# Cambodia Hits U.S. **Activities**

SIEM REAP, Cambodia (AP)-Just when a Philippine formula for peace between Washington the bidders. and Phnom Penh seemed to be producing results, Prince Norodom Sihanouk fired another blast at the United States Tuesday.

The mercurical, 41-year-old Cambodian chief of state told arguments on the return of their newsmen the United States is check.

He charged that Americans, backing a war against Communist rebels in neighboring South Viet Nam, planned and "are responsible for South Vietnamese air attacks on Cambodians" in the frontier area. He declared the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency against him in 1959.

Similar accusations, denied by the United States, accompanied Sihanouk's decision to reject continued American aid of \$30 drawal of diplomatic personnel accept bids and award contracts.

Controversy over Michigan State's acceptance of bids for new power plant generators arose in the House Ways and Means Committee Tuesday.

Spokesmen for a Pennsylvania iron works contend their low bid for steam generators was rejected by the University.

MSU Secretary Jack Breslin said the University has not awarded the contract for the

Bids were submitted,

with checks of "good faith," to indicate sincerity in bidding, he said. All the checks for generator bids, except that of a Saginaw company, were returned to

"But this does not mean that we have awarded a contract," Breslin said.

The Erie City bid was \$1.72 aiding subversive elements in his million. Wicks Company of Saginaw bid \$1.78 million, the second lowest. A deduction in the Wicks bid for other equipment involved brings the difference between the two to \$34,000. Le University did not return the Wicks Comapny check.

Whether or not the return of checks constituted obligation of the University to accept a contract with the Wicks Company was not decided by the Ways and Means Committee.

# Abe's Life 'Unsuccessful'

the ideal of American democracy--the rise from poverty to the highest office in the land. And yet by modern standards Lincoln's life gives little appearance of "success" until his election to the presidency. Even in his attainment of the office, Lincoln netted only 40 out of every 100 votes cast in the country; but the votes were so distributed that he had 180 electoral votes to the combined

Probably more than any other

President, Lincoln represents

123 votes of his opponents. During his youth he did odd jobs. His partnership in owning a store failed. As a representa-

tive in Congress he never attained distinction. Although known as a shrewd lawyer, he had to sue for his

largest single legal fee from the Illinois Central Railroad. Despite his skill in the Lin-

coln-Douglas debates, he lost the senatorship.

But the man who was killed Good Fulday, 1865, guided the Union through a Civil War on the conviction that the fate of the United States might determine the fate of democracy

in the world. Lincoln's was the deep faith that could declare "In the present civil war it is quite possible that God's purpose is something different from the purpose of either party--and yet the human instrumentalities, working just

as they do, are of the best adap-tion to effect his purpose."
