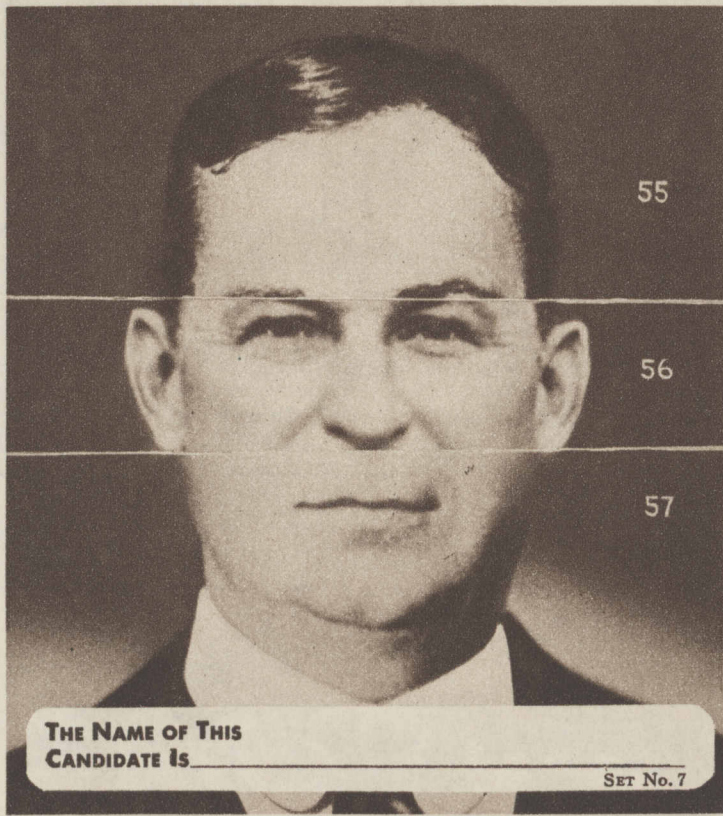

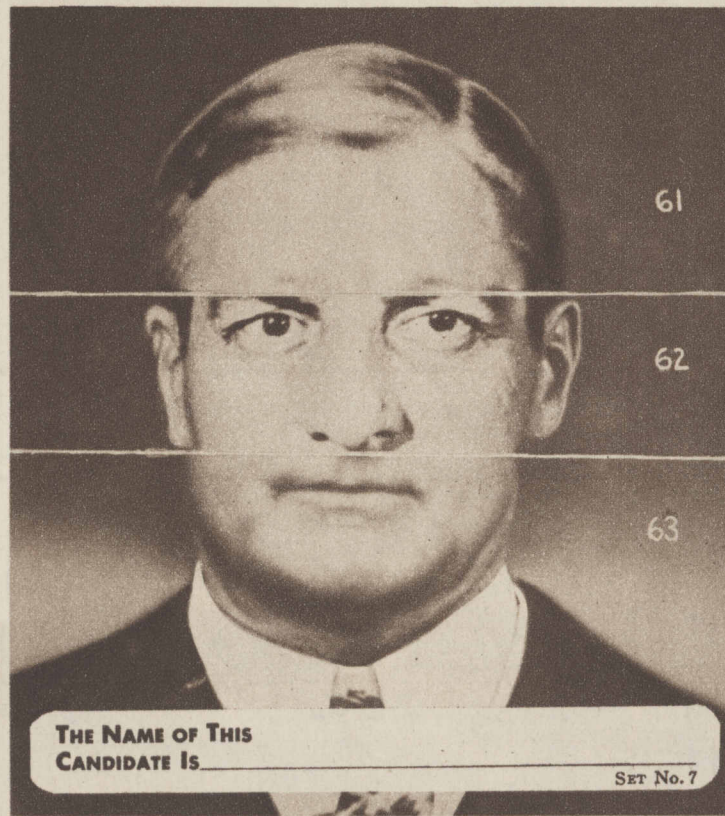

CLUE: The forehead shown in No. 55 is that of a former secretary of war. The features in No. 56 are those of a United States senator from Arkansas. The mouth and chin in No. 57 are those of another former secretary of war.

CLUE: No. 58 shows a portion of the face of the man who was the Democratic nominee for Vice-President in 1928. No. 59 depicts the eyes and nose of the man who resigned recently as governor-general of the Philippine Islands. No. 60 reveals the lower part of the face of a former mayor of Cleveland.

CLUE: In No. 61 is to be seen the upper part of the face of a widely known resident of St. Louis. In No. 62 are the eyes and nose of a man who was closely identified with President Woodrow Wilson's second administration. In No. 63 are the mouth and chin of the minority leader in the United States Senate.

THE RULES:

- Each Sunday for 10 consecutive Sundays a Set of 3 Composite Pictures of persons who have been mentioned for the Presidency of the United States will be printed in the Picture Section of the Chicago Sunday Tribune. Each set of pictures, when cut apart and assembled properly, will make complete portraits.
- You are invited to put the pictures together and name them and tell in a letter of 50 words or less which of the 30 persons you would like to see President of the United States and why. Clues will be printed beneath each Composite Picture to help you.
- The Chicago Tribune will pay \$5,000.00 in Cash Prizes to the persons who send in the best answers. See Prize List at right.

- The Composite Pictures must be cut out, assembled and pasted together. Below each picture must be written the name of the person pictured. A total of 30 pictures will be printed—3 each Sunday for 10 Sundays. NOTICE: Hold all pictures until you have the complete set of 30. Then send them to "Presidents," Chicago Tribune, Post Office Box 1539, Chicago, Ill. No entries will be returned.
- This game is open to every one—men, women, boys and girls—except employees of the Chicago Tribune and their families. It does not matter where you live. You pay nothing.
- All pictures must be in by midnight 21 days after Set No. 10 is published. Each entry must be sent by First Class Mail, postage prepaid. Entries with insufficient postage will be returned by the Post Office Department.

- Make your entry simple. Elaborate entries will receive no greater consideration than simple ones. The judging will be based upon the following:
First: Accuracy in putting the pictures together and naming them.
Second: Merit of the accompanying letter.
- You need not purchase the Chicago Tribune to compete. You may copy or trace the pictures. The Tribune may be examined at any of its offices or at Public Libraries free of charge.
- The judges will be a committee appointed by the Chicago Tribune. Entrants agree to accept their decision as final. In case of ties a duplicate award will be paid to each tying contestant.
