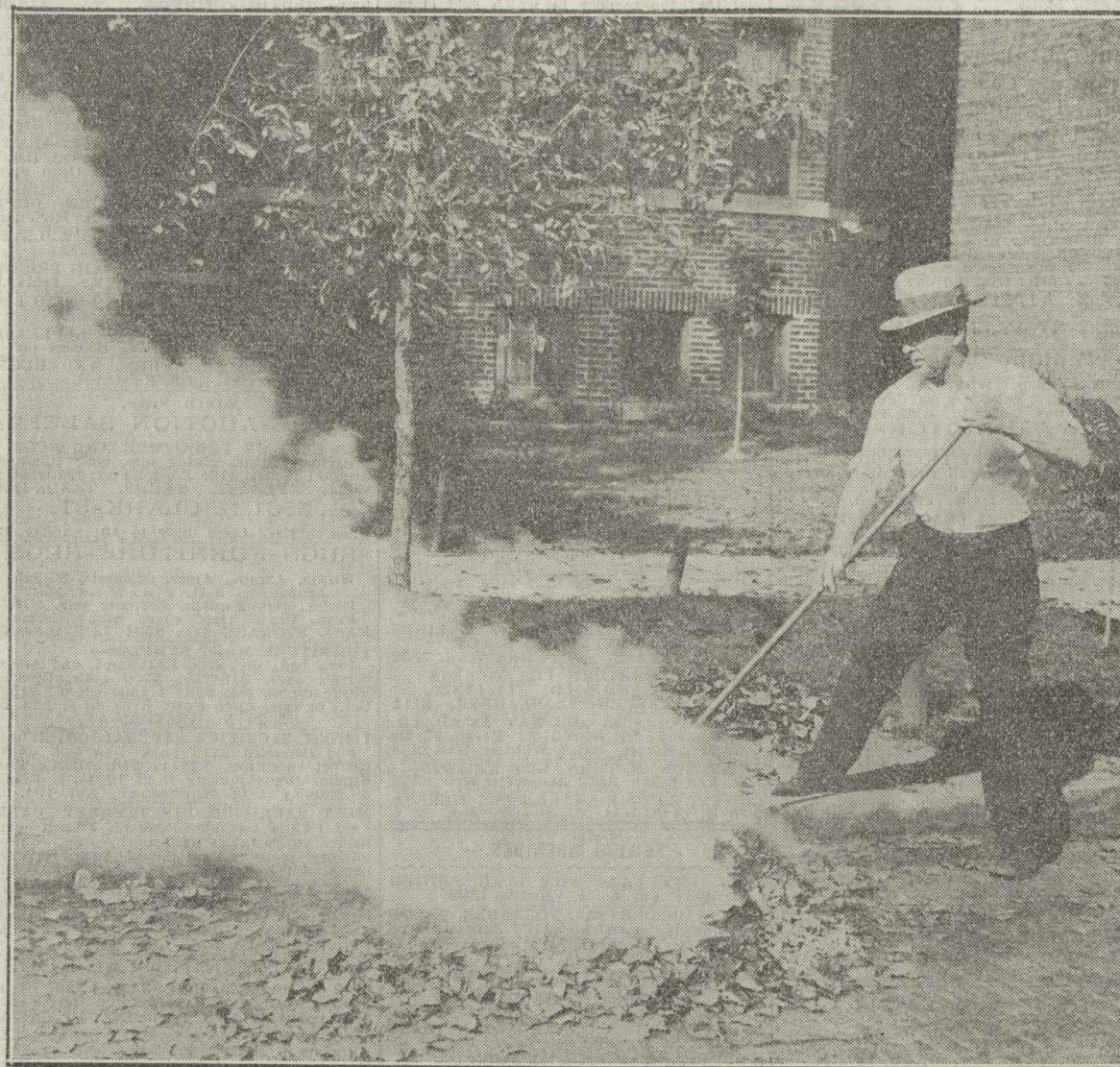

Bruno Hauptmann's writing:

Handwriting of the kidnaper:

red
was April 17
I will give the

This is the actual script, enlarged, of words appearing on Hauptmann's automobile license and in a letter he wrote to Mrs. Annette Begg. Second from the top is the word "past," which may be compared with the word "last," which appears in the extract from the ransom note.

This is the actual script, enlarged, of words which appear in the ransom note to Col. Lindbergh, which notes were written by the person who penned the first note left in the baby's crib. The word "redy" may be compared with Hauptmann's "red" in his automobile license. The "one" and the last three letters in "anyone" may be compared with the "one" in the license.

At left: Words in handwriting of Hauptmann as compared with similar words in ransom notes sent to Col. Lindbergh (shown at right) as they appear under microscope. The third word in the top line (left), taken from Hauptmann's auto license, "past," may be compared with "last" in ransom note. The word "red" in license, may be compared with "redy" in the note, and the "one" in license may be compared with "anyone" and the "one" in the note.
