

Troops Fight Crowd For Body of Dead Mank

HUE CITY, South Viet Nam -- Government troops charged into a crowd of Buddhists Wednesday and forcibly took away the body of a novice Buddhist priest who burned himself to death yesterday in South Viet Nam. At least 25 Buddhists were hurt, five of them seriously, in the grisly battle for possession of the charred body. The 17-year-old novice committed suicide to protest alleged religious discrimination by the government of Roman Catholic

Rioting Breaks Out In Congo

LEOPOLDVILLE -- The former French Congo capital of Brazzaville was the scene of rioting Wednesday.

Reports coming into Leopoldville say that troops with orders

to shoot to kill have clashed again with rioting civilians. Details on the latest clashes are scant, but there were unconfirmed reports that five demonstrators were killed and several wounded. A 24-hour curfew is being enforced, following the burning of

the city's central prison and the freeing of its prisoners Tuesday. Troops are patrolling the streets and all telephone communications with the outside world have been cut. The rioters are demanding a delay in the government's plans to outlaw political opposition. They also want union representatives included in the government.

Russia Rejects Disarmament Proposal

GENEVA -- The Soviet negotiator at the 17-nation disarmament conference in Geneva says he cannot accept the United States proposal that both countries discontinue making fissionable materials. Soviet negotiator Tsarapkin said he had to reject the proposal because it was not a true disarmament measure. Also included in the proposal was a measure providing for the use of uranium stockpiles on peaceful projects.

Move To Block Ouster of Venezuelan Dictator

MIAMI -- Federal attorneys are moving to knock down a Florida state court ruling which postpones the extradition of former Venezuelan dictator Perez Jimenez. Yesterday a state judge ordered Perez held in Miami, pending the appeal of a paternity suit against him. At the same time, a federal court refused to delay extradition despite arguments that Perez faces execution in his homeland.

Castro Regime Captures Raiders

HAVANA -- The Castro regime has announced the capture of two Cuban fishing boats and four so-called "counter-revolutionary" agents, presumably raiders. The boats were said to have been captured off the North Coast.

Johanos Lauds 100 Musicians For Progress

Donald Johanos, the youngest conductor to appear on campus this summer, will lead the Congress of Strings in its final concert of the summer tonight at 8:15 in Fairchild Theatre.

Johanos, the 34-year-old musical director of the Dallas Symphony Orchestra, has been working with the 100 members of the Congress of Strings in Williams Hall for nearly two weeks.

These young people are extremely talented," he said. "Preparing for the concert has been a great deal of work, but I have found it quite exciting. The improvement between the first rehearsal and today is absolutely amazing."

Johanos said the program for tonight's free concert is "an extremely difficult one." It includes three quite lengthy numbers, Vivaldi's "Concerto in E Minor for Strings," Bartok's "Divertimento for Strings" and Dvorak's "Serenade for Strings in E Major."

Military Still Has **Problems**

Price declined to comment whether he thought military pay was adequate because he said he had not studied the situation.

More Parking Permits





Bishop Defines The 'assembly will also re- Prayer Ruling

The Supreme Court ruling About 52 million of the world's against the required reading of the Lord's Prayer in public school classes was not "a denial of the Christian faith," according to U.S. bishop.

> The Most Rev. Arthur Lichtenberger, presiding bishop of the Protestant and Episcopal Church, said last week that the ruling has opened the way for an objective study of religion and puts the Christain faith "in proper perspective."

Pilot Turns Christian

The Japanese pilot who dropped the first bomb on Pearl Harbor was in Detroit recently on a different mission.

Captain Mitsuo Fuchida gave the order to attack Pearl Harbor in 1941. Converted to the Christian faith in 1950, he is now touring the world on behalf of the Pocket Testament League.

Fuchida, who sank the battleship Maryland, said his conversion came through a chance meeting with U.S. soldier 13 years ago. He said he was impressed by the enthusiasm of the GI, who had taken part in the bombing of Tokyo and was the author of a missionary pamphlet.

Obtaining a copy of the Bible, Fuchida was most impressed with the passage from the Gospel of Luke telling of the crucifixion of Christ and how he forgave

Fuchida barely missed the retaliation of the U.S in 1945. He was in Hiroshima the day before an American atomic bomb nearly wiped the city off the map. But a telephone call from his headquarters took him back to Tokyo.

Now a missionary for peace, Fuchida said, "Today, I do only the things that glorify the Lord Jesus Christ."
