Blast Handling Of Shiawassee 'Grasser' Raid

The U.S. Constitution guarantees the right of a speedy trial, but 111 MSU students are bitter about Shiawassee County's interpretation of it.

The students were arrested Saturday night after police raided three drinking parties near Morrice. Some 105 paid \$3,155 Monday in fines and court costs.

Students interviewed by the State News Tuesday said they were guilty but protested the manner in which they were arrested.

ted and the way their trial was handled.

"When the police came they told us to 'get the hell out of here—all we want is the beer,'" one student said. "When we started to leave they pulled us over."

When from 15 to 25 cars were gathered together, the students were taken to Corunna, the county seat, in caravan fashion.

At the county jail, the students were not allowed to make phone calls to dorms, parents or for legal counsel, they said.

All students interviewed agreed that they believed the police and the justices of the peace were more interested in getting the hearings over quickly than in informing the students of their legal rights.

"The attitude of the justices of the peace seemed to be that if we pleaded guilty, we paid a fine—otherwise we would have to wait in jail until Monday for arraignment," one student said.

Another said he asked questions about his rights and the judge told him that any more questions would cost him \$4 each.

The judge reportedly asked one girl if she was guilty and she replied that she was at the party.

"Then you are guilty," she quoted him as saying.

"The JP told us that even if we were not drinking but were in the area, then we were guilty of possessing liquor," she said.

One male student said that several couples who were not at the party but who were parked nearby were arrested.

Another student was bitter about the way the evidence was presented against them.

"We went into the backroom of the jail and there was the JP. He pointed to a pile of beer cans on a desk and said that was the evidence the police had picked up at the party."

"The interesting thing is that we had no beer at our party, but we did have liquor."

Several other students related there was no canned or bottled beer at their party but that it was in kegs or ponies.

Some of the students have asked a Lansing attorney to fight the case for them. They asked anyone involved to call 353-0445 or 353-0444.

Hannah Quiet On Grassers

No Comment On Budget

Top administrators are keeping "mum" on how the recent arrest of 111 Michigan State students will affect the University appropriation now pending in the legislature.

President John A. Hannah said the illegal drinking party Saturday night would not help MSU's image, but declined further comment.

Secretary Jack Breslin, MSU's chief liaison official with the legislature also declined to comment on how the arrests in Shiawassee County would influence legislative thinking.

The MSU appropriation bill passed the Senate two weeks ago. It was scheduled to be reported out of the house ways and means committee by midnight Tuesday and probably will come up for a vote today.

"I believe the capital outlay bill will probably remain pretty much in the same form as the senate passed it," Breslin predicted. "I am also hopeful that the operations bill will be reported out intact."

The University operations bill is \$7,300,000 more than last year's appropriation. Included in it is \$250,000 for the Traffic Safety Center and \$100,000 for a police academy here. These two features of the bill were called for by Governor George W. Romney to stem Michigan's rising traffic death total.

The \$9 million capital outlay bill includes \$2,750,000 as final payment on the new \$6 million chemistry building," Breslin said.

Election Reverses Original Decision

New Security Rules Aid Accurate Count

Bob Harris is the new All-University Student Government president by virtue of a 610-vote decision over James Jesse.

Harris got 2,817 votes and Jesse 2,207. There were a total of 5,201 votes cast with

81 being ruled invalid. The total was nearly 500 less than that of the first election.

Harris turned what looked like certain defeat two weeks ago into victory Tuesday night in the All-University Student Government presidential contest.

Following an initial announcement of his victory in the first election two weeks ago, Harris, Bryan, Ohio, junior, lost three recounts to his opponent, James Jesse, Buchanan junior.

That election was voided and a new election called, however, when the Elections Review Board decided that security precautions had been faulty and that neither candidate had obtained a clear-cut majority.

Elections rules make it necessary for a candidate to have a majority of the total votes cast in order to win. There were 44 valid write-in ballots cast in the first election, which meant that no candidate had a majority.

There is little chance of yesterday's election being contested because it lacked security, however.

The counting of ballots was done as a service to the students by the Data Processing Center in the presence of a limited number of students. The Elections Commission, the Elections Review Board, and one State News reporter were the only students allowed in the counting room, and they had to have special passes to gain admittance.

Harris's victory was announced in the first-floor lounge of the Student Services Building, where the candidates and other interested persons had been invited to await the results.

Tuesday's election also was to determine the winner of the senior class secretary contest. Edie Freeman, Brooklyn, N.Y., junior and Sue Smith, Highland Park junior, were vying for the office.

Miss Smith was the winner, polling 627 votes to Miss Freeman's 607.

Ask Study Of MSU Drinking

A Detroit legislator has called for a committee to investigate student use of alcohol on college campuses.

Rep. Daniel W. West, D-Detroit, introduced a resolution Monday night creating a committee to investigate violations of the Michigan liquor act among students of state-supported colleges and universities.

"These recent shocking events and violations are much like the episodes publicized at Harvard recently," West said.

