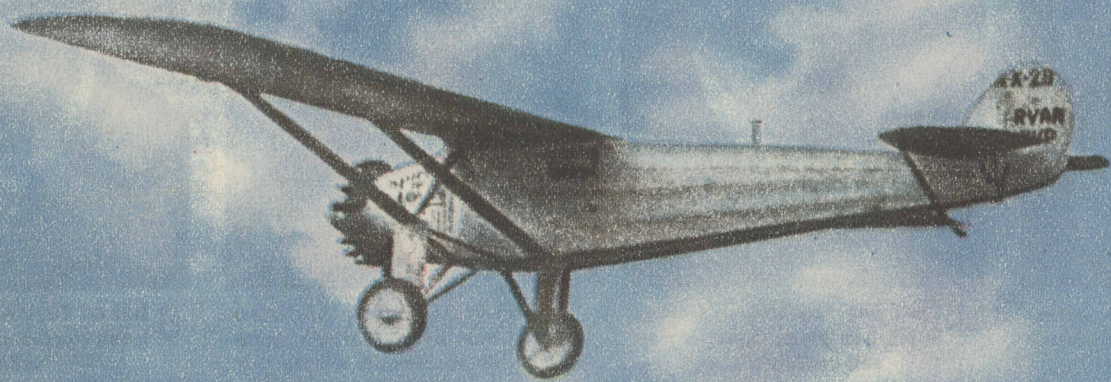

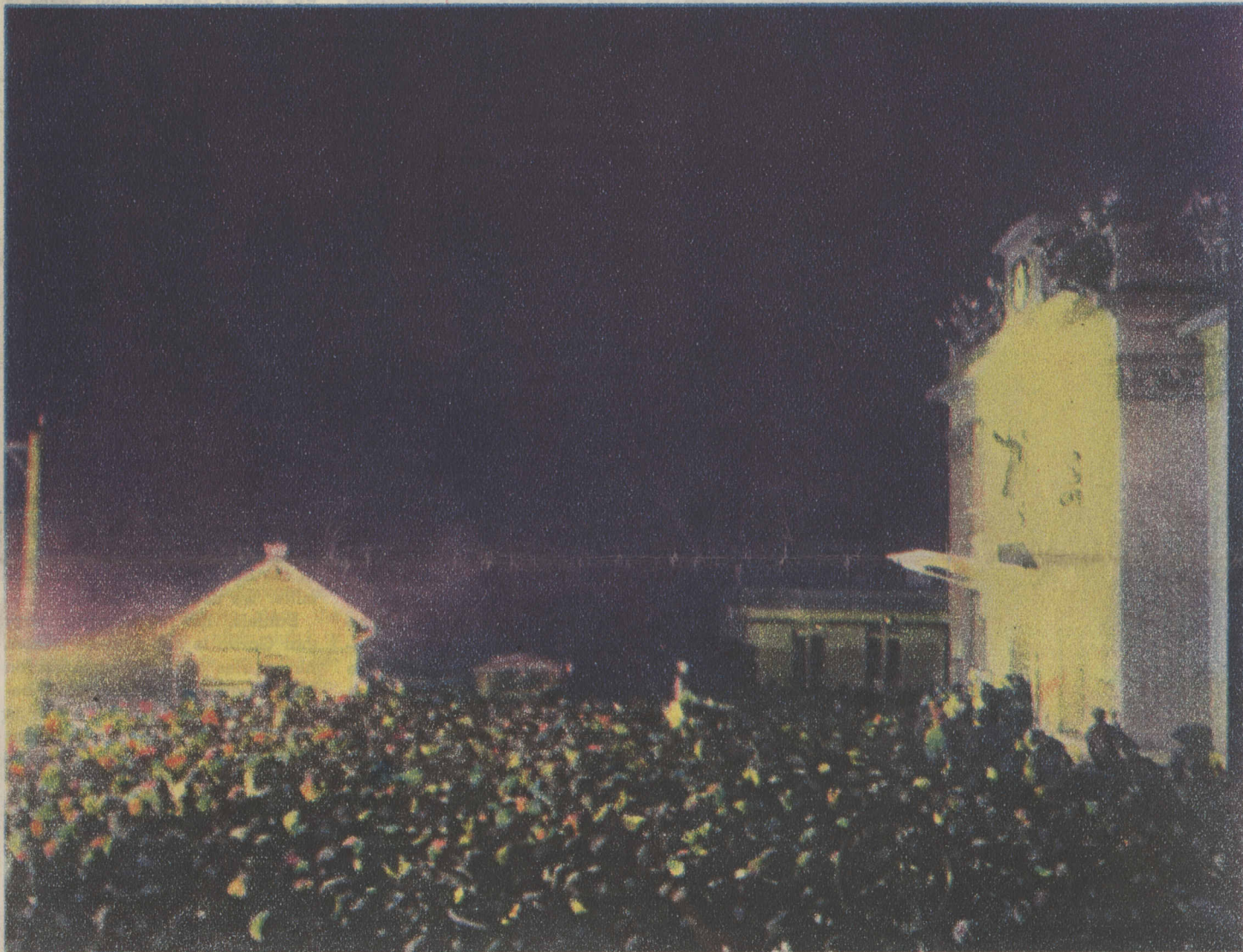

Above: Lindbergh's plane as it appeared on the morning of May 20, 1927, winging its way from New York with Paris as its goal. (Acme photo.)

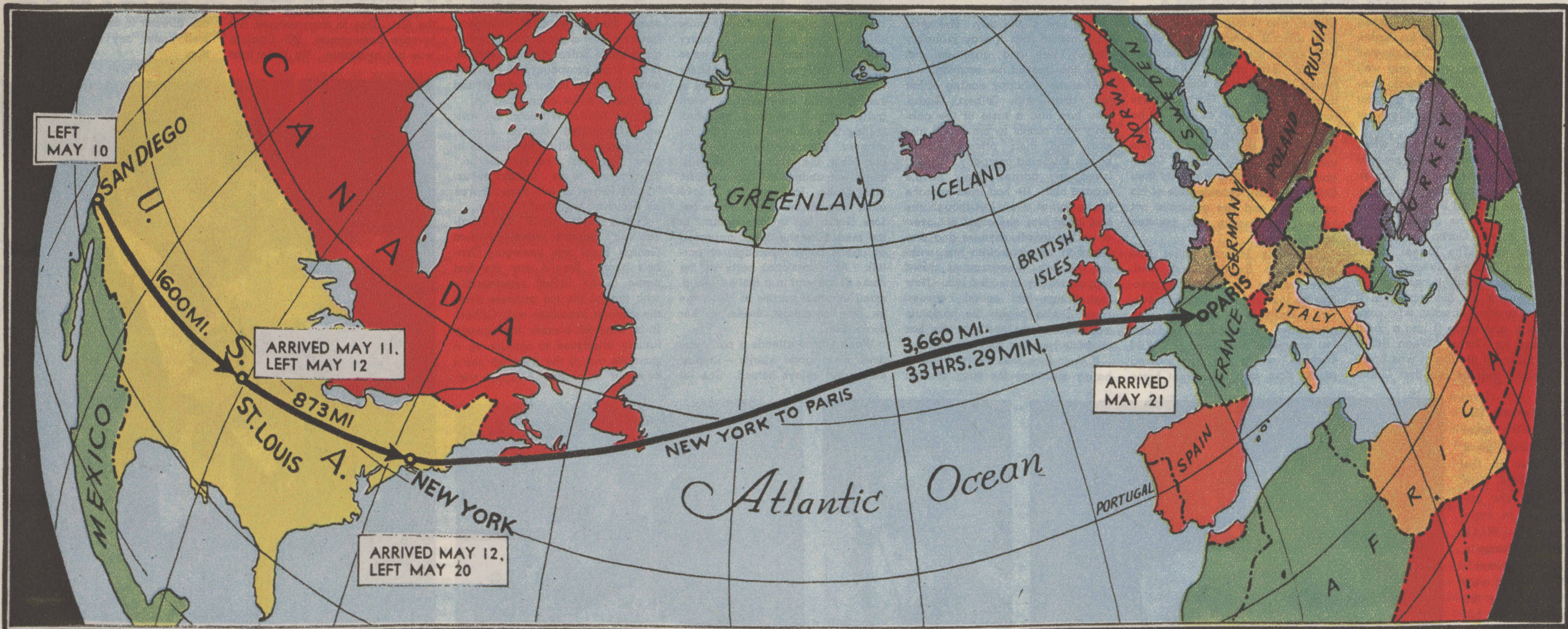
At right: Charles A. Lindbergh of ten years ago, when he boldly flew the Atlantic without a companion and without the assistance of radio.

Lindy's Epic Flight Ten Years Ago

TEN years ago next Friday Charles A. Lindbergh dropped down from the sky in his monoplane, "The Spirit of St. Louis," onto Le Bourget airfield, near Paris, 33 hours and 29 minutes out of New York, completing the first non-stop flight between the United States and a European country, and establishing himself as one of the greatest of modern celebrities.
