CAN you paste pictures together? Then you are eligible to compete for the 428 big cash prizes which will be paid by the Chicago Tribune to the persons who send in the best answers to this interesting new contest.

Simply cut apart the composite pictures appearing each Sunday in the Chicago Sunday Tribune, paste them together properly and name the countries they represent.

You can start with the first two sets of pictures printed here. Then continue each Sunday until you have completed the series.

This new game will familiarize you with the defenders of various countries. From the clues beneath the pictures you will learn much about the fighting strength of various armies and navies of the world.

THE RULES:

NO EXPERIENCE NECESSARY! No special knowledge of any kind is needed to paste these pictures together and name them. Anybody can do it! Clue pictures showing and naming military or naval men of the various countries will be published each Sunday to help you identify the portraits.

WHO CAN ENTER: Every man, woman, boy and girl is eligible, regardless of residence, excepting employees of the Chicago Tribune and members of their families.

WHAT TO DO: Cut the pictures apart, assemble and paste them together. Below each picture write the name of the country it represents. . . For example, if the assembled portrait shows a member of the military or naval forces of France, write the word "FRANCE" below the portrait. If the picture portrays a member of the forces of a country which is subordinate to another, fill in only the name of the country to which the subject is directly attached.

Three pictures will appear each Sunday consecutively in the Chicago Sunday Tribune until 36 pictures have appeared. Each set of three pictures will make three complete portraits. Rough edges may be trimmed off to make perfect rectangles, if desired.

THE PRIZES: The Chicago Tribune will pay \$10,000 in cash prizes! (See Prize List.) 428 prizes totalling \$9,500 will be paid to the persons who send in the nearest correctly solved and nearest complete sets of pictures in accordance with these rules. Five special prizes of \$100 each will be paid to the five school teachers or military or naval instructors whose students submit the best entries and whose names have been placed on private and parochial schools or colleges, and instructors of any military or naval unit officially recognized by the United States or Canada, are eligible for these five special prizes.

You do not have to solve each of the pictures correctly to win. The prizes will be paid to the persons whose entries rank highest.

You do not need any special knowledge to enter this contest. Any school boy or girl, or any man or woman can do it. Note the clue pictures which are published each Sunday to help you identify the portraits.

With war clouds hovering over Europe and Asia today people throughout the world are interested in knowing more about military and naval affairs. This game is, therefore, educational and timely.

It costs nothing. Start with these two sets of pictures. Continue the series in next Sunday's Tribune.

NOTICE TO SCHOOL TEACHERS, MILITARY AND NAVAL INSTRUCTORS! HELP YOUR STUDENTS WIN!

This contest is designed to acquaint the public more thoroughly with facts pertaining to the fighting forces of the various countries. It is interesting and instructive. You are invited to help your students name the pictures.

To encourage such assistance, five special prizes of \$100 each will be awarded to the five school teachers or military or naval instructors whose students submit the best entries, as more fully set forth in the rules.

WHERE TO SEND ENTRIES: Entries may be submitted in scrap books or any other simple form. Simplicity is suggested. **DO NOT** send in pictures one at a time. Hold all until you have the complete set of 36. Then send them to: "Men Behind the Flags," Chicago Tribune, Post Office Box 1539, Chicago, Ill. All entries must be in by midnight 15 days after set No. 12 is published. No person may submit more than one entry. No entries will be returned.

JUDGING: Entries will be judged by a Committee appointed by the Chicago Tribune. Entrants agree to accept this Committee's decision as final. Accuracy in assembling and naming the pictures and neatness of entry will be the sole determining factors. In case of ties duplicate awards will be paid.

NO FEE OR CHARGE: It is not even necessary to buy the Chicago Tribune to compete. You may copy or trace the pictures. The Tribune may be examined at its offices or at public libraries free.

