### Castro Agents Involved In Riots

WASHINGTON F-Secretary of the Army Cyrus Vance said Tuesday Castro Communist agents "measurably increased the amount of violence" in the anti-American riots which shook the Panama Canal

Vance, who returned Monday night from a peace-making mission to the Zone, told a news conference that at least 10 suspected agents of Fidel Castro, the Cuban dictator, had been arrested and at least one of them was a sniper who had been shooting at U.S. forces.

The Army Secretary said the Castro agents were identified by , American officials and arrested by the Panamanian National Guard.

# Rent Increase Assessor Suggests Tax Burden Low

East Lansing's tax assessor countered claims by off-campus apartment developers that they may have to raise rent to stu-

dents because of personal property taxes. Frank E. Warden estimated Tuesday that taxes on the average furnished apartment will amount to \$2 a month.

Apartment furnishings probably are worth about \$1,000, he said. At the 35 per cent assessment rate, the owners would pay 65 mills---\$65 per \$1,000-- on

# Can't Fight City Hall

Greek and co-operative residents will wince when they get hit this July by an East Lansing personal property tax for the first time.

In addition to real estate taxes, their organizations must now pay a 65 mill rate--\$65 per \$1,000--35 per cent of the total value of personal property in their houses.

While this new tax probably will not fold up any of the present organizations, it will put a strain on many members' pocketbooks.

Last year's president of the fraternity advisers association, Bill Gillis, predicted that newlyformed and small organizations will be especially hard pressed to find funds for the tax.

He added that the tax could discourage formation of new houses.

At a rapidly expanding university, this would mean a stunting and even declining of the role of Greeks and co-ops.

Undoubtedly, these groups will react verbally to each other, to their parents, to fellow students and professors.

Will they "just complain" to people who can not directly do anything about the tax? Or will they challenge the city and the state laws on personal property tax to see if they can be exempted?

A lot of money--perhaps even the future of the Greek and co-op systems --is at stake. Unless these groups move now of their own initiative, they will have few sympathetic listeners when they scream and holler on their way down to the tax office to pay their bills in July.

# Smoking Issue Clouded

The long-awaited report on smoking released Saturday by Surgeon General Luther Terry of the U.S. Public Health Service reaffirmed that heavy cigarette smoking is a major cause of lung cancer and a factor in many other potentially deadly diseases.

Understandably, reaction to the report was mixed. Non-smokers could smile at smokers and say, "I told you so," while smokers were confronted with the neces sity of re-examining the habit.

Dr. James S. Feurig, director of Olin Health Center, anticipates that many MSU students will try to cut down on their smoking.

But many others have shown little willingness to even consider the committee's report. They glibly ask "so what?" "You only live once," they say, "might as well enjoy yourself while you're

And many of them will continue to smoke heavily throughout their lives with no adverse effects. Other smokers will not be so lucky, and perhaps they will get lung cancer or another of the diseases associated with smoking and their lives will be shortened. Is smoking worth it?

The decision on whether to quit

or ease up on smoking is, in the end, up to the individual. The evidence against smoking is impressive, to say the least, despite the claims of the tobacco industry that more research is needed.

More research is definitely needed to find out if tobacco can be purified of the elements that cause lung cancer.

No one can tell smokers to quit; he can only suggest it. It is a problem every smoker should he buys that next pack of cigar-

### Dealing With **Expansion**

The College of Veterinary Medicine has set a fine example. By revising its curriculum in light of current inadequacies and future pressures, the college has done something many departments of the University must do: it has accounted for increasing size with more efficiency.

During the past two years the college turned away 239 scholastically acceptable applicants. It obviously did not take this lightly. Enrollment will now be increased by 56 per cent.

The college's radical departure from convention is especially commendable when one considers that its curriculum is certainly far more specialized than most. Still, the curse of rigidity has been escaped. Flexibility is the new key, as students will now confront a curriculum where each course is offered at least once every two terms and no course continues longer than two terms. Also, a student will be able to complete work for a degree in less than six years or to combine a significant period of work with

A realistic grasp of problems plaguing higher education everywhere has been shown. The College of Veterinary Medicine has acted well in accordance with the University's Educational Development Project, with the needs of the profession and the student remaining paramount.

MSU advisors have worked closely with both the U.S. high commissioner and the Ryukus Islands officials. The Ryukyus government supports the university financially.

Last year's budget was \$1,060,000 of which the government of Ryukyus provided \$621,000. The rest came from the Department of the Army, \$360,000, and through private

The Pacific island venture has been quite successful, Hannah commented. Of the 2,800 graduates of the university over the years, 1,800 have gone into teaching at island elementary and secondary schools and at the uni-

Some 250 of the university's graduates have gone into government service and another 150 work with the U.S. high commissioner and other parts of the U.S. administration there.
