

ALL AVAILABLE TRANSIT READY FOR CENTENNIAL

Special Routing Planned on Carriers

The vast mass transportation agencies of Chicago and were mobilized in combination with the city's boulevard system last night in readiness for the huge number of spectators expected to surge into Burnham Park today for THE TRIBUNE'S centennial show.

Hundreds of police guides were prepared to direct motorists to parking places within sight of Northerly Island, the stage for the performance. All available buses, street cars, "L" trains, and taxis will be on the roll to serve the several hundred thousand persons park authorities anticipate will begin to assemble on the lake front long before the show's 3 p. m. opening event.

Plans of Carriers
These are the arrangements made by the mass carriers:

SURFACE CARS—Roosevelt rd. and Cermak rd. cars will go directly to terminals near Soldiers' field. Riders on intersecting north and south lines may transfer to either Roosevelt rd. or Cermak rd. cars, but the company suggests that the Cermak rd. line probably will be less congested than Roosevelt rd. Clark st. cars originating at Devon av. will go directly to the park terminal over the Roosevelt rd. tracks, and Wentworth av. cars starting at 81st and Halsted st. will enter by way of Cermak rd.

ELEVATED OR SUBWAY—Between 2 and 4:30 p. m., and from 6:30 p. m. until the pressure of the crowd diminishes, all "L" and subway trains will stop at the 18th st. and Cermak rd. stations, as well as at Roosevelt rd. Riders may transfer at Cermak and at Roosevelt to street cars. Again, the "L" managers urge that patrons use the Cermak rd. transfer point to relieve the burden on Roosevelt rd. Passengers may also transfer to buses at Jackson Blvd. or at Michigan av. and Balbo drive, or to special shuttle buses at Michigan av. and Randolph st., starting at 6 p. m.

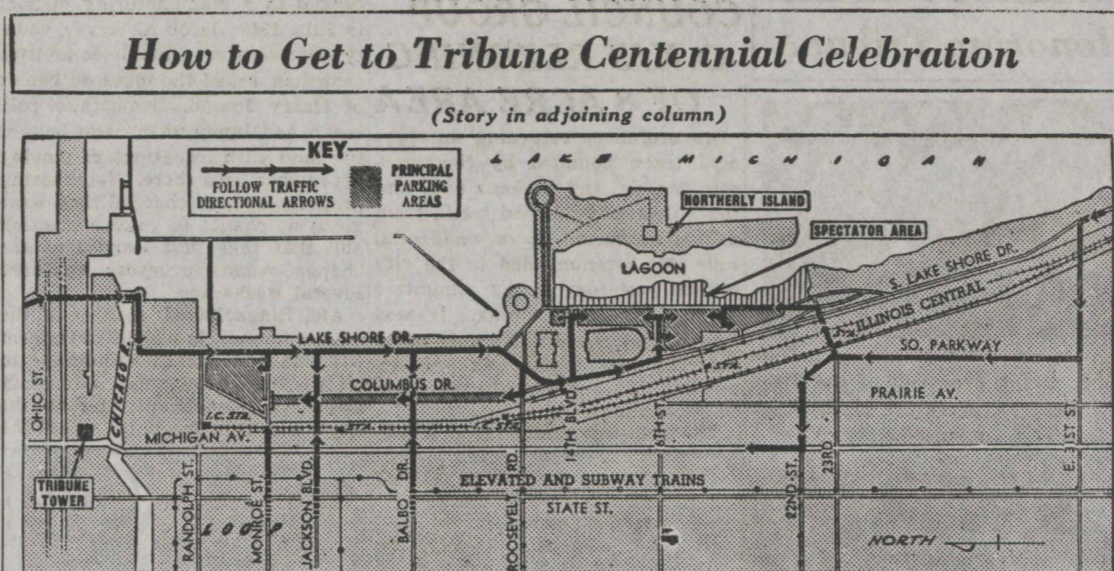
BUSES—All No. 26 buses (Jackson Blvd.) will go directly to Soldiers' field. A number of buses on all other routes will be marked for direct runs to the 14th Blvd. bus terminal. Passengers on other buses may transfer to the Grant park specials, or to the shuttle buses starting from Michigan av. and Randolph st. at 6 p. m.

ILLINOIS CENTRAL—Trains will stop at 18th st. and 23d st. stations. At the end of the show, a pool of trains will be waiting for passengers at 18th st.

TAXICABS—Will be permitted to go directly to Soldiers' field. There will be a taxi stand at the east end of the Natural History museum to carry spectators away.

Routes for Motorists
Motorists will find Lake Shore dr. the most convenient thoroughfare to the park. Scores of police will guide visitors to the automobile storage areas. When the main spectator area between 14th Blvd. and 23d st. is filled, all entrances to the park from Randolph st. to 23d st. will be closed. Thereafter, all who wish to see the spectacle will be directed to points on the lake shore south of 23d st.

Visitors coming by train at the North Western, Union, La Salle, or other railroad stations will use the No. 26 Jackson Blvd. buses. When the last fireworks signals the end of the entertainment, thru

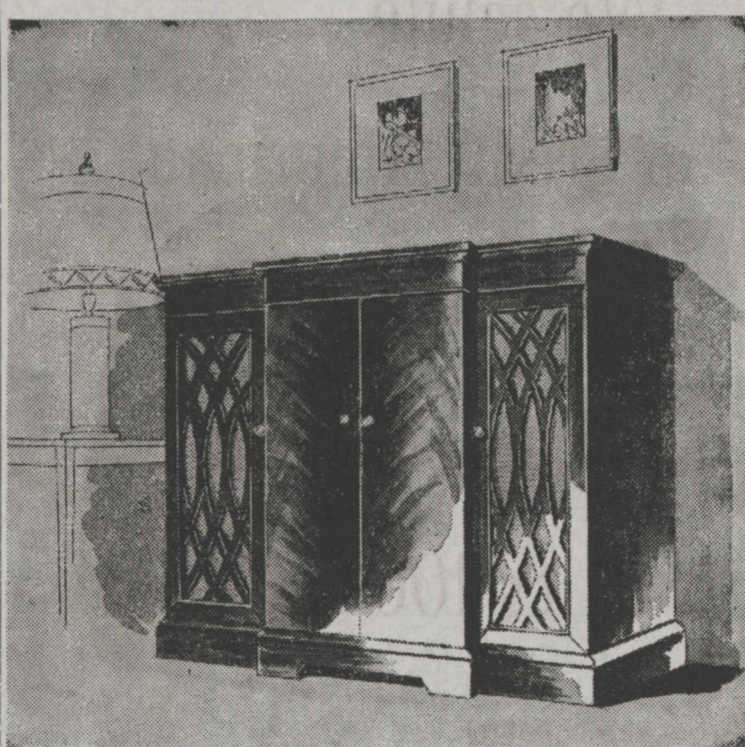