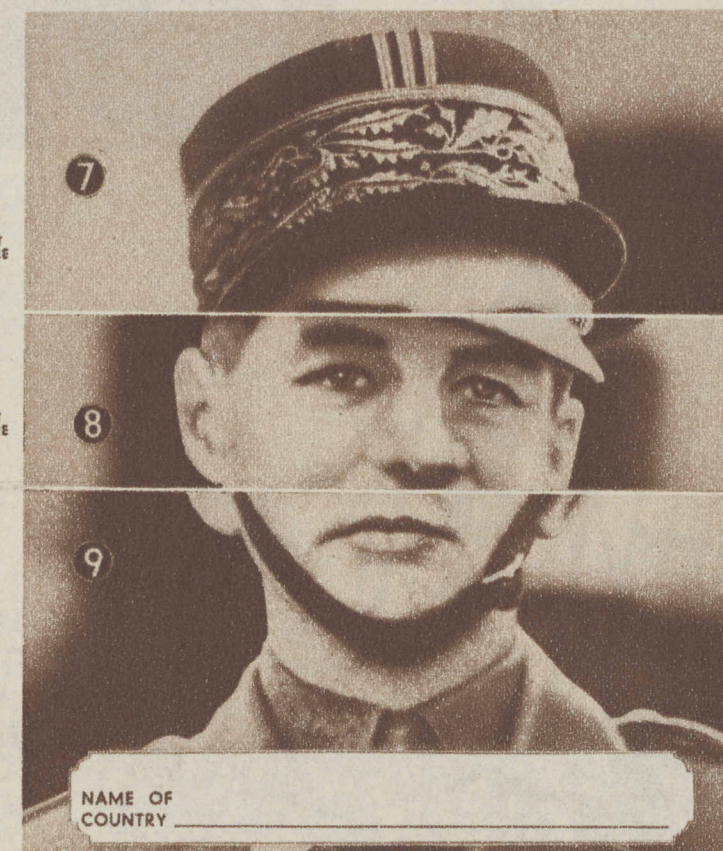
SET NO. 1



CLUE: Part 1—a member of the armed forces of a monarchy whose King recently abdicated; its naval appropriations are approximately \$300,000,000 annually. Part 2—a republic of the western hemisphere; its flag is composed of stars and stripes; its land forces at present number approximately 500,000. Part 3—a European republic of approximately 42,000,000 population; it is estimated that its active land and air forces today total approximately 600,000 men and that, in addition, its trained reserves total more than 6,000,000.

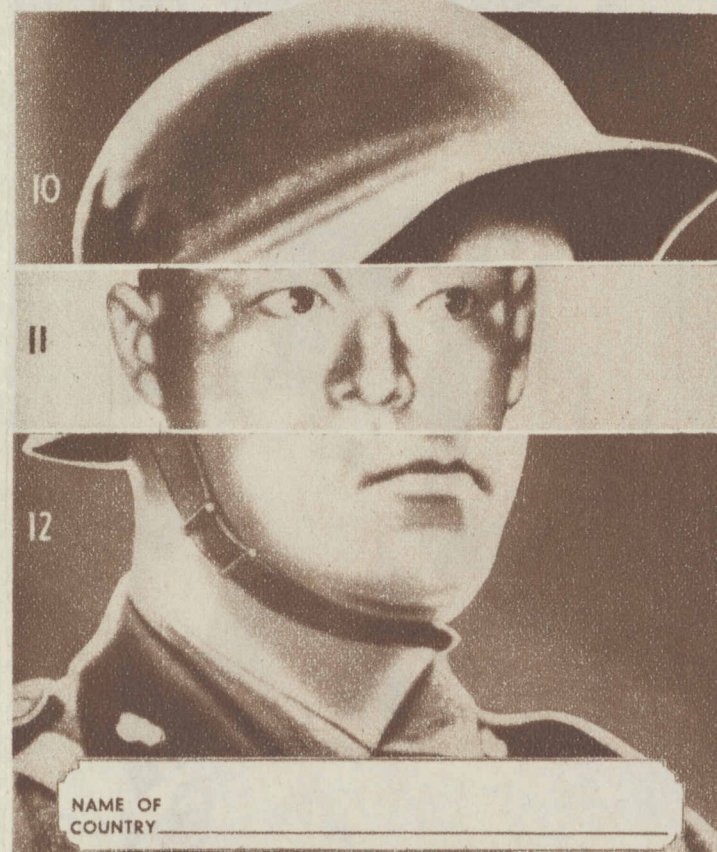


CLUE: Part 4—during the World War the mobilized forces of this country totaled more than 4,500,000; its fighting men sometimes were referred to as "dummies" or "Yanks." Part 5—one of the principal allies during the World War this country recently protested the military occupancy of a territory which by treaty after the World War was demilitarized. Part 6—ruling country of a great empire whose combined population is more than 485,000,000; its present combined land and air forces total above 1,200,000.



CLUE: Part 7—bounded on the north by a famous channel this nation has increased its naval appropriations in the past ten years from approximately \$72,000,000 annually to more than \$100,000,000. Part 8—a nation ruled by a Parliament; its air forces recently were stated to number about 45,000 men. Part 9—a country bounded on the east and west by oceans; the cost of its naval operations is approximately \$450,000,000 annually.

SET NO. 2



CLUE: Part 10—a union of seven republics whose army lately has been greatly increased; its regular army is said to exceed 1,150,000 men and its reserves 15,000,000 men. Part 11—an empire of somewhat more than 64,000,000 people in the Orient; this country has a regular army of 280,000 men and 1,895,000 trained reserves. Part 12—a country which recently conquered Ethiopia; latest figures show its active army over 1,100,000 men and reserves of more than 5,000,000.



CLUE: Part 13—this country is governed by a dictator known as Il Duce; with slightly more than 42,000,000 population, it has an air force in excess of 200,000 men and 4,400 planes. Part 14—this country formerly was ruled by a czar but has since undergone vast changes; alert to the importance of aircraft, it has one of the largest air forces in the world, stated to exceed 5,000 planes. Part 15—this country has suffered greatly from earthquakes; latest figures state its army has approximately 2,000 planes.



CLUE: Part 16—an island in the North Pacific Ocean this nation has been prominent in naval affairs for many years; its active navy is reported to number more than 100,000 men. Part 17—bounded on the east, south and west by seas, this nation dominates the Adriatic; its navy is reported to have 68 submarines, 95 torpedo boats, 24 cruisers, also other battleships. Part 18—although stretching across two continents from one sea to another, the naval strength of this country nevertheless ranks fifth in the world.
