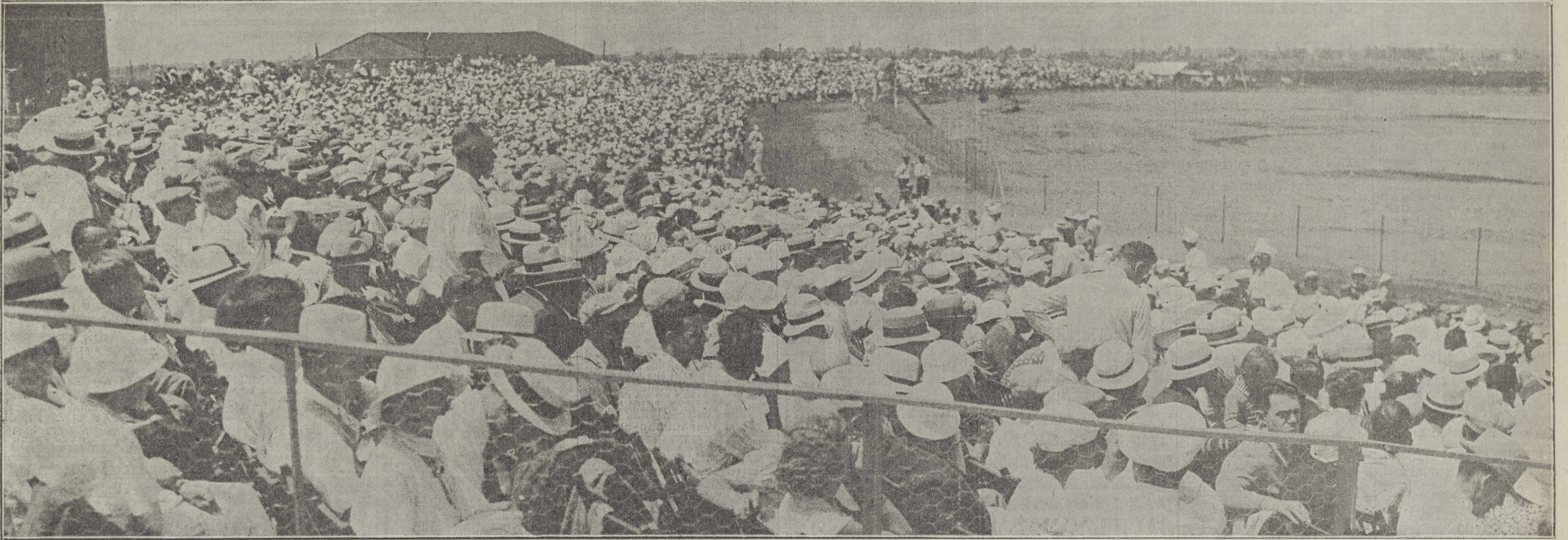


Crowd of 120,000 Holiday Spectators See Thrilling Events at American Air Races—Another Program Today



