An alternative to purchasing the land from the Pulte Incor-Gordon Thomas, East Lansing porated would be to curve the "unlikely" that the council would bridge so that it would be built entirely on University property. Mayor Thomas said this could be done by building the bridge 50

feet west of the proposed site. Thomas pointed out the curved bridge would be more difficult to engineer than a straight one and cost would have to be considered. Cost of the bridge is estimated at \$200,000.

The four-lane bridge has been in planning stages for two years. The bridge would divert a portion of heavy traffic from East Lansing and open a route to Shaw Lane and South Campus, according East Lansing city engineer Robert Bruce. He said it is possible that construction could begin this summer if the Council takes immediate action.

The case of Byron de la Beck-Citizens Council, which militantly represents total segregation, was heard in the Hinds (Jackson) County court Tuesday. His two attorneys entered a plea of not guilty.

The county's District Attorney, William L. Waller, who is prosecuting the case for the State of Mississippi, said he will seek the death penalty should de la Beckwith be indicted.

The Tuesday hearing was the first in a series of legal steps before the case can come to trial. Normally such a hearing is waived, and the defendant is held for the grand jury.

The fact that Beckwith's attorney requested the hearing is taken as an indication that the case will be extremely hard

Reports concerning the State's case say it will be based on physical evidence developed by the FBI from the alleged murder weapon, a 1917-model rifle found near Ever's home and traced to de la Beckwith.

The defendant's fingerprint was supposedly found on the sight of the murder rifle.

De la Beckwith was first arrested Saturday night by FBI agents under provisions of a 1957 Civil Rights Act. Monday the defendant was released without bond, but Jackson police im- Comm Arts mediately served a murder warrant and de la Beckwith went back o jail.

## **Pastoral Point of View**

To some people, one of the most disturbing aspects of Christianity is the confident claim that Jesus Christ is God. Almost anything less than this might be acceptable. Skeptics of His deity might go so far as to acknowledge Jesus Christ to be a religious genius with keen spiritual insight. They might accept Him as a forceful reformer who persisted in His efforts to remove certain trivialities from a religious system. They might regard Him as a gifted teacher with amazing ability to communicate truth. They might grant Him a secure place among the great prophets of all time. But to declare Jesus Christ to be God, one in essence with Jehovah, and to do so without reservation, becomes a barrier too great for some people to overcome. Yet nothing short of this will satisfy the claims Jesus Christ made concerning Himself, or the claims that the Holy Bible, especially the New Testament, makes con-

In the Scriptural passage of Hebrews 1:8 it is recorded that the first Person of the Trinity speaks to Jesus Christ, the Son of God, and declares that He is God: "But unto the Son he saith, Thy throne, O God, is for ever and ever." On other occasions in the Scriptures the deity of Jesus Christ is attested by statements from God the Father.

The Apostle Peter, according to Matthew 16:16, made this identifying statement as he addressed his remarks to Jesus Christ: "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." In another instance Peter said: "Lord, to whom shall we go? Thou hast the words of eternal life and we believe and are sure that Thou art that Christ, the Son of the living God" (John 6:68, 69).

Thomas, the doubting disciple, finally cried out to Jesus Christ, "My Lord and my God" (John 20:28). The Apostle John gave testimony to the deity of Jesus Christ in such specific terms as "This is the true God, and eternal life"

Concerning Jesus Christ, the Apostle Paul states that "in Him dwelleth all the fullness of the Godhead bodily" (Colossians 2:9). Paul tells Timothy that Jesus Christ was "God manifested in the flesh" (I Timothy 3:16). To the

Romans, the great Apostle declared "Christ came, who is over all, God blessed for ever" (Romans 9:4,5). Paul encourages Christians in his letter to Titus to look forward to the wonderful fulfillment of their hopes when "the great God and Savior Jesus Christ" will appear (Titus 2:13). His deity were made by Jesus # Christ Himself. He said, "I and my Father are one" (John 10:30), and "He that hath seen Me hath seen the Father" (John 14:9). He claimed to be eternal and referred to Himself by using the name reserved for absolute deity (John In spite of such claims, clearly

presented, persons doubting the deity of Jesus Christ are legion.



Conversely, many believe the claims Christ made to be absolutely true and would re-echo the statement made by Daniel Webster, great American statesman, "I believe Jesus Christ to be the Son of God... I believe all His declarations."


