



CLUE: Part 1—a member of the armed forces of a monarchy whose King ntly abdicated; its naval appropriations are approximately \$300,000,000 innually. Part 2—a republic of the western hemisphere; its flag is composed of stars and stripes; its land forces at present number appromately 500,000. Part 3—a European republic of approximately 42,000,000 population; it is estimated that its active land and air forces today total pproximately 600,000 men and that, in addition, its trained reserves total more than 6,000,000.



CLUE: Part 4—during the World War the mobilized forces of this country totaled more than 4,000,000; its fighting men sometimes were referred to as "Sammies" or "Yanks." Part 5—one of the principal allies during the World War this country recently protested the military occupancy of a territory which by treaty after the World War was demilitarized. Part 6—ruling country of a great empire whose combined population is more than 495,000,000; its present combined land and air forces total


