For example, if the assembled portrait shows a member of the military or naval forces of France, write the word "FRANCE" below that portrait. 



Part 12—a country which recently onquered Ethiopia; latest figures show its active army over 1,100,000 nen and reserves of more than 5,000,000.



CLUE: Part 16-an island in the North Pacific Ocean this nation has been prominent in naval affairs for many years; its active navy is reported to number more than 100,000 men. Part 17-bounded on the east, south and west by seas, this nation dominates the Adriatic; its navy is reported to have 69 submarines, 95 torpedo boats, 24 cruisers, also other battleships. Part 18-although stretching across two continents from one sea to another the naval strength of this country nevertheless ranks fifth in the world.



CLUE: Part 25-a country in the Balkan Mountains; its capital is Sofia, a city of 213,000; he speaks the Slavonic language.

Part 26-the name of this nation begins with the same letter as the last name of the famous marshal named in the clue to Part 19.

Part 27-Bounded partly by the North Sea and the Baltic, this nation was a naval factor during the world war although its navy recently was said to contain only 1,600 officers and 31,000 men (approximately)
