All the Justices Concur, Except Haines and Meech--They Object on Legal Grounds. W. S. Carver Appointed Town-Clerk, Bernard Callaghan Collector, and W. H. B. Gray Assessor. The Ousted Frauds Will Fight to the Bitter End. OPENING COURT. THE SOUTH TOWN BOARD had a protracted session yesterday, lasting from 5 p. m. till 11 p. m., while considering the question whether or not to declare the recent town election void, and to appoint officers to fill the vacancies. The meeting was brought about through the efforts of the Committee of Twenty-five appointed at the Exposition mass-meeting, and the committee members were all in attendance. Shortly before 5 o'clock the members of the Committee left their consultation room in the Grand Pacific, and filed solemnly along LaSalle street to the ever-memorable No. 204. Entering, they found Gleason, the usurping Town-Clerk, copying out the minutes of the last Town Board meeting. He paid no attention to the visitors, not even looking up from his work. Soon afterwards Justices Summerfield, Fools, Wallace, Haines, D'Wolf, and Meech, came in, and the narrow apartment became uncomfortably crowded. Justice Summerfield called the meeting to order, and suggested that they had better adjourn to the Grand Pacific club-room, where there would be ample accommodations for the assembly. A motion to that effect was carried, despite some grumbling from Justice Meech, and the whole party adjourned to the Grand Pacific. On reassembling in the Municipal Reform club-room of the Grand Pacific the following members of the Committee of Twenty-five were present: Abram Taylor, Leonard Swett, Robert Lincoln, Ald. Spalding, Horace White, Harry Nelson, D. B. Bash, E. S. Isham, George Schneider, Thomas A. Moran, L. B. Olin, Norman Williams, C. P. Kellogg, J. G. Shortall, C. M. Henderson, and Marshall Field. After the opening of the meeting Mike Evans, Ed Phillips, and Ryan came in and took prominent seats among the spectators. Being again called to order, the Clerk read, by request of the following CALL: George A. Meech, Esq., Justice of the Peace--A: We, the undersigned members of the Board of Appointment for the appointment of town officers of the Town of South Chicago, do hereby give notice that a meeting of the Board will be held on the 15th day of April, 1876, at the office of the Town Clerk, No. 204 LaSalle street, in the City of Chicago, at 6 o'clock p. m., to consider the question whether or not to declare void the election of town officers held on the 4th day of April, 1876, in said town: One Supervisor, one Town Clerk, one Assessor, and one Collector, for said town for the year 1876, and if there was such failure to appoint, one Supervisor, one Town Clerk, one Assessor, one Collector, for said town, to serve until those officers shall be duly elected at the annual meeting to be held in said town. Dated Chicago, this 14th day of April, 1876. JUDGES: STEVE FOOT, J. P.; COLVIN D'WOLF, J. P.; J. J. McNEIL, J. P.; JOSEPH POLAK, J. P.; J. CHARLES HAINES, J. P. At the last meeting of citizens, the subject of the recent South Town election and the South Town officers was referred to a committee of thirty-five, of which I am elected Chairman, and, after full consultation and examination of the subject, we understand the law in every respect, and we deem it our duty to call attention to the object upon which we wish you to take into consideration and act is stated in this petition. It is in the handwriting of Mr. Horace White, and I would ask him to read it. Mr. White stepped to the front and read the following PETITION: To the Board of Appointment of Town Officers of the Town of South Chicago--GENTLEMEN: A meeting of citizens was held at the Exposition Building, on Tuesday evening, April 11, to consider one of the most alarming evils that can possibly threaten free institutions, viz: the falsification of elections. This meeting was unprecedented in point of numbers. It represented all shades of political sentiment, and embodied the nearly unanimous determination of your fellow-citizens to defend at all hazards their right of choosing public officers in the manner prescribed by law, and to prevent the falsification of votes by the stuffing of ballot-boxes, forging of returns, or otherwise. The immediate result of this meeting was the unanimous formation of a committee of citizens, who were appointed to meet on the first Tuesday of April, 1876, and after the ballot of the electors had been cast on that day the boxes containing the same were collected together and deposited in a vault having an iron door and a combination lock, and the same were placed in an order to put before you a clear statement of the fraud perpetrated at this place, we submit a diagram of the room containing the same.