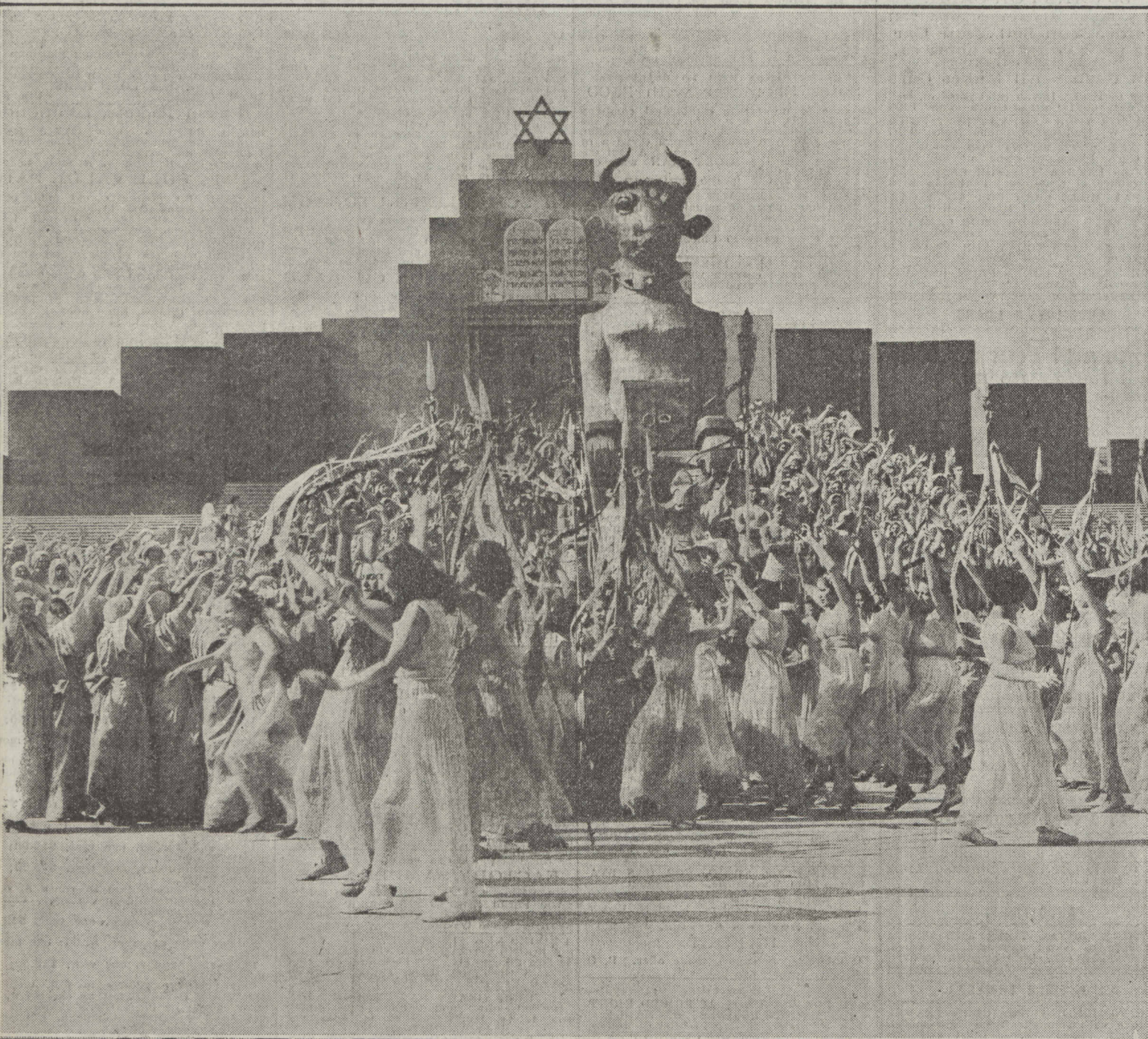

HOLIDAY CROWD OF 120,000 SPECTATORS JAMS CHICAGO MUNICIPAL AIRPORT TO WITNESS THRILLING EVENTS ON AMERICAN AIR RACE PROGRAM; ANOTHER SERIES OF OUTSTANDING EVENTS WILL WIND UP MEET TODAY. View of part of the grandstands at the airport yesterday during the July 4th program of the American Air races, which are sponsored by the Tribune. About 40,000 of the spectators were in the seats, while another 20,000 were standing in the racing plant area. Outside the field were an estimated 60,000 persons viewing the program from many points of vantage. Veteran officials of air meets said that yesterday's crowd was the largest they had ever seen at such an event. On the program today will be several prize races, parachute thrillers and an anti-aircraft battle with a bombing plane and three scout planes. (Story on page 1.)



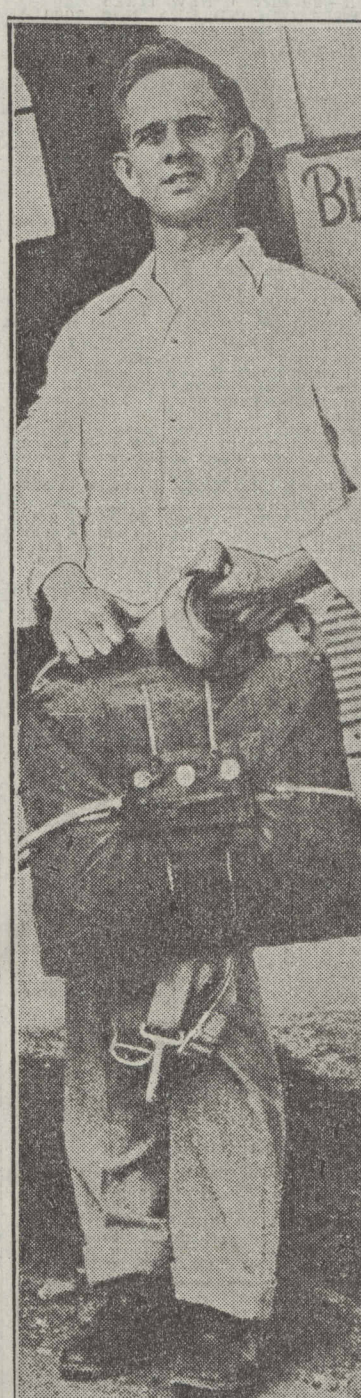
