## Game Delay Costly

Delay in announcing the postponement of last Saturday's football game may have cost the University several thousand dollars, it was learned Tuesday.

John Laetz, business manager of athletics, estimated losses at \$2,000 to \$3,000 in preparing Spartan Stadium the morning before the originally-scheduled meeting with Illinois.

"The game was first called off after many employees had reported in," Laetz said. "In fact our ground crew, which numbers close to 100, was already made at work removing the field cov-

"We did manage to notify most employees," he added, "notably ticket takers."

Laetz estimated average expenses at \$8,000 to ready the stadium for each game.

Also hit hard Saturday was the Stadium Concessions Department, which was forced to dump over 400 gallons of coffee prepared in anticipation of a

# MSU Asks \$8 Million

Higher education in Michigan needs more money and needs

That in essence is what a Michigan Coordinating Council for Higher Education resolution said Tuesday. It also indicated that higher education would not be responsible if it could not meet future needs because of lack of state support.

The coordinating council is up of all Michigan colleges and universities except Farris State College.

MSU Trustee Warren M. Huff, of Plymouth, who is also council president, telegraphed the resolution to Gov. George W. Rom-

"The issues of higher education are so serious that they demand immediate and responsible answers," it read.

The council said it is confident that Governor Romney and the legislature will move forward because of the report. It also stated that Michigan's colleges cannot, for the first time in many years, plan wisely for the heavy burdens they are being

asked to assume. "If higher education is to assume these burdens, we must have confidence that higher education will be given the financial support that is essential," it con-

The public colleges and versities are to take immediate and responsible action within the means afforded to them, the report added. If they fail for lack of money, then the failure can-

"The report has stated very well what problems all Michigan colleges and universities will gan colleges and universities will face in the future," Secretary

## What If A Student...

Should Olin Health Center have a night doctor on duty?

Is it unreasonable to expect that a health center which services a community of nearly 27.000 will provide students with this night emergency care?

The college community is a unique one, with the majority of residents ranging in age from 18 to 25. This is the very age group that tends to be most accidentprone, and, therefore, most apt to need emergency care.

Under the present policy, a night doctor is always "on call." This leaves the door wide open. What does "on call" mean? Does it mean that the doctor is waiting for calls at his home, a few minutes from campus? Does it mean that the doctor is asleep in his home several miles and many minutes from Olin?

At present if a night student emergency case is picked up by the campus police, they must make the first aid decision -should the student be rushed straight to Sparrow Hospital or can the student wait for a doctor to be called into Olin.

If the case is taken to Olin, the nurse on duty must decide if the patient needs im mediate treatmentor if the case warrants calling a doctor.

University officials feel finances prevent Olin from having a night doctor. However, the University operates on a budget of more than \$60 million a year. It would seem that a few thousand dollars might be found somewhere to provide the students with better emergency care.

If the situation is bad now-what will it be in the future when our enrollments reach the predicted 35,000?

Any change takes time to be implemented. Why not start now?



# Johnson Story: Never Quit Running

Associated Press Writer Washington - Sunshine, tinged the tops of the pecan and sycamore trees, swept across the ed in the room where Sam Ealey Johnson, Jr. was shaking his son's foot.

"Get up, Lyndon," he said. Everybody in town's got a twohour head start on you." Lyndon Baines Johnson began

Today, he is President of the United States.

But the greatest race of Johnson's life lies ahead of him. In less than a year, another Presidential election campaign will be under way. To be serving by reason of tragedy is one thing. But to be elected Presi-

And Johnson is the ultimate politician. Johnson was born on a ranch

near Stonewall, Aug. 27, 1908. On that day, so the story goes, his grandfather said, "He'll be a U.S. Senator some day." True or not, only a few years

were to elapse before Johnson was on his way. He had a political background. His grandfather and his father

both served in the Texas Declaration of Independence. "I took 40 courses and got 35 A's," he says of his days at Southwest Texas State Teach-

To help pay his expenses, he worked as a janitor. Having enrolled in a public speaking course, he practiced speech-

Johnson's first big political move came in 1937. After the death of Rep. James Buchanan, Johnson ran for his seat.

He waged a shrewd, boldlyconceived campaign which was fortuitous for two reasons -- it won, and it brought him to the attention of President Franklin votes. Johnson went back to the D. Roosevelt.

The other candidates concentrated their fire on him. He got the spotlight, all right, and won. A Texan elected on a New Deal platform!

Roosevelt, who was fishing off Corpus Christi at the time, was delighted. He invited Johnson to ride to Washington on the Presdential train.

He also arranged to have Johnmaking while sweeping out the son seated on the important Naval

House for Sunday breakfasts.

In short, Johnson was close to the throne from the start of his political life.

Johnson's first try for the Senate, in 1941, failed. Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel beat him by 1,311 House.

Then came Pearl Harbor.

Two days later, Johnson, a Naval Reserve Officer, obtained leave from the House and went away to war. He served on a three-man commission inspecting conditions in the Southwest Pacific, and rode on some bombing missions. Gen Douglas Mac-Arthur decorated him with the silver star. In mid-1942, Roosevelt ordered him back to the

for a freshman Congressman -- eral respects. He campaigned by and brought him to the White helicopter. And he defeated Gov. Coke Stevenson by 87 votes out of nearly a million cast.

> For a time, thereafter, he was known in Washington as "Landslide Lyndon."

> But his natural talent for getting along in the Senate, and getting things done, soon asserted itself. He was elected Democratic Whip in 1951 and Democratic leader in 1953. At 44, he was the youngest floor leader in history.

Johnson once said he had no Presidential ambitions. "I'm conscious of my limitations," he said. "I think it's fair to say nobody but my mama ever thought I'd get as far as I have."

The paramount significance of Christ is that only through His redeeming and reconciling act can man enter heaven. Good works are a consequence, not a
