# Bishop, Governor Ask Law To Change Prayer Decision 'In God We Trust' **Urged For Schools**

WASHINGTON P - A Roman Catholic bishop and the governor of Alabama called on Congress Thursday to overrule the Supreme Court and permit prayers in the public schools.

Bishop Fulton J. Sheen, Auxiliary bishop of the New York archdiocese, left to the House judiciary committee, before which he appeared, the means by which such an end could be reached. He suggested that the "perfect prayer" for use in school would be simply the words "in God we

trust," which appear on the official seal of the United States. Harris Set Gov. George C. Wallace of Alabama, however, urged enactment of a constitutional amendment To Alter that would undo the Supreme Court's decisions banning official prayers and required Bible Cabinet reading in public schools. This would require ratification

# Student Gives Version Of Shiawassee Arrest

"Guilty until proven innocent," says Lloyd Thurston, Sarnia, Ontario, junior about the attitude of the two Shiawassee County Justices of the Peace.

Thurston, the one student who pleaded not guilty to the charge of aiding and abetting to the delinquency of a minor, spent last Sunday and Monday in jail.

He said that arresting officers claimed that it was not necessary for him to have purchased any liquor to be guilty of the charge and that as long as he was drinking with someone under age he was guilty of aiding and abett-

"They were assuming I knew everyone at the party," said Thurston, "but I only knew one person there.'

Thurston, 21, said that he avoided being caught in the raid by driving his car to the other side of the field. He said that police didn't enter the field, but had waited for the students to come out.

Thurston had remained with his car but said four other persons with him had escaped by going through a swamp, It was approximately 2 a.m., he said, when a police cruiser, as it was

Thurston described the police as being extremely rude and said they bullied the students. He said that one officer was going to handcuff him as he was getting

"The raid was not planned in advance," he said. "We received a complaint between 10 and 10:30 p.m. Saturday night and started making arrests at about 11 p.m."

At first he maintained that the rooms in which the students

waited for arraignment were not overcrowded and then said they may have been overcrowded for a brief period. Some students had charged that the sheriff's men had fired several shots in the air when a car they had hailed failed to stop. He said

he had no knowledge that any shots were fired. Students also complained that hey were not allowed to call their dorms, parents or legal counsel.

The 'Right' Atmosphere

Mass arrests of 111 college students, most of them from MSU. at "grassers" last weekend has prompted a Detroit legislator to call for a committee investigation of state alcohol law violations at state-supported schools.

Rep. Daniel W. West wants a committee, with power to administer oaths, subpoena witnessess and examine books and records, to answer some questions.

"I want to know what the students are trying to prove," he said. "I want to know who is behind this. I want to know who is supplying the liquor and why."

It seems a little unnecessary to form a state governmental committee to answer these questions or to handle liquor law violations.

In answer to West's questions, we ask in return, what anyone-student or even legislator -- is trying to prove by drinking at a party? We doubt that there is a plot or conspiracy behind the "grassers" -- the students, like older brothers and sisters and parents, often get together and decide to have a party. And the Shiawassee county police and justices of the peace don't seem to need any help from Lansing in handling the violations. Civil laws already on the books have proved adequate to cover the situation, to a tune of over \$3,000 in fines.

None of these perennial spring "grassers" have occurred on state-supported campuses--for the obvious reason that campus police and administrations are as deft as the Shiawassee sheriff in mowing down these parties.

West has indicated that the committee would go further than checking college drinking parties, into investigation of married living units and off-campus hous-

The proposed investigation and another statement by West, that "these recent shocking events and violations are much like the episodes publicized at Harvard recently," hint at an "immorality hunt" on college campuses, and strongly echo the hysteria of the "Red hunts" of the McCarthy investigations 10 years ago.

# Conscience Head Objects To Stand

Point of View ----

Editor's note: John P. Dellera, Huntington, N.Y. sophomore, is the editor of "Conscience," the Michigan State Conservative Club newsletter.

The word was passed April 27 that the State News does not like conservatism. This was not especially surprising, judging from similar suggestions in previous editorials, but seldom has the job been done with quite as much passion as was in "The Word is Passed."

The representation of conservative positions--which, we must

assume, was more than merely a caricature--would be befitting of nothing but silence if it were not common among journalistic and alleged scholarly groups; but, unfortunately, the distortions and fabrications are common and the preferred course cannot always be followed. Thus, as much as it is tasteless to dignify such rantings with an answer, we feel impelled to respond.

There can be no question but that we are "proud of our ancient heritage" and that we agree with Edmund Burke that "people will not look forward to posterity, who never look backward to their an-

The sentiment has been expressed many times and by many fine minds, and, the essence of rationality, it deserves more than the intemperate slight with which you honor it.

But the more insipient remarks follow, and they might be comic if the issues were of less consequence or the author possessed of less opportunity to know the truth.

### Opposed To Extreme Measures

Conservatives are hardly "opposed to helping the poor out of their plight," but are most strongly opposed to extreme measures which presume to know what conditions people should or should not be in, which accept what Russell Kirk recently described as "loss of manliness, loss of freedom, loss of variety and profound boredom" for material benefits usually not needed and generally unsuccessful, and which measures are, from the outset, more political baiting than

The solution to the state of poverty in this country lies, then, not in an emotional "war on poverty" but in a realistic assessment of the problem, encouragement of local efforts at alleviation through corporate ventures, and increased mobility of the poverty-stricken 1. as a later recourse.

Conservatives, also, are not "opposed to organized groups campaigning for rights guaranteed under our Constitution." Prominent conservatives have long been instrumental in achieving civil rights and human rights for minority groups.

Barry Goldwater, an honorary member of the NAACP and a member of the Urban League, has long been at the forefront of the rights movement in Arizona. Richard Durant of Detroit, described as "sometimes Bircher," has been constantly active in the local NAACP in effecting solutions to Negro problems.

### Final Charge Baseless

Finally, similarly baseless is your charge that conservatives are "opposed to allowing underdeveloped areas to exercise their rights to freedom because they may make some mistakes in the process."

Recent evidence indicates that the natives of the Congo, after much bloodshed and misery, are eager for increased Belgian guidance as they seek escape from a freedom they are incapable of managing. The natives of New Guinea, some of whom had to be warned by helicopter-dropped leaflets recently not to "eat the candidates," likewise desire renewed influence by their former mother country, Netherlands.

Obviously, these people, illiterate and many still savage, were incapable of taking part in any such election determining national destiny as was forced upon them by the U.N. and a few extreme no tionalists. The New Guineans, in fact, were denied their inherent right to choose their political future when the United Nations in effect presented the area to Indonesia after a mock plebiscite.

Admittedly, these are "inhumane" and "irrational" views. But in your topsy-turvy world of twisted reason, inhumanity and irrationality are obviously good. We go even so far astray as to present our views to a voluntary audience; free from the forced subsidies sustaining other opinion centers.

Edwin B. Fitzpatrick, assistant director of the placement bureau, said there are certain types of jobs which require security clearances.

"In defense jobs which require security clearances from the government, an arrest for anything but a minor parking violation can practically disqualify a person," he said. "Even if a person does not need a security clearance when he is hired, he may not get a job if an arrest would prevent him from receiving a security clearance at some future date.

Fitzpatrick has been an interviewer for two firms holding defense contracts.

"There are some cases when we would actually hire a person, with his employment contingent on security clearance from the government. If the clearance

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




