It is like holding a magnifying glass on a piece of paper. After a short time, the sun's rays will start the paper on fire.

Since the retina is not sensitive to pain, the person never knows it is being damaged until it is too late. Such retinal burns are incurable.



He will attend an international symposium on leukemia August 12 - 20 in Hanover, Germany. Researchers from all over the world will hear an Italian scientist report on his belief that he has isolated the virus causing leukemia in cows.



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
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

the number of projects under- established in the future. taken behind the University of Illinois and the University of Wisconsin. Wisconsin and Illinois have 2,000 projects, and MSU has 1,600 projects listed. The University of Michigan has 1,300° projects in progress.

"The figures are not comparable," said Milton E. Muelder, vice president of research development. "The figures should mean the same, but each institution filled out the magazine survey according to its own criteria for handling statistics. These figures are not likely to be the same among the various

"It certainly is a wonderful demonstration of the commitment to research in the nation, however," he said. "Also, we should not confuse dollars with the significance of research being done.

"Some of the finest work in ultrasonics, enzyme development in plants, biochemistry, solid state physics, and food science in on this campus."

Muelder said MSU does not have the dollar volume being spent on research that some universities have. This is because there are no large institutional research programs such as the Phoenix Project at the University of Michigan.

"A proposal to establish a plant research laboratory to study radiation is presently before the Atomic Energy Commission. This proposal, if approved, will establish probably a separate, building on campus with an operating staff of 9 senior staff, 27 post-doctoral fellows, 9 techdents," Muelder said.

production's minor performers. The awkwardness of the "lover," when found in the butler and restaurant waiter, as well as the maid, is disconcerting rather than endearing.

And the feeling that several other characters appearing at intervals during the production add little is disappointing.

Yet even with this lack of life among the lesser characters, "Let's Get a Divorce" is an enjoyable production, full of witty satire on marriage and divorce, put across solely through the efforts of the director and his three principal performers.

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
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









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'No Other Gods'

Since the beginning of time, men have been fashioning their own gods. Primitive man made his gods of wood, iron, brass, ivory or precious stones. He moved these gods from place to methods of expressing our wor- Christian duty, "in the dead- group has one Negro member. place and room to room, to suit his own convenience. To these gods he imputed certain super-human powers.

There were in some areas, men whose business it was to make gods for others. These gods were like pieces of furniture or decorations, having utilitarian uses in the life of primitive man. There was a tendency at times to be careful not to offend one of these idols and thus incur its wrath. There was not, however, any sense of commitment of one's life to a high purpose or last week.

Modern man still has his idols. It may be status that he worships, or success, power, popularity, pleasure, material things that are his objects of worship. He still fits these idols into the various areas of his life for convenience. He tends to impute to them certain powers, and, at times at least, he fears incuring their displeasure. There are among us dealers in idols who seek to persuade us to "stop and buy.

The Hebrew-Christian tradition has called men to something higher and better than this idol worship. When Moses wrote God's law on the tablets of stone, he included in the preface this phrase,

"NO OTHER GODS." This must not be concieved as an attempt to regiment the life of man. As we find God's law spelled out more clearly in the life and teachings of Jesus, we find a challenge to make a commitment to the search for truth, beauty and holiness the goal of our living.

The men who would be Christian do not fashion their idols according to their own design. The man who would be Christian is called to fashion his life according to the life of Jesus. The pattern in the New Testament is a constant challenge to the highest and the best we can know. In the words of Moses, we must have "NO OTHER GODS." There is room in this way of life for the person who has tired of idol worship, the person who nator of United Campus Minishas felt that somehow there must be more meaning and purpose try, questions the compatibility in life, and the person who has seen his idols fail him.

It is not possible for a person to live a Christian life without a commitment to Christ. This commitment involves an affirmation of faith in Christ. This commitment involves a recognition of the truth of the revelation of God we find in Christ. This commitment must also invole a participation in the achievement of the goals of the Christian community. There can be "NO OTHER GODS." A life divided against its God cannot stand. No man can serve God and keep his idols.

I visited with a young man at youth camp one day, who found his way to a meaningful commitment to Christ. This experience changed his life and gave him a feeling that there were significant things for him to do as a Christian. In a very brief time he was giving serious consideration to his personal involvement in the achievement of Christian goals in his community and his world.

"NO OTHER GODS!" Not restrictions imposed from without, but an inner response of love and loyalty to the highest and the best -- here lies the Christian's secret of new life.

Intimidation Denied
