BRITISH TO TRAIN HUGE FORCE OF RESERVE PILOTS

Will Boost Plane Output to 25,000 Yearly.

LONDON, July 23.—Plans for a huge civilian air reserve with government subsidized training were announced tonight by Sir Kingsley Wood, secretary of state for air and president of the air council. Simultaneously it was revealed that Britain hopes to speed up airplane production within two years to 25,000 planes yearly. At present production is estimated at 3,000 a year.

The full 25,000 probably will not be utilized when production is achieved, but by producing about half that many in peace time the British believe they can double production immediately when required.

The first planes are coming from "shadow factories" and six more such plants are under construction.

Men and Women May Fly.

The proposed air reserve, to be known as the "civil air guard," will be open to any man or woman between 18 to 50 years of age. Flying instructions will be provided at a cost of 60 cents to \$2.50 an hour, instead of the present charge of from \$7.50 to \$10.

Members are not to be listed in any actual government force, but they will sign an agreement to volunteer in any national emergency.

Amateur flying clubs throughout the country will be subsidized in return for training the civil guard at low cost.

Londonderry to Head Reserve.

The marquess of Londonderry, former air secretary, will be the chief of the new reserve. He will have four assistants. Two will represent the flying clubs, one will be a woman, and one will represent Scotland.

To qualify the clubs must agree to take not less than twelve civil guards for training. The total cost of training is estimated at \$11. The club must agree not to charge the guards more than \$2.50 an hour.

In return the clubs will get \$250 an hour up to a maximum of ten hours a year for the flying done by the members after they get their licenses. The license subsidy will be only \$150 if members are trained to handle only light planes.

BROTHER SLAYS PAROLEE; TELLS OF DEATH THREAT

Thomas F. O'Rourke, 25 years old, a parolee, was shot to death early today by his brother, Leo, 20, of 1859 South Ashland avenue, in a prairie at 61st street and Ashland avenue.

The two had been drinking. On the way home, according to Leo, Thomas drew a knife and said, "I'm going to kill the old man." He referred to his father, John O'Rourke, 54, of 1659 West 61st street. The father had put Thomas out of his home two weeks ago as a trouble maker. Since then Thomas had been living with Leo at the Ashland avenue address.

Fearful that Thomas would carry out his threat, Leo fired twice. One bullet struck Thomas in the chest. Leo was arrested by Sgt. Jerome McGrath of the Chicago Lawn station. He explained possession of the revolver by saying he had discovered it during the day in his brother's coat, and had taken it away quietly to prevent his brother from getting into trouble with it. Thomas was originally sentenced to Pontiac reformatory for robbery.

GARAGE OWNER SLUGGED; BLAME LABOR TROUBLE

Arnold Hollan, 20 years old, 4642 North St. Louis avenue, part owner of the Holly-Way garage, 5556 Broadway, was slugged by two hoodlums in the garage last night. He was given first aid at the Edgewater hospital.

Hollan told police that the slugs entered the garage, posing as prospective customers. Then without warning, he said, one beat him with the butt of a revolver and the other struck him with a blackjack.

Both he and Bernard Matheson, 35, his partner and brother-in-law, charged the attack was motivated by union trouble. Matheson said that they formerly were members of local 727, the Chicago Garage Owners' association. They dropped out a few months ago. Since then, he said, their garage has been picketed three times. The pickets were called off only after they had paid so-called fines to the association, he asserted. Recently they wished to hire a new man, but, he charged, the union refused to let them do so.

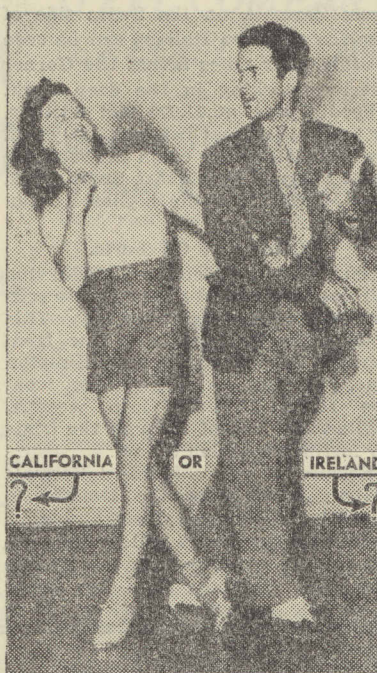

New York, July 23.—[Special.]—A young woman walked into the Rockefeller plaza offices of the American Airlines today and asked the manager, William Burt, to help her mail a letter to "Douglas Gorce Corrigan."

Before the office manager could frame a question about the intrepid ocean flyer who will join this air line when he gets back from Ireland, the young lady was joined by a man.

"I'm Mrs. Harry Gorce Corrigan," she explained, "and he," indicating the man, "is my husband and Doug's brother."

Between them they explained they had been spending their vacation in Nova Scotia and wanted to expedite mailing of a letter to Ireland to the man who flew the Atlantic "by mistake." Because of their absence they had just learned of the flight.

