

Housetop Serves as "Airport"

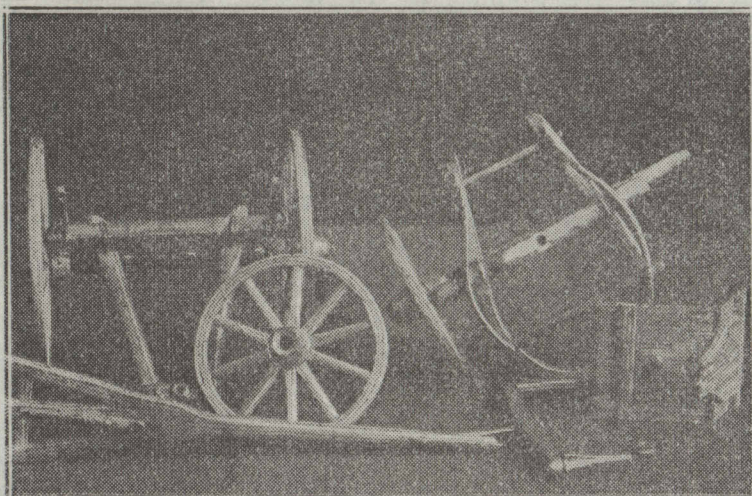

6,350 Matches Make a Model Wagon

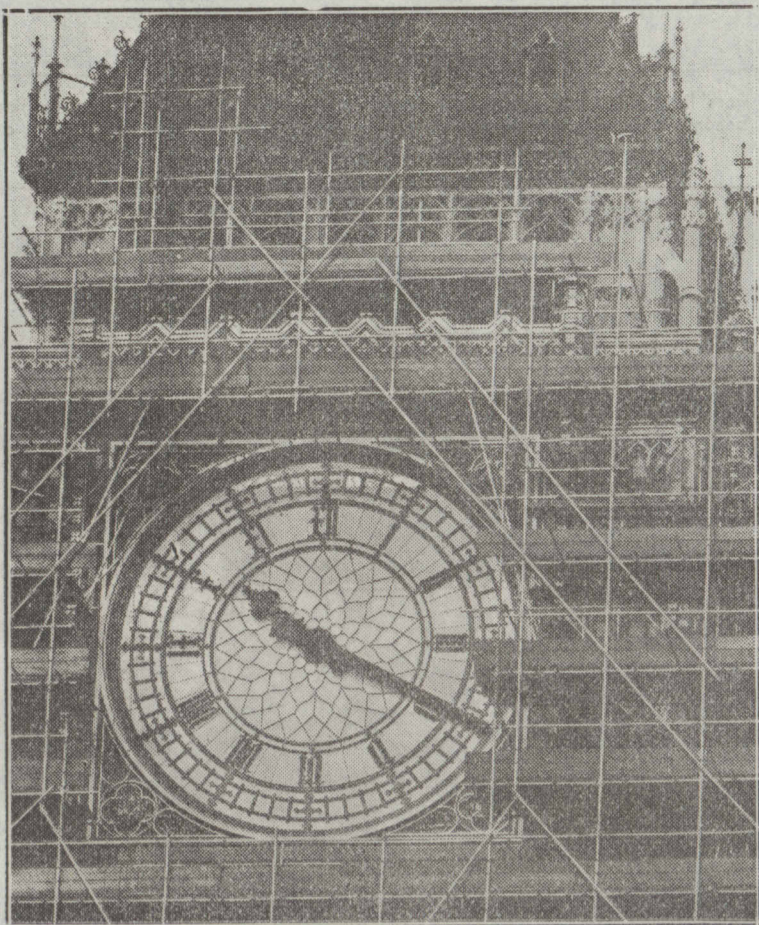


The assembled wagon, built entirely of matches by Fred Spinden of Abingdon, Ill.

