Troopers Seal Off Rebels

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (UPI)--A U.S. Marine was killed by sniper fire early Monday in new U.S. troop movements aimed at enforcing a shaky cease-fire in the Dominican civil war.

It was the fifth confirmed combat death of an American serviceman in the bitter street fighting of the past nine days. One other death related to allied operations occurred when a Navy man fell from a ship. At least 43 other servicemen have been wounded in combat.

The new American casualty came as paratroopers drove three miles across the heart of the city to further pin down armed leftwing civilians in a corner of the new capital. At the same time, Marines extended their "international refuge zone" by three blocks, to Avenida Mexico, where most of Santo Domingo's 22 foreign embassies are located.

The renewed sniping followed the shaky cease-fire ordered in Santo Domingo Saturday night. The action occurred less than two blocks from the beleaguered American Embassy where the sentry was on advanced post patrol duty.

The paratroop push across the Duarte Bridge, linking Santo Domingo to the San Isidro Airbase, expanded to a corridor of U.S. forces through the rebel-infested old city. It sealed off armed leftwing civilians in a small corner of old Santo Domingo.

While the Army troops moved into the American Embassy zone, a Marine company in armored troop carriers moved three blocks away from the embassy to a point on Avenida Mexico, where most of the other 21 foreign embassies are located.

A high American official said the combined military push had the full approval of the peace mission sent into Santo Domingo Sunday by the Organization of American States (OAS). The OAS mission agreed, the official said, that opening an armed corridor across the lawless section of the city was necessary to move in food and medical supplies urgently needed by the populace.

Quake In Central America Kills 43, Injures Over 300

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (UPI)--A killer quake jolted this Central American capital and two neighboring towns before dawn Monday. Government officials said 43 persons perished and about 300 were injured.

Some unofficial estimates were higher. Many homes were destroyed and at least 4,000 were damaged. The quake cracked part of the runway of San Salvador's airport and damaged the new multi-million dollar terminal building.

Casualties and damage were heaviest in San Marcos and Santo Tomas, southeast of this city. The quake apparently centered in that area.

The government ordered withdrawal of citizens from those two towns as further shocks developed later in the day. One tremor shook the region at 9:02 a.m. and another at noon. The official residence of U.S. Ambassador Raul Castro suffered about \$35,000 damage. A

Women's Co-ops Discussed

Finances would be the major problem in starting women's cooperative living units, an exploratory committee decided Monday.

The committee of men's co-op advisers, students, and administration also discussed methods of supervision and continuity of membership without making specific recommendations.

"Women's co-ops are the one type of living unit not available now," said Gerry Sell, Bethesda, Md., junior.

"A co-op would be more than just a place to live," she explained. "It would provide experience in mature living with 30 other coeds."

A financially stable house would need around 30 members, the committee suggested.

About 25 students, mostly freshmen and sophomores, have expressed interest in a co-op, Miss Sell said.

Women's co-ops were closed here in 1956 for financial reasons. Vanhoosen hall, an individual apartment-type living unit, was then built as an intermediary between dormitory and co-op living.

Klan Member Trial Begins

HAYNEVILLE, Ala. (UPI)--The trial of a Ku Klux Klansman on charges of murdering Detroit civil rights worker Mrs. Viola Liuzzo got under way today with the defense predicting an acquittal.

"I believe the outcome will be in our favor," said Klan attorney Matt Murphy before entering the courtroom of 2nd Circuit Judge T. Werth Thagard.

A 70 man panel, including one elderly Negro, was summoned for the trial of 21-year-old Colie Leroy Wilkins.

3,500 Paratroops Move Into Viet Nam

SAIGON (UPI)--A 3,500 man brigade of U.S. Army paratroops will land in South Viet Nam "within the next few days," it was officially announced Monday. It is the first unit of Army combat soldiers to be committed to the war.

A joint statement by the U.S. Embassy and the South Vietnamese government said the paratroops are being dispatched "to press the war effort against the Viet Cong more vigorously."

A spokesman for U.S. military headquarters here reported that 1,000 American soldiers and three additional companies of U.S. Army helicopters were landed in South Viet Nam during the weekend as part of the military buildup.

There are already about 31,000 American servicemen in South Viet Nam, including almost 10,000 Marines at the U.S. airbase near Da Nang.

Advance elements of the paratroop unit, the 173rd Airborne based on Okinawa, arrived Monday, the joint announcement said. About 60 men were involved in the initial group.

The paratroops will be assigned to defend the Bien Hoa air base just north of Saigon and the Vung Tau air base and seaport complex 40 miles southeast of the capital.

The Bien Hoa air base is one of the key installations in the American and South Vietnamese military structure.

Last Nov. 1, Communist guerrillas carried out devastating mortar attack on the base, destroying five B-57 jet bombers and damaging 15 other B-57s, four U.S. helicopters and three Vietnamese air force Skyraider fighter-bombers.

Viet Meeting At Beaumont

Group Claims U.S. Crimes

A return to the 1954 Geneva agreements was urged Monday afternoon by members of the MSU Committee for Peace in Viet Nam at an open forum near Beaumont Tower.