Harry Corrigan, whose middle name [pronounced Gross] is the same as his brother Douglas', is employed as an engineer at the Glenn L. Martin airplane plant in Baltimore—largely because of Douglas. Douglas helped pay his brother's way through the University of California.

2 U. S. Physicians Among 14 Killed in Plane Crash

WARSAW, July 23.—[U. P.]—The Lot Air company said today that two American physicians were killed yesterday in the crash of a Lot company airliner near Stulpska, Rumania. One of the Americans was described as Lemuel Caro, New Rochelle, N. Y., a well known amateur flyer, and the other passengers and four members of the crew were killed.

REDS OF U. S. GET MOSCOW TIP ON SPEECH MAKING

List of 'Do's' and 'Don'ts' Is Compiled.

RIGA, Latvia, July 23.—William "Zack" Foster, president; Earl Browder, general secretary, and other members of the American branch of the communist party have received detailed instructions from the IKKI [executive committee of the communist internationale] on how to make speeches which will not lay them open to charge of being Trotskyists.

The "model speech," as outlined by Zacharias Manuiski, one of the six secretaries of the communist internationale, should begin with a discussion of the economic crisis in the United States, which, he says, is preparing the way for a new world war. Then, after elaborating upon the war in Spain and China, Red orators are told to arouse enthusiasm of their audiences over Moscow's proposal to destroy Fascist dictatorships and to end up by talking about world revolution.

Cites Source of Material.

The safest source of material for Red orators, Manuiski says, is the Moscow Pravda. Any orator, he says, should be able to obtain facts sufficient for a lengthy speech from a fortnight's issue of this paper. If the Pravda is not obtainable, then the official communist newspapers abroad should be used.

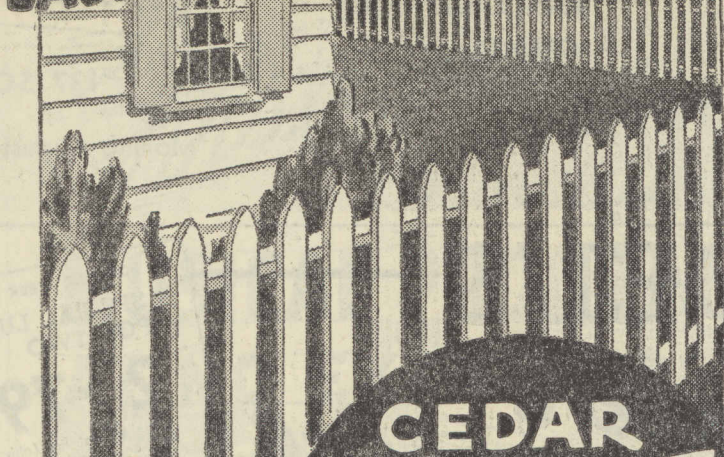
Manuiski especially instructs American and other orators to be careful about predicting another world depression as a result of the present crisis in America. It is quite possible there will not be another depression, and Dictator Stalin also warns against hasty prophecies, he writes.

In discussing America, speakers should obtain some striking statistics and figures about the steel industry, unemployment and fall in value of securities, Manuiski says.

Warns Against Pessimism.

Manuiski warns communist orators abroad not to permit pessimism to enter their addresses. They must develop their hearers' hopes that the world revolution is just around the corner and end with a crescendo of praise for the soviet government, eulogizing the soviet elections as the most democratic in the world, hailing Stalin as the "light of the world" and "the fourth wise man" who has been sent to help humanity. The other three are Marx, Engels, and Lenin.

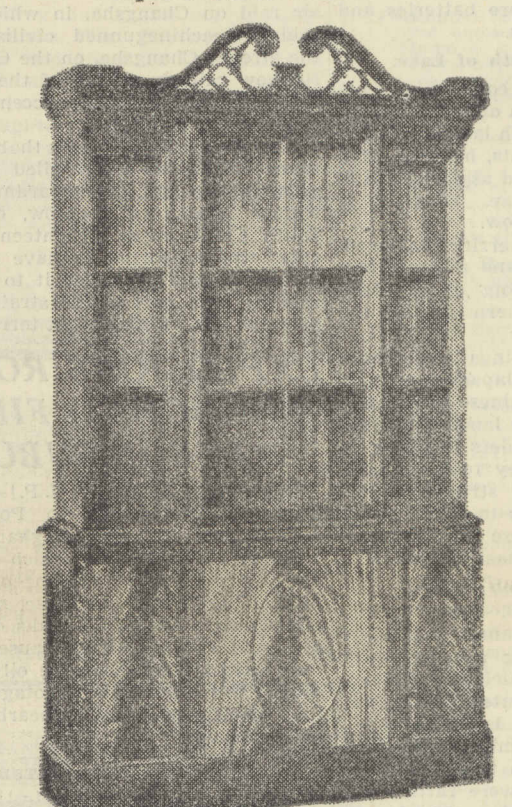