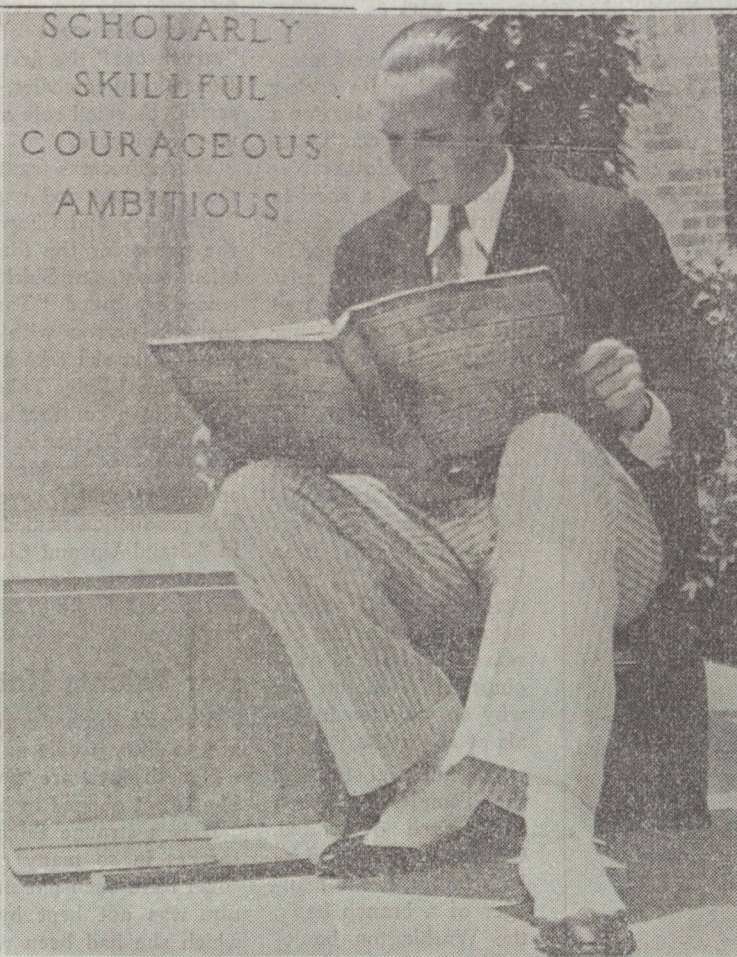

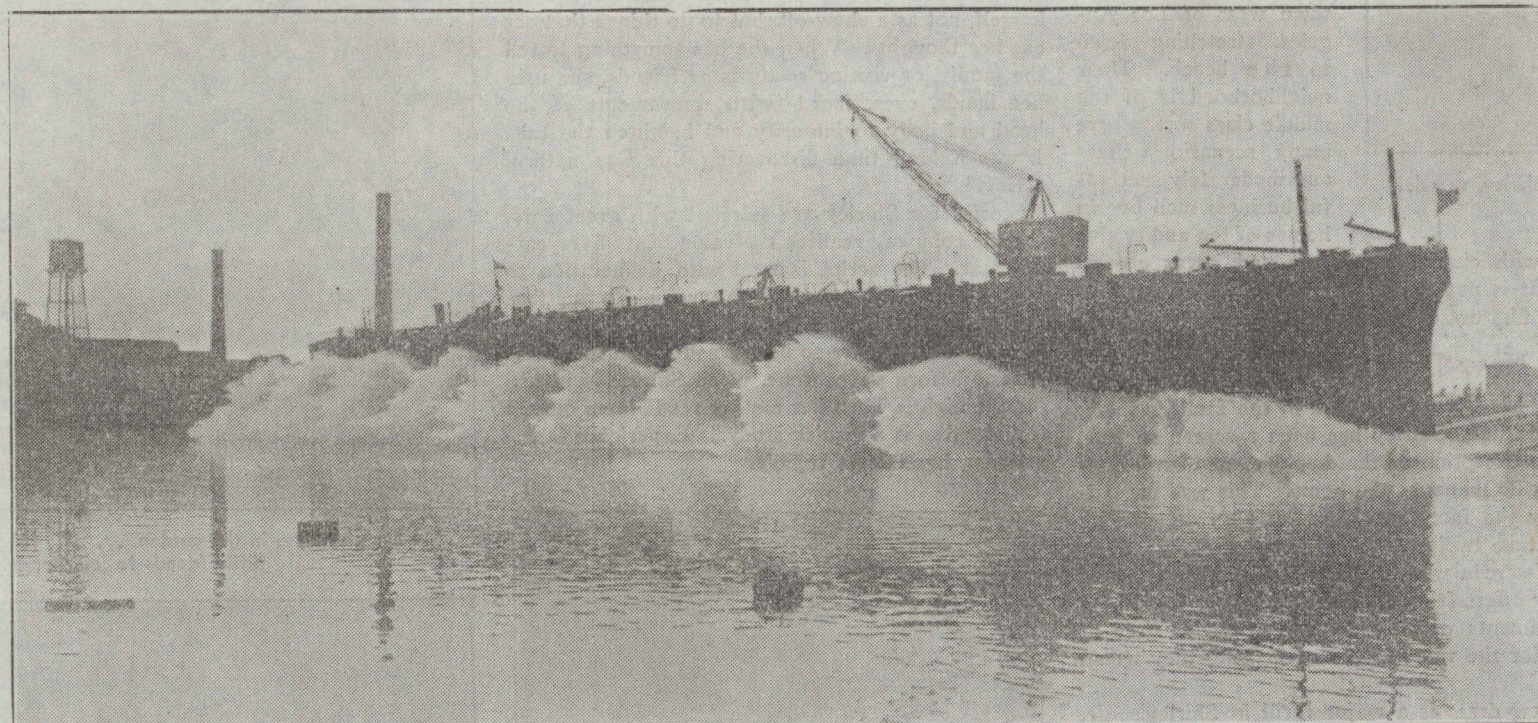
Do You Recognize Him?

