FIRST GAME

The new barricade in left field assisted the Cubs to a run in the opening inning of the first game. Collins singled to right with two out. Demaree popped a fly into left and the ball nicked the fence for a double, Collins scoring.

In the second the Cards scored two runs on three hits. Medwick led off with a single and Mize fanned. Martin singled to left and Galan's throw to Hack was too late to keep Medwick from arriving at third safely. Martin meanwhile sprinting to second. Both scored on Durocher's single to center.

Cards Take Lead.

The five runs that gave the Cards a 7 to 1 lead in the third started with a single by Brown. Padgett also singled. So did Medwick, Brown scoring. Mize slashed a double into left center. Padgett going home. This was where Lee departed and Parmelee entered the party. Martin lined low to right and Demaree, instead of playing the ball safely for a single, attempted a diving stop and it skipped past him for a triple. Medwick and Mize scoring. Martin registered the fifth run and last run of the inning on Durocher's fly to Marty.

Cards Break Tie.

Although slightly wild, Bryant was able to dodge trouble in the fifth and sixth, but the seventh was different. The Cards shattered the tie by scoring three times. The inevitable caught up with Ryba in the home eighth when the Cubs came charging up with four runs, leaving them one shy of a tie. For a starter Hack popped to Durocher. Collins walked and Demaree doubled for his fourth hit. Warneke came to the rescue but walked Herman. Hartnett singled to right, sending Collins and Demaree across the plate. Jorges also singled, scoring Herman and sending Stainback, who ran for Hartnett, to third. Warneke retired and Haines came on to the scene. O'Dea batted for Marty and produced a short fly to Padgett. Bottarini batted for Davis and singled to score Stainback with the fourth run. Galan filed to Padgett for the third out.

SECOND GAME

The evening argument which started at two minutes after six, was orderly only until the second inning. Then the Cubs punched home five runs, assisted by Winford's wildness. 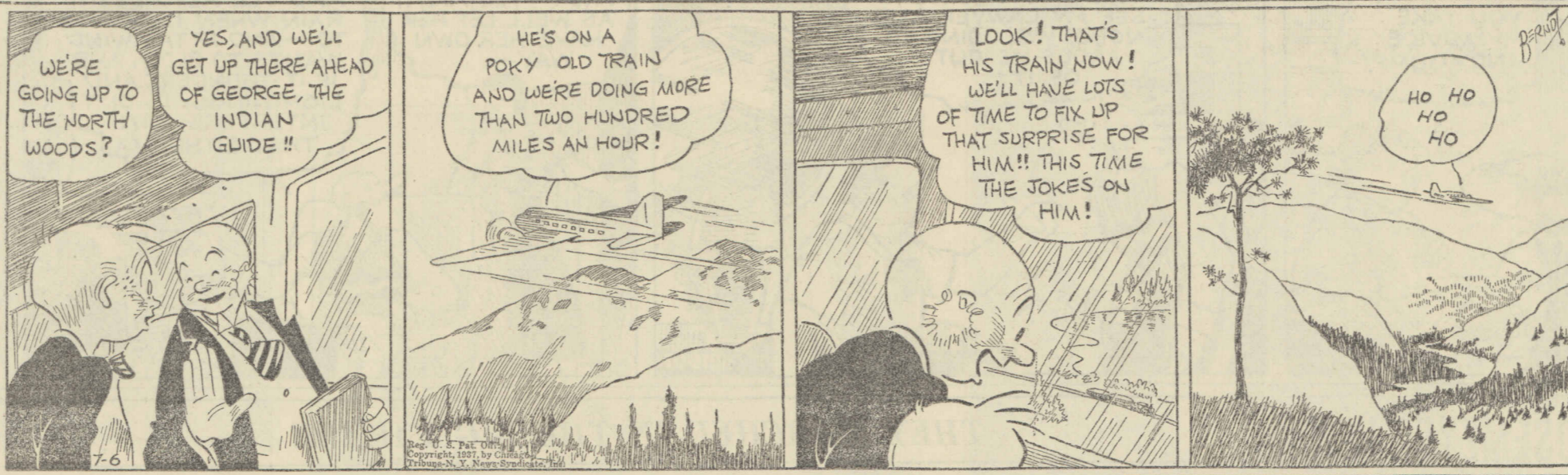
Pick on White.

The Cubs were guilty of a terrible blunder in the seventh inning of the first game. Jorges walked and, with one out, Frey, who batted for Bryant, also walked. Galan sent a foul to Padgett in right and Frey was fouled off first. He had traveled so far that he couldn't get back even though the double play was made by way of Guttridge at third base.

Umpire Dolly Stark, working behind the plate in the second game, was put out of action by a foul ball off the bat of Pinch Hitter Stuart Martin in the ninth inning. The ball hit the iron gridded mesh that Stark prefers to the wire mesh type, and bowled him over. When cold water treatment failed to revive him, Dolly was escorted to the clubhouse. After an hour of rest he had fully recovered from what he termed felt like a blow from a sledge hammer.

Manager Charley Grimm already has decided that he'll open the series at Pittsburgh on Friday with Bill Lee serving from the mound.

Ed Schwartz, Tribune Sport Official, Dies

Edward Schwartz, veteran official of the Tribune Athletic association, died yesterday afternoon at 1 o'clock at the Burlington, Wis. Memorial hospital from peritonitis following an emergency appendectomy which was performed June 26. The body was brought last night to the Conboy funeral home, 4817 Madison street. Funeral services will be held Thursday morning.



He is survived by his widow, Katherine, and a brother, George. The family residence is 15 North Mayfield avenue.

Mr. Schwartz was born in Chicago 53 years ago. From 1906 to 1912 he won several roller skating championships, which sport then enjoyed wide popularity. In this period of competition he was champion of Illinois three times, western champion twice, and in 1912 he won the national title. In recent years Mr. Schwartz maintained his interest in sports by officiating at the Silver Skates derbies and swimming meets. He had been associated with the annual Golden Gloves amateur boxing tournaments since their inception ten years ago.
