SETUP OF STATE

Board of 10 to Make Full

Survey Proposed

Springfield, Ill., June 9.—Sen. Frank J. Dick [R., Quincy] today introduced in the senate a bill to set up a commission of 10 legislators to examine in all particulars the framework and actions of the executive branch of state government, and recommend changes to the 1949 general assembly.

The measure, which is understood to have the backing of Lt. Gov. Hugh Cross, would give the commission of five senators and five representatives broad powers in examining the fiscal and revenue policies of the state, the costs of government, possible overlapping of functions, distribution of executive powers, and the system of policy making.

The bill's preamble notes that the present department system of executive framework was established 30 years ago, under Gov. Lowden, and "great social and economic changes, eras of recession and wars have ensued."

Powerful Backing Reported

Behind the measure, it was learned, are some of the most powerful Republican members of the senate. Dick made no statement on introducing the bill, but told reporters that "it is time to see whether some changes aren't needed." In an interview, Cross said he was interested in the bill not from a political standpoint, but because he had noted during his service as lieutenant governor that many places in the state administrative setup needed correction.

The power of the committee to hear witnesses and obtain records is enhanced by a clause which gives Circuit or Superior court judges the power to back up the authority of the committee by court order.

Meanwhile the senate amended the administration's housing program, which contemplates an expenditure of 30 million dollars by the state to prime privately financed building, to give cities which match state contributions more voice in selection of sites. Also adopted by the senate was an amendment to prohibit restrictive covenants in private sales of property thus acquired by the state and turned over to private builders. The bills now go to passage stage.

Mayor Daylight Time Bar

Advanced to second reading was a bill providing for reform of alleged widespread financial misconduct in commercial cemeteries. A companion bill embodying features desired by cemetery operators themselves also was advanced toward passage stage.

A bill that would prohibit daylight saving time for Illinois was introduced to the senate with a favorable recommendation from the committee on efficiency and economy. The bill, by Senators Peters (R., St. Joseph) and Miller (R., Hillsboro), would prohibit political subdivisions and municipal corporations from authorizing any other time than standard. Similar bills have failed in previous sessions.

COURT UPHOLDS

TERMS FOR 3 IN

ARMY DUTY PLOT

Washington, June 9 (AP)—The Supreme court today upheld conviction of two civilians and an army officer in a case involving alleged payments to keep two soldiers in this country and out of combat.

Samuel Bayer and Elias Bayer, the civilians, were accused of giving \$7,000 to Maj. Walter V. Radovich to prevent Martin Bayer and Melvin Usdan from being sent overseas during the war.

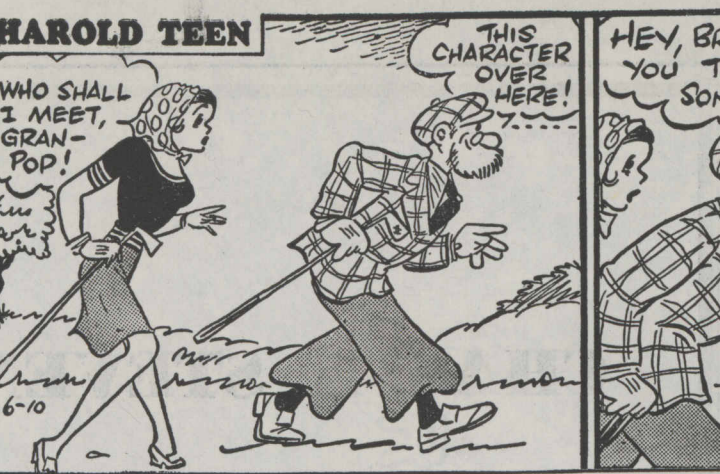
Radovich and the civilians were convicted in New York City of conspiracy to defraud the government of the services of the two soldiers.

Samuel Bayer was sentenced to two years' imprisonment and was fined \$10,000 and Elias Bayer was sentenced to 18 months and fined \$5,000. Radovich was sentenced to one year. Samuel Bayer is the father of Martin Bayer and the uncle of Melvin Usdan. Elias Bayer is the uncle of both.

Justice Jackson delivered the high tribunal's 7-2 decision. The decision was concurred in by Justices Vinson, Black, Reed, Douglas, Murphy, and Burton.

DIES; LEADER IN NAVAL RESERVE

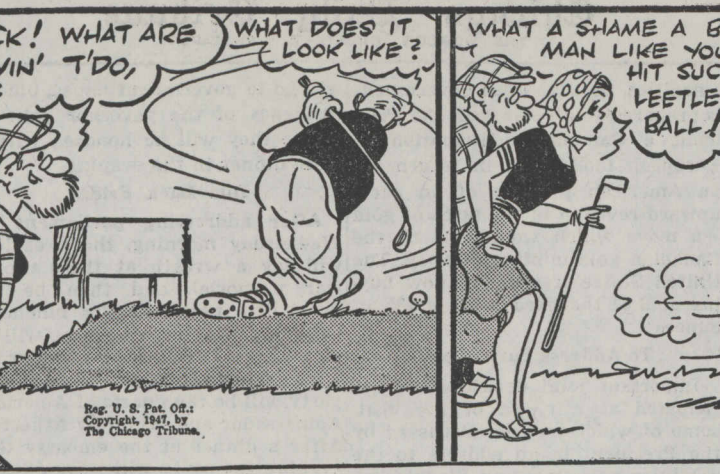