Bret Wakefield, Loudenville, N.Y., sophomore, charged the United States is guilty of war crimes in Viet Nam.

If the United States were ever

called to account for its crimes in Viet Nam, he said, President Johnson, Secretary of Defense McNamara and McGeorge Bundy could be prosecuted for these crimes.

He gave a detailed list of international agreements that he said had been violated by the United States in Viet Nam. He cited "crimes" such as poisoned rice paddies, streams and wells, and described the damage done by some of the shells and bullets used by U.S. troops.

"We have bombed them with-

out concrete evidence that they had attacked us," Wakefield said. Reinhard Mohr, Lansing senior and chairman of the committee, quoted a Detroit Free Press editorial which called for a return to the Geneva pact.

Paul Schiff, New Rochelle, N.Y., graduate student, said that some right-wingers would support any anti-Communist government, no matter how deplorable its methods of governing.

"We do not hold to this," he said. "We can't have anti-Communism as our first and only principle."

The Geneva agreements were violated first by the United States, said Brian Kelleher, East Lansing junior. President Eisenhower sent a mission to help the South Vietnamese army the November following the convention.

After four speeches were given to the crowd of 150 spread out on the grass, several students participated in the rebuttals.

If the United States gets out of Viet Nam and the country is reunited, how do we know the country will not go under Communist control, asked one student.

George Agas, Dayton, Ohio, graduate student, received loud applause when he voiced support for U.S. policy.

MSU Contributing To World Scene

Agreeing with Toynbee that "our age will be remembered because it is the first generation since the dawn of history to believe it practical to make the

benefits of civilization available to the whole human race," Homer Higbee, assistant dean of international programs, analyzed the MSU exchange program recently.

Higbee said the present day international community undoubtedly lives, moves and has its being in a world which is interdependent in every respect, and MSU is contributing its share toward this end. He was confident of MSU's role "in the increasingly significant dialogue between the emerging nations of the world and American universities."

Giving a resume of the foreign student program on the campus, Higbee gave a five-point analysis of the past activities and assessed the areas which seem to require major attention during the coming years.

1. Work with foreign students is more an extension of and complement to the traditional job of a dean of students. MSU conducts a systematized orientation program so that, either individually or in groups, the students are beneficially introduced to the requirements of the campus.

2. The University helps the steadily increasing number of graduate students, many of whom are already in the middle ranks of professional life in their home countries, operate more comfortably under new conditions. It studies their problems and

Pulitzer Prizes Awarded

NEW YORK (UPI)--The Philadelphia Bulletin and the Wall Street Journal Monday were awarded Pulitzer Prizes for international and national reporting.

The two prizes were among seven distinguished journalism awards announced by President Grayson Kirk of Columbia University. They were selected by the university trustees on recommendation of an advisory board.

The Hutchinson, Kan. News was awarded the gold medal Pulitzer for meritorious public service in recognition of its fight against the enemies of legislative reapportionment.

Other journalism awards went to the Houston Post, the Gainesville, Fla. Daily Sun, The Associated Press, and the Hungry Horse News, a weekly in Columbia Falls, Mont.

In the arts categories, playwright Frank D. Gilroy won the Pulitzer Prize in drama for his play, "The Subject Was Roses." Shirley Ann Grau's novel, "The Keepers of the House," received the fiction award and the history prize went to Irwin Unger for "The Greenback Era."

The poetry prize was given to John Berryman for "77 Dream Songs," and Ernest Samuels received the biography award for his three-volume study, "Henry Adams."

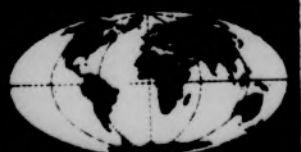


PANORAMIC VIEW--The Red Cedar, which is back in use, provides an ideal subject for the special pan-camera which gives a wide angle view of the river.

**Baseball, As Seen From The Dugout**

The Rockne-type bellowing that personifies a football coach trying to rouse his team to victory for Ol' Tech, or the incessant sideline animation that characterizes basketball coaching, are without their counterparts in today's college baseball.

An informal seriousness replaces the high-tension pressures of the fall and winter sports.

It's not that baseball coach Danny Litwhiler doesn't charge from the Michigan State dugout to dispute a close call. He does. It's not that he is any less interested in his team's success than his colleagues on the grid-iron or hardwood.

It's just that constable situations arise less and baseball, being a slower sport, doesn't have the intense pressure throughout the game but rather in isolated points during the contest.

The players sit in the dugout cracking jokes, flitting the opposing pitcher or encouraging the batter if he wears the green and white State uniform.

"Come on Bone-man," yells Litwhiler, as Bruce Pettibone steps into the batter's box.

"Good glove, Spot," choruses the bench when Jerry Walker steps a rally with a good play at second base.

"Hey rubber-arm, it's gittin' kinda hot, ain't it," chirps pitcher Jim Goodrich as the opposing pitcher walks a batter.

Between pitches the shouts and cries pour from the dugout, but



a silence settles for the split-second trip the baseball takes from pitcher's mound to the plate.