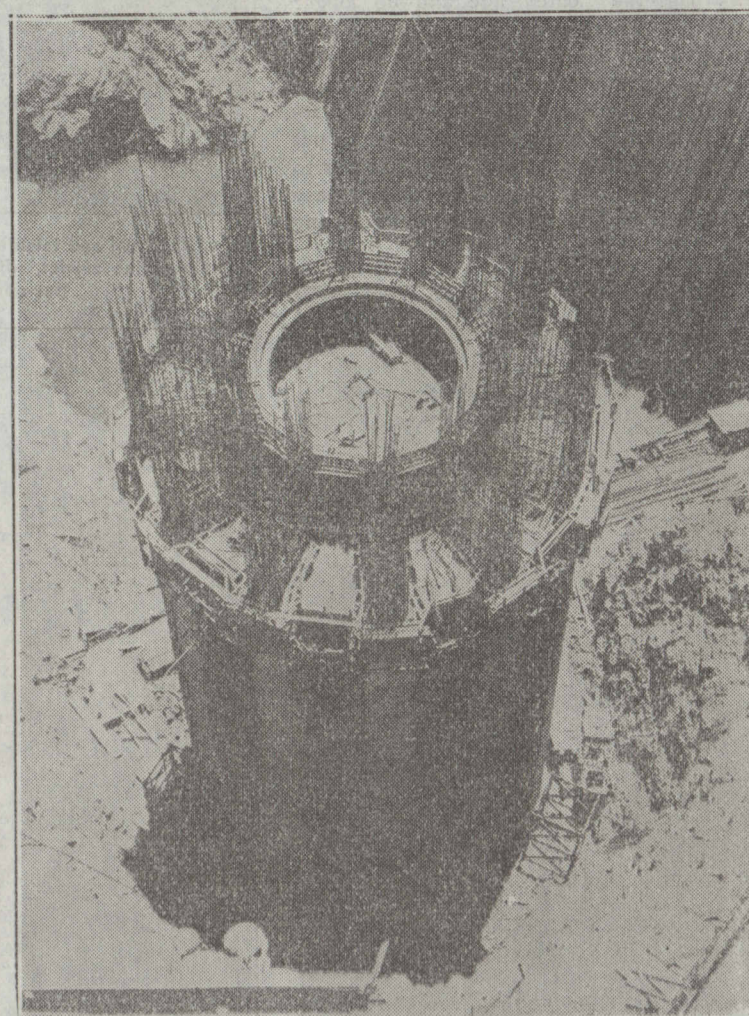

Boulder Dam Immensity

THE immensity of the federal government's Boulder dam project is illustrated to a degree by this bird's-eye view of one of the four giant intake towers, under construction on each side of the canyon, upstream from the dam. The towers, four in number, will be 380 feet high. Boulder dam is being constructed in Black canyon of the Colorado river at a cost of \$165,000,000.
