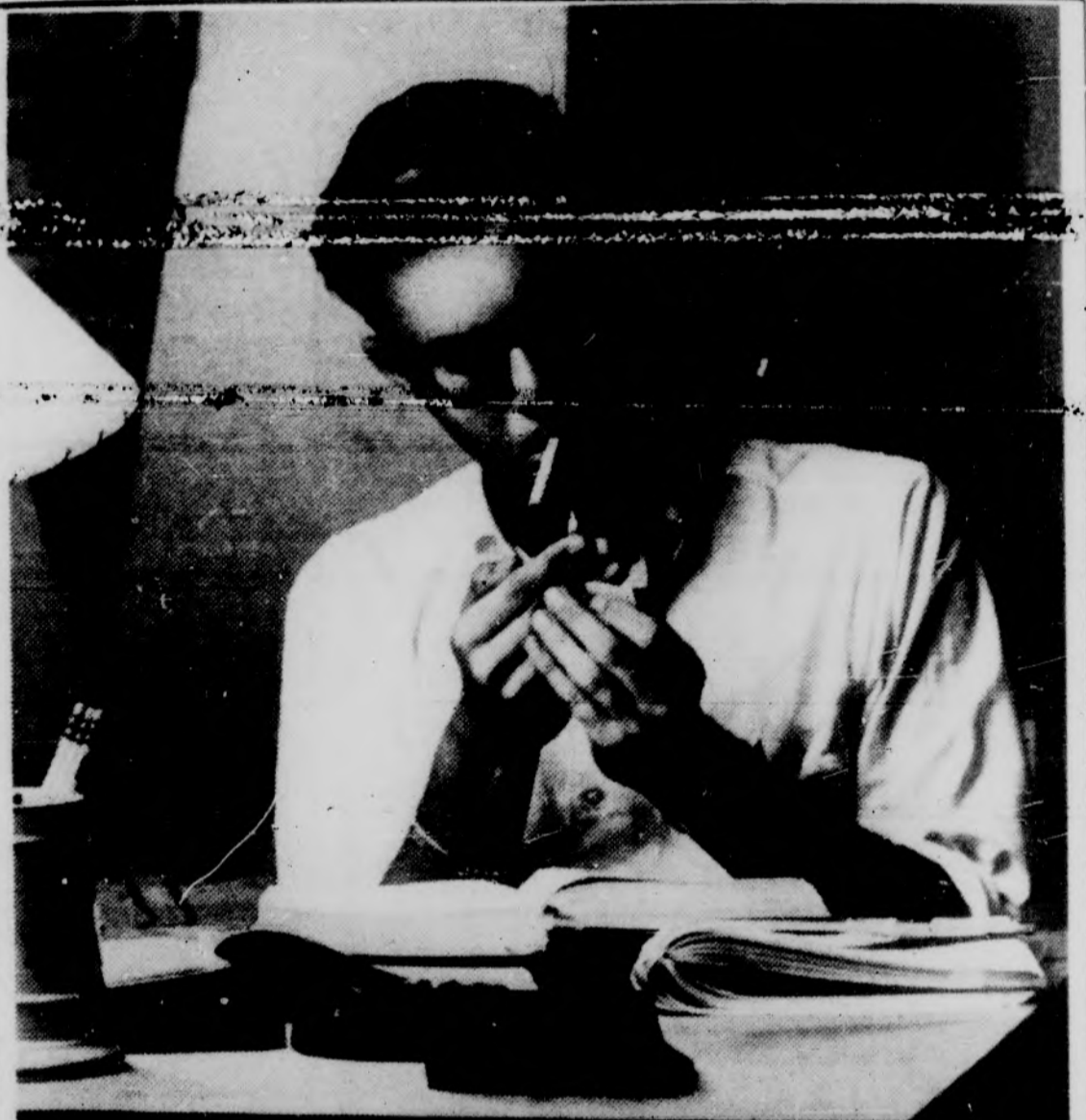
Drobac has Jack Damson playing in the top singles slot.

Investigations Reveal Butts Called Gamblers

ATLANTA, (AP)--Att. Gen. Eugene Cook said Wednesday an investigation had uncovered tabulations of telephone calls made by Wally Butts, former University of Georgia Athletic Director, to persons who had records of being involved in gambling in inter-collegiate contests.

Cook said the calls were "in close proximity" to a Sept. 14 call from Butts to Coach Paul (Bear) Bryant of Alabama. "But there is no evidence that Butts was engaged in gambling," Cook said.

The Saturday Evening Post has charged that Butts and Bryant were in collusion to fix the Alabama-Georgia game Jan. 22, 1952, which Alabama won 35-0. The Post said in its March 21 edition that various betting lines favored Alabama by 14 to 20 points.

Reds Pennant Pick

The Cincinnati Reds, operating on the theory that first year players cluster up the bench of a contending team, appear to have a slight man-power edge and therefore are being picked to take out the San Francisco Giants and Los Angeles Dodgers in a tight National League pennant race. This is the season in which first year men of potential were

placed on major league rosters to protect them from the baseball draft. Whether they are retained or optioned out their places must count on the 25-man roster. In other words, a team optioning out a first-year player will operate with a 24-man team. The Reds lost five first-year men in the winter draft and have none on their present roster.