The resolution, referred to the committee on rules and resolutions for consideration, notes that "recent news stories have indicated that under-age college students from state-supported colleges and universities are staging 'beer busts' and drinking parties off-campus and at various isolated communities of the state."

"I want to know what the students are trying to prove," West said. "I want to know who is behind all this. I want to know who is supplying the liquor and why."

West indicated that the investigations would go much farther than just the problem of "grassers" and consumption of alcohol by minors. Married living units and many off-campus units would come under investigation, he said.

Health Forces Senator's Withdrawal

Engle Quits California Race

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)—Sen. Clair Engle, choosing health over career, threw California's Democratic race for his seat wide open Tuesday by giving up his fight for re-election.

The 52-year-old Senator, victim of a brain ailment, didn't endorse anyone for the party's

nomination in the June 2 primary in a telegram announcing his withdrawal "with deep grief."

But his campaign spokesmen indicated the action would benefit State Controller Alan Cranston rather than Pierre Salinger, who quit as White House press secretary to enter

the race at the last minute. Engle, elected in 1958 after 16 years in the House of Representatives, underwent brain surgery Aug. 24. It left him partially paralyzed and with a speech difficulty.

His telegram disclosed that he had two statements prepared. One said he was still a candidate, the other that his health wouldn't permit him to continue in the campaign.

"It is with deep grief," the wire read, "that I now ask my state campaign chairman to release the second statement."

Lodge Takes Early Lead In Primary

BOSTON (AP)—The backers of Henry Cabot Lodge for the Republican nomination for president jumped into an early lead Tuesday in the early tabulation of the Massachusetts primary.

Favorite son Lodge was even picking up votes on the Democratic ballots.

The returns from 92 of 1,764 precincts—including 80 of 275 in Boston—showed these write-ins on the Republican ballot: Goldwater 119; Lodge 849; Nixon 93; Rockefeller 57; and Sen. Margaret Chase Smith 14.

On the Democratic side the tally of 92 precincts showed Johnson 1,387; Kennedy 552; Lodge 165.

Hannah Trip Postponed

President John A. Hannah's two-day whirlwind trip to Nigeria has been postponed two weeks.

Hannah was scheduled to leave late Tuesday to meet with Nigerian President Nnamdi Azikiwe to discuss educational problems concerning the University of Nigeria. Azikiwe is also chancellor of the university.

"The date of the trip was changed so that their equivalent of our Board of Trustees could meet before I came," he said.

Hannah said he will spend from May 12 through 19 in the African nation.

Cars Require Lot V Permits

Public safety officials issued a reminder Tuesday that parking in Lot V is restricted to faculty, employees and Shaw Hall residents, with permits.

Lt. Allen Andrews, public safety, said that numerous tickets have been issued in this lot recently.

World News at a Glance

Demonstrators Arrested In Nashville

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP)—At least 23 persons were reported injured Tuesday as hundreds of civil rights demonstrators marched to the heart of Nashville's business section and refused to budge until threatened with fire hoses.

Many of them sat down at a street intersection and blocked efforts of police to move out with loaded paddy wagons. The officers swung billy clubs to clear a path.

Spokesmen for the demonstrators said 16 of their number were injured, including a Negro girl who was removed unconscious to a hospital.

Pathet Lao Troops Attack

VIENTIANE, Laos (AP)—Attacking behind artillery fire, pro-Communist Pathet Lao troops drove back rightist forces in the northeast highlands Tuesday, military sources reported. The fighting once more raised the specter of civil war in Laos.

It was the first Pathet Lao attack beyond sporadic shelling since rightist generals seized control of Vientiane April 19, a coup the leftists warned might rekindle the flames of civil war.

Poverty Program Changes Seen

WASHINGTON (AP)—The administration was advised by Rep. Adam C. Powell, D-N.Y., Tuesday to expect some changes in its anti-poverty program as it goes through Congress.

Powell is chairman of the House Education and Labor Committee, which wound up hearings Tuesday on the \$962.5-million package. The group starts working out a bill Thursday.

A home run by centerfielder Bob Maniere in the thirteenth inning gave the Spartan baseball team a 5-4 victory over the University of Detroit Tuesday afternoon at Old College Field.

The big outfielder's blast ended a three and one half hour con-

test, which was delayed by rain and hail.

It was a tough loss for Titan relief pitcher Mike Salkowski. The little lefthander took over for starter Bill Stanforth in the eighth inning and pitched five scoreless frames before Maniere's game-winning blast.

Behind The Humor

The Freedom Singers who appeared at the Auditorium Monday call their freedom songs the backbone in the civil rights movement but those who laughed with Negro comedian Dick Gregory at the benefit show learned that humor is the heart in the struggle.

In a day when sacred cows limit most comedians to jokes about their mothers-in-law, Gregory pokes sharp wit at everyone from moderate Southern whites, to Northern liberals, to Negroes themselves, including Martin Luther King, Jr., Malcolm X and Cassius Clay.

