Unfair as this graduated fee system seems, it is the result of the liberalization of the 1957-58 system. Then

the first violation cost $\$ 5$, the first violation cost $\$ 5$,
and the second resulted in a 30 -day suspension from oncampus driving. The student's permit for the academic year was revoked after the third violation.
James Tanck, Waterford, Wisc., graduate student and member of the All University traffic committee, has said any change would have to come from the committee and be approved by the trustees, a sequence of events he thinks unlikely and does not favor. "This is a good system," he said of what is one half of a double stand-