It starts again as soon as the umpire makes his call or the batter hits the ball.

Players shuffle around the dugout and, in between yells or jeers, exchange tales with each other.

"Hey, Skip, shouldn't Biedenbach play over a little more for that left-handed batter?" questions a reserve infielder.

"Naw, he's OK," answers Litwhiler, but seeing left fielder Bobby Speer playing too deep, signals him in closer.

He then calls for first baseman Howie Miller to move a bit closer to the line.

"This guy is a good hitter and pulls the ball. Be alert out there, gang."

Litwhiler isn't the type of coach who criticizes a player openly for his mistake but is one of the first to congratulate the same person for a good play.

When Pettibone ran into the dugout after striking out against Central Michigan, Litwhiler met him on the dugout steps with some advice and encouragement.

"When you strike out, don't run back to the dugout, walk and hold your head high. You'll get him next time."

Spartan tennis players have found a niche at the midpoint of a bell-shaped curve, but it's not the kind you find in a classroom.

The Spartans stand at a respectable 500 mark in the Big Ten conference match play, but they have been unable to string together two consecutive victories since the spring campaign first began.

Tennis scores, however, are often deceiving and seldom give an accurate description of a match. Although State dropped last Thursday's contest to Notre Dame, 7-2, all but two of the matches lost by MSU were close ones and could have gone either way.

"It all depends on how you feel that day," explained Laird Warner, number three singles. "We were up for the Iowa game and we beat them. Had we been up for the Notre Dame

contest, I think it might have gone the other way."

Even State's 8-1 win over Iowa last Saturday tells you little about the actual contest itself, unless individuals' performances are examined. "Most of those matches went three sets and were all close," said Coach Stan Drobnac. "We had to work for them."

Drobnac added that several State losses were "decided on paper" before the match was ever played. "One of our players occasionally comes up against a nationally-ranked player. Our boy wins the first set and is leading in the second, 5-love, and then loses the match."

"He convinced himself that he couldn't win the match even before he stepped onto the court."

"But I never want any excuses from the players," added Drobnac. "I've got a list of 145 enumerated excuses. When the players walk off the court, I just ask for the number."

**Lacrosse, Rugby Reap Harvest Of Victories**

Daffodils aren't the only things beginning to bloom in East Lansing. State's two budding clubs, lacrosse and rugby, appeared in full blossom this weekend with the sweet scent of victory.

The lacrosse team, paced by the blistering shooting of captain Steve Hearington, scored their third win of the season Saturday as they romped past the Cleveland lacrosse club, 14-0, on the home field.

Coach Neville Doherty's rugby team found the going a bit tougher in gaining its victories

in Chicago. State managed a split in Saturday's action for the Midwest Tournament trophy, beating the University of Chicago, 3-0, but dropped an 11-0 decision to Palmer College in the follow-up game.

Hearington was the big gun for the stickmen, scoring four goals and getting an assist. He stretched his goal-a-game streak to six and raised his season production to 21.

The shutout over Chicago gave the rugby club its second victory of the season.

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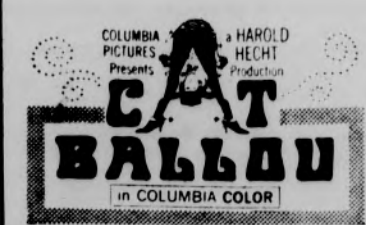

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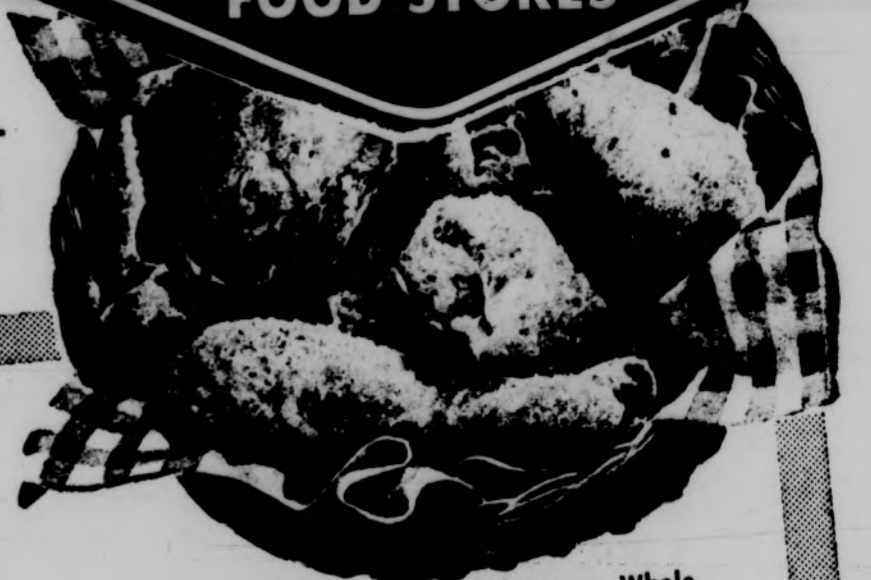