Religious groups did not escape Gregory's gibes and he even threw in a few mother-in-law jokes for good measure.

Those in the audience who had never heard Gregory before were undoubtedly surprised every time he made hamburger out of those sacred cows and undoubtedly they were surprised at their own laughter and applause.

But there was more to the jokes and jibes than entertainment. What the Freedom Singers said about their songs applies to Gregory's quips:

"We're not up here to entertain you. We're here to tell you a story--a very bitter story, one some of you may not want to accept."

Education Paradox

"The United States has an open door policy for higher education available to all those who want it."

"The school dropout could be the salvation of American education. For it is here in relation to the education of the culturally deprived that education is tested, and the test has not been passed."

These two statements, one by a distinguished British educator speaking at Michigan State and one by an MSU educator speaking in Houston, point up a major difficulty in appraising American education.

There is always a need for system, and when there are as many obvious flaws in the system as there are in education today, that need is urgent and not to be denied. The praise of educators from other countries is nice to hear, but presents the danger of complacency and smugness.

To Sir Eric Ashby, master of Clare College of Cambridge University, American schools look

Whites and Negroes both laughed at a Gregory joke:

"I dig football--it's the only place where a Negro can chase a white man and 40,000 people stand up and cheer."

But later he added: "For the past 50 years, the Big Ten schools have produced the nation's greatest athletes and 99.9 per cent of them have been Negro. But you can't find a Negro coach in the Big Ten and you don't see Negroes officiating any games. A Negro All-American couldn't get a job coaching if it wasn't for the Negro Southern schools."

He joked about schools:

"I read an article in the paper about the dean of Clemson University who said he'd admit students if they met the entrance requirements, whether the students were black, white or green. Hell if I'm going to send my kid to school with the Jolly Green Giant."

Later he talked about the Negro ghettos in the North and de facto segregation of schools.

Those who listened to Gregory Monday laughed. Those who heard a man struggling to have every tenth American accepted as an equal--for what lies beneath his pigmentation--heard more than humor.

Members of the team are Robert E. Greene, Knoxville, Tenn., senior; Stephen E. Crick, Jr., Livonia junior; and William A. Webb, Wyckoff, N.J., sophomore. Greene and Crick were in the top five in individual competition among the 1,260 students entered in the contest.

"It's a good deal if the kid's not cheated, and if State can give a good education to a kid with this kind of intelligence," Dick Coffey, Royal Oak sophomore, commented.

A former Republican representative, George W. Sallade, Monday announced his intention to seek the Democratic candidacy for one of the eight posts on the State Board of Education.

Under the new constitution members for the State Board of Education are nominated at party conventions and elected at large

for varying terms up to eight years.

The board is designed as a general planning and coordinating body for all public education, including higher education, and will advise the legislature on the financial requirements of these institutions.

Sallade said he was announcing his candidacy at this time because very few people were aware of the fact that these posts were to be elective.

Four other education posts will be on the November ballot—two each for the Board of Trustees for Michigan State and Wayne State University.

The new constitution increased the number of Michigan State trustees by two. The two seats were filled by appointment by the governor but the two trustees must now stand for election to retain their positions.

Tony O'Donnell, returning to play after a week's absence, also went to three sets to defeat his opponent. O'Donnell topped Mike Goodrich 6-1, 1-6, 6-3. Number

three man Dwight Shelton won it two sets, 6-3, 6-0.

The rest of the Spartans' singles squad, Charlie Wolff and Dave Click, also won in two sets each. Wolff defeated Mike Rosender 6-1, 6-2, while Click won over Glenn Sykes 6-2, 6-2.

In the only doubles match played, the number three doubles team of Mike Youngs and Laird Warner stopped the Broncos 6-1, 7-5. The two remaining doubles matches were cancelled because of rain.

The MSU netters will make their first home appearance of the season on May 8, when they play host to Iowa, Illinois and Michigan.

Last year the tennis team posted a 17-4 mark and finished fourth in the Big Ten. The team also finished in a four-way tie for sixth place nationally in the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) meet. This year the NCAA championships will be held on campus in mid-June.

The Spartans finished third in the Big Ten indoor meet, but Dittrich said he thinks indoor performances do not necessarily serve as the best indication as to what will happen outdoors.

MSU ran into injury problems from time to time during the indoor campaign with miler Dick Sharkey missing most of the season with an injured leg.

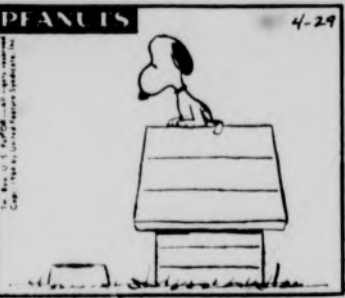

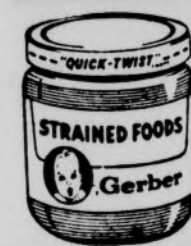
