# MISPLACED FACES for solving MISPLACED FACES MOVIE STARS



CLUE: The forehead is that of a star who is an accomplished instrumentalist. (Chicagoans have seen her at Balaban & Katz Theaters.) The eyes and nose are those of a star whose last name is that of an Eastern town. The mouth and chin are those of a star in whose first name the same vowel appears more than once.



CLUE: The forehead is that of a petite Scotch lassie. (Chicagoans have seen her at Balaban & Katz Theatres.) The eyes and nose are those of a star who is 5 ft. 5 in. tall. The mouth and chin are those of a star whose first and last names contain the same number of vowels.



CLUE: The forehead is that of a dark-haired star whose eyes are blue. (Chicagoans have seen her at Balaban & Katz Theatres.) The eyes and nose are those of a star, one of whose names is also a man's name. The mouth and chin are those of a star, the initials of whose first and last names are the same.