On the other hand, the Giants must go with 23 men, plus spots for rookies Bob Garibaldi and Al Stanek. The Dodgers are using up two positions with Dick Calmus and Bill Hass. Each team can send out only one of these men. The rule was put on the books to curb huge bonuses to high school and college athletes.

Cincinnati finished only three games back of the Giants and Dodgers — 3 1/2 if you count the Giant pennant playoff victory—and being free of first year players it stands to reason that the Reds figure to have more seasoned depth than either the Giants or the Dodgers, the two teams favored to fight it out for the flag.

Manager Fred Hutchinson rates his "Big Three" of Tom Purkey, Joey Jay and Jim P. as the best in the league. They accounted for 40 of the Red's 95 victories in '62.

Behind them is Jim Owens, ex-Phil, and such veterans as Jim Maloney, Joe Niekirk and Al Worthington.

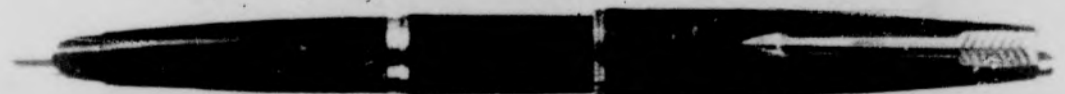

Sooner Matmen Pin Down Title

Powerful Oklahoma emerged from one of the tightest National Collegiate Athletic Association wrestling tournaments as national champs. The tourney was held March 21-23 at Kent State University.

Michigan State slipped to a 14th place finish from last year's ninth spot.

High finisher for the Spartans was 115-pounder Okla. Johnson, Johnson, a senior who was fourth in the Big Ten at 123, dropped to 115 to make his third try for a national title at that weight. He finished in the sixth position.

Coach Grady Peninger took 10 of his Spartans to the nationals. Included were: Johnson, Gary Smith (123), Cecil Holmes (130), David James (137), Monte Hyington (147), Happy Fry (157), Bob Archer (167), Alex Valianoff (177), Merle Prebel (191) and Homer McClure (heavy-weight).

Michigan captured 38 points and one individual championship en route to its victory. Mickey Martin grabbed individual laurels at 130 for the Sooners.

Big Ten champs University of Michigan finished third with 36. Jack Harden of the Wolverines was the only individual title winner from the Big Ten. Harden who wrestles with MSU's Homer McClure during the dual meet season, captured his crown at 191.

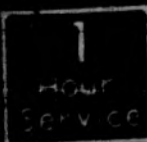

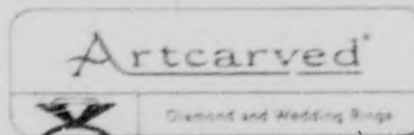

Hawks Oust Pistons From NBA Playoffs

DETROIT (UPI)—The Detroit Pistons were knocked out of the Western Division playoffs in the NBA Tuesday night by a 104-100 defeat at the hands of the St. Louis Hawks.

Bob Pettit led his team with a 35 point spurge.

The triumph gives the Hawks their third victory in four games in the best three out of five series and advances them against the Western Division champion Los Angeles Lakers. The opening game will be at Los Angeles Sunday.

Pettit scored 23 points in the first half as the Hawks jumped to a 25-24 first period margin and stretched it to 54-47 at halftime.

The Hawks scored the first seven points of the second half to boost their edge to 61-47 and had a 65-50 edge before Detroit started a rally on its own and narrowed it to 83-74 going into the final period.

Red Wing Play 'Poor' In Cup Semi-Finals

CHICAGO (UPI)—From Detroit Red Wing Coach Sid Abel's standpoint everything was "poor" Tuesday night.

Abel fumed about his team's "poor play" and the "poor ice" at Chicago Stadium where the Red Wings lost the opening semi-final game of the Stanley Cup Hockey Playoffs, 5-4.

"We played badly," said Abel, "but it's a crime to play on ice like that. It was rough and had holes in it and had water standing on it. It was the worst I've seen all year."

Abel blamed a bad second period in which Chicago scored three times for his team's defeat.

The crippled Black Hawks' injury continued to mount, but Coach Rudy Pilous thought that the injury to his star wing, Bobby Hull, may have "taught him something."

"Bobby did more passing because of his injury, he moved the puck around well, and of course he scored our first two goals,"

Pilous said. "He learned he doesn't have to shoot all the time." Hull was on the doubtful list until game time with a severe shoulder strain but he wound up with 27 minutes of ice time.

"My shoulder feels worse now than before the game," said Hull, "but I think I'll be all right for Thursday's game."

Kenny Wharram, Murray Balfour and Stan Mikita joined Hull in the Chicago sick bay. Wharram had five stitches taken over his right eye, Mikita nursed a swollen left knee, and Balfour was hobbled by bruises on his hip and ankle.

TORONTO—The Toronto Maple Leafs defeated Montreal 3-1.

The National Hockey League champions completely dominated play as they grabbed a 3-0 lead on a first period goal by Bob Pulford and second period scores by Dick Duff and George Armstrong.
