CHICAGO PACKS ROADS, PARKS AS HOLIDAY ENDS

Throngs Brought Out by Good Weather.

Chicagoans were ready for work today after enjoying one of the finest and sanest Fourth of July holidays in many years. Good weather-barring the Sunday shower-good roads good parks, and plenty of worthwhile holiday something of a record.

The holiday was marred only by an increase in trafic and the drowning toll. Throughout the nation 289 persons were killed in motor accidents. 110 were drowned, three deaths were attributed to fireworks, and 94 died from miscellaneous causes. The Chicago area contribution was five drownings and five motor fatalities.

350,000 Cars Out.

Highway experts estimated that 350,000 cars were out. The four lane approaches to the city again demon strated their admitted superiority over the antiquated two lane roads. These latter highways for miles were solidly covered with snail-like cars in bumper to bumper formation.

Chicagoans who did not go out of town enjoyed themselves in parks, at beaches, at ball games, and other places. Standing room was pretty much the rule. It was difficult to walk more than 20 feet in Lincoln park without stumbling over some one. Officials estimated that 150,000 persons visited the parks.

The Chicago Zoölogical park at Brookfield attracted 45,000 visitors according to Assistant Director Robert Bean. And all the beaches were packed, with the improved Oak street beach leading the list with 145,000. At Jackson park beach there were 60,000; Diversey, 75,000, and Wilson. 60,000. The top figure of the day was held, however, by the forest preserves, which played host to 500,000. Everywhere yesterday's attendance exceeded Sunday's.

Life Guards Save Several.

The sadder side of the holiday was contained in the several fatalities. Of the six drownings five of them occurred yesterday. The first occurred Saturday. Four occurred in Lake county. Life guards at beaches made several thrilling rescues, else the toll might have been higher.

The drowning victims were Henry Sonnengren, 21 years old, 5714 Cullom avenue; Julius Petersen, 19, of Grayslake; Edward M. Mannina, 18, of 918 31st place; John Lehman, 52, of 1911 Cuyler avenue; Fred Doornbus, 16, of 7251 University avenue, and Theodore Michaels, 2226 Medill avenue, Michaels was drowned Saturday in Meirs bay, Pistakee lake, northwest

Sonnengren drowned when he fell north of Glenview while fishing Petersen sank while swimming to a raft in Channel lake. Mannina failed to come up after diving from a row boat in Fox river, five miles north of Antioch. Lehman drowned in five feet of water in Deep lake, about two miles east of Lake Villa. Doornbus was drowned at Cedar Lake, Ind.

Burglars Smash Open






