Some 8,000 students at Michigan State University should be seeking mental treatment.

A recent survey of 600 colleges reveals that about 15 per cent of their students are seeking counseling of some kind for mental disturbances and that about 30 per cent ought to seek such mental

If this figure is correct, 8,000 MSU students may be in need of mental treatment.

There is good reason why the college group should be called the "tense generation". There is no time in the average school year when the relentless pressure ceases, except between the last final exam and registration for the next term. Even during this time students find it difficult to relax and realize that no paper is due next week, no exam, no report, no spot quiz, no project. Many students merely collapse after final exams.

The competition is stiff.

The psychological strains of college are another contributing factor to the nervous disorders so frequently found in college students. The search for personal identity, the struggle for some recognition or acknowledgement, the confusion between familytaught morals and college standards, the adjustment to people with differing social-economic-religious beliefs, the battle for self-discipline, all this and more confronts the college student.

And after a rigorous five-day week of concentration and study the two-day week-end arrives. Freedom? No, merely more "free" time to catch up on that paper due Monday or cram for that exam. Few feel that they can let a week-end slip by without cracking a book. Therefore, Saturday and Sunday become no more than a two day reprieve until Monday.

But Friday and Saturday nights may turn into a nightmare. With the threat of the relentless Mondays hanging gloomily over their heads, many students attempt "to forget for a while.

Disciplinary officials report that week-end drunks, unruly riots, sexual promiscuity, speeding, the formidable hypodermic or the innocent-looking "snow" frequently are devices by which the student forgets.

More pitiful techniques - overdose of sleeping pills, slit wrists, gas poisoning - may bring desperate students permanent

Then Monday dawns, and many cringe in the daylight of realization. Shame, disgust, fear, and desperation hit hard. Then the question, "Is it really worth it?"

or the fact that they are in college at all. Our society in general and our parents in particular have greatly contributed to this

Today college is a must - for the bright, for the not-so-bright, and for the academic failure. The better the college, the better your chance for success. It is no longer dependent upon individual preference; it has become a mass acceptance.

WASHINGTON, P--President Johnson declared "unconditional war on poverty in America' Wednesday and called on Congress for enactment this month of a tax reduction designed to create new jobs and markets.

In his State of the Union Message Johnson urged a many-sided legislative assault on the causes of unemployment. It should assure

In issuing his annual plea for motorists to buy tabs early, Hare said that sales are expected to increase nearly 200,000 over last year's record of four million.

"We're bound to have long lines and frayed tempers during the final days of sale before the Feb. 29 deadline," he said. Cost for the tabs is 35 cents per hundred weight or about \$12 for a standard-sized car. The automobile title must

be presented to get tabs.

Michigan Likely Site For Space Center

\$50 million space electronics research center to be built by the National Space Agency (NASA).

Gov. George W. Romney, Michigan industrialists, educators, labor leaders and members of Congress teamed together to try to influence the space agency to locate in southeastern Michigan. Representing MSU at the meeting last Wednesday was Milton E. Muelder, vice president for research development.

"Michigan was the only state to present a united front," Muelder explained. "Educational institutions in other states which want the center are sharply divided over where the center will be located if their state gets it."

He indicated this was a very strong point in favor of the Michigan bid for the installation. However, he was neither optimistic nor pessimistic, but had a "wait-and-see" approach. During the 90-minute hearing, Michigan

representatives contended with color slides

and statistical graphs that no other area of the United States offers as many advantages to NASA as the university-industrial complex of southeastern Michigan.

"If Michigan is picked as the site, we will get the job done," said Governor Romney during his presentation. "We have the tools, the ability and the desire."

He also outlined Michigan's industrial and scientific achievements during World War II. Michigan, he said, can do the same thing

In outlining some of the advantages to MSU if NASA picks Michigan for the research center, Milton E. Muelder said:

"The center would bring a community of scientists and technical people to Michigan and MSU would share in this improved scientific and intellectual climate."

John Hoffman, director of engineering research, also attended the meeting.
