

ARLINGTON PARK HOLIDAY CROWD BETS \$740,845

Four \$113,985 Into Mutuels on Handicap.

Betting by the holiday crowd at Arlington Park yesterday totaled \$740,845. A total of \$30,000 was bet on the Stars and Stripes handicap.

The Vanguard of the large holiday crowd began to arrive before noon at Arlington Park. Additional parking areas were thrown open along the back stretch and cars were packed in this extra space back to the private garage on the grounds.

Racing Secretary Charles McLennan has distributed the second issue of the Arlington Park condition book to housemen. The book covers the ten day period from Friday, July 9, to Tuesday, July 20.

Delegations from all Elks lodges in the Chicago area will attend the races at Arlington Park tomorrow. The feature race will be named the Elks handicap.

Jockey Charley Corbett had to give the Milwaukee Stables Entry Times a powerful ride to keep him running long enough to get the decision in a photograph finish in the six furlong second race.

A thrilling finish came out of the Betsy Ross purse which engaged some of the best 2 year olds at the track. It brought another photograph finish. Mountain Ridge, one of the stars from Mrs. Ethel V. Mars' stable, was narrowly beaten by the Lemar Stock Farm's Mad Money.

Apprentice J. Gardelo, who graduated from maiden ranks at the Hot Springs meeting, got in from Latonia and will ride during the remainder of the Arlington Park meeting.

Two boxing shows will be presented tonight in the wake of the Fourth of July holiday, a professional card being scheduled at Western Auditorium, Eastern and Devon avenues, and an amateur program at Elmwood Park stadium, 7315 West Grand avenue.

Alex Kettles, South Bend, Ind., 1937 sectional Golden Gloves heavyweight champion, will make a fresh start in a six round contest with Paul Williams of the south side at the Western arena.

Kittles whipped Harold Ullmer and Willie Davies and stopped Ralph Davis, Webster Epperson, and Jim Carter before meeting defeat at the hands of Henry Cooper of Brooklyn on the Bradstock championship card at Comiskey park on June 22.

Mickey Beal, hard hitting Rogers Park featherweight, who scored a knockout at the same club last Tuesday, is paired with Harry Ward of Indianapolis, Ind., for six rounds.

George Eisel vs. Bob La Monte (6), Johnny (Twin) Helstrom vs. Joey Richards (4), Tony Musto vs. Bill Palmer (4), heavyweights, Johnny Rock vs. George Woods (4), 145.

Francis Smith, featherweight southpaw from Aurora, and Jesse Yerber, Unity Athletic club, will be the headliners in a five round encounter at Elmwood Park. Mike Soper, Elmwood Park bantamweight, and Jimmy Reade, Northwest gymnasium, will be participants in one of six supplementary bouts.

Everett Marshall, who is recognized as heavyweight wrestling champion by the Illinois athletic commission, has agreed to meet Chief Sanokie in a return bout at White City this evening in the Stevenson hall in connection with the impending international matches at Soldiers' field between representatives of the C. Y. O. and the best boxers in South America.

John Henry Lewis will not fight Henry Thomas at Comiskey park this month, as reported in the past. In fact, Manager Gus Greenlee predicts that his light heavyweight champion will do no fighting of any kind during the month because he is in need of a vacation.—F. M.

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25,000 See Now Then Win at Delaware

Wilmington, Del., July 5.—(AP)—Now Then, an 11 to 1 shot racing in the sky blue silks of F. J. Buchanan won the fifth running of the \$5,000 Christiansa stake for 2 year olds today as a crowd estimated at 25,000 tested the capacity of Delaware Park.

The throng, which exceeded by about 10,000 the opening day attendance at the new track, was drenched by frequent showers. Nevertheless, it poured \$66,892 into the mutual machines on the featured event, which was run over a sloppy track.

Given a good ride by Willie Ray, Now Then came out of the starting gate first and never was overtaken as he ran the 3/4 furlongs in 1:09.35.

Dauber, the favorite, from C. V. Whitney's stable, made a fine effort to catch the leader, but failed by three-quarters of a length. Mrs. W. P. Stewart's Pastured closed gamely to take third place, four lengths behind Dauber, while Recorder took fourth money.

REX FLAG WINS. New York, July 5.—[Special.]—Shipped up to Empire City from Delaware especially to take advantage of the featherweight impost of 106 pounds, Mrs. Louise Vyas's Rex Flag today won the \$14,225 Butler handicap before a record crowd estimated at 18,000.

At the end of the mile and an eighth Rex Flag was first by a half length over John Hay Whitney's Flying Scot, the 16 to 5 favorite. Four lengths back Silver State Stable's No Dice was third a half length before Forty Thinks, owned by Mrs. Payne Whitney, mother of John Hay Whitney.

Jockey Robert Merritt was in the saddle in the fourth race, bumping up a consecutive double in the sixth race when he home first with Mrs. R. A. Van Clier's Melodiana.

29,000 AT DETROIT. Detroit, Mich., July 5.—(AP)—Main Man proved himself the best horse in the \$3,000 added Liberty handicap today by winning the six furlong race in the fast time of 1:11.35 before a holiday crowd of 20,000, largest of the season here.
