AMERICANS WITH A PRICE ON THEIR HEADS.

Senator Black's Gestapo [Hitler secret police] is by no means the only Washington organization of espionage and inquisition prowling in the private affairs of American citizens, but it is at present the most active one engaged in bulldozing American citizens in the hope that it can make them airaid to exercise their political

In one hand the New Deal carries the money bag and in the other a club. The voter may take his choice. If he is found busy in the works of the New Deal he will be rewarded. If he is found busy opposing them he will be clubbed and dragged before the inquisitors. Mr. Black has been made the head of this Gestapo of terrorist agents as chairman of the senate lobby committee, and he, fortunately for the citizens threatened, has put his intentions down on paper in such specific terms that nobody in the country can misunderstand what he is trying to do. He was so sure of himself that he didn't endeavor to cover up. He could have used a smoke screen but didn't think it was worth the trouble. Things already have gone so far in the tracks of Hitler that Black could take the direct instead of the oblique method of attack on

the citizens he intends to coerce. In the resolution by which he obtained in vestigating authority he named particular organizations whose activities were to be examined. He named the Crusaders, the Sentinels of the Republic, the American Federation of Investors, the New York State Economic council, the Liberty league, the National Association of Manufacturers, and the American Taxpayers' league. He did not name the Federation of Labor, the American Legion, the Union for Social Justice, the Old Age Revolving Pensions Ltd. [Townsendl, or other organizations which have main-tained lobbies in Washington. He selected the societies of American citizens who are making political sentiment against the New Deal, arousing the people to an understanding that if they permit the revolution to carry out its program for an additional four years they will all be ruined. Black, having publicly proscribed and pubthe firing squad. lished the men and women he was after, sent out an impertinent questionnaire, followed by his agents. The victim is told to stand and give information regarding his private affairs which government has no right to demand. He is led to understand that it will be better for him if he makes his statements under oath, and then he receives a visit from the agents who themselves have been told to be tough. The agents demand the citizen's private papers, his accounts, and his files. Resistance based upon unquestionable privileges and immunities is met by the threat that if full satisfaction is not given the citizen will be taken to Washington and subjected to the inquisition by senators and subjected to the inquisition of senetors who have extended their prerogatives to cover

the most outrageous abuses.

America is again back to the tyranny of the sedition act, and the people may not be able to comprehend that government would dare do such a thing to them. It is the boidest defiance of American principles the country ever ex-perienced. Government has never dared threaten thousands of American people with punishment for their normal political activities before in the republic's history. It may be a good thing to have this matter well understood in time to put an end to it in the next election. 

THE SENATE BLACK SHIRTS. Technically Senator Hugo L. Black of the sen ate lobby committee was not on all fours with Ananias when in accusing THE TRIBUNE of falsifi-cation he said senate resolutions 165 and 134 did not specifically mention the political opponent of Mr. Roosevelt. These resolutions authorize or purport to authorize the activities of the sena. tors who to intimidate the critics and opponents of the New Deal have torn their way through the article of the bill of rights which says that the right of the people to be secure in their persons, papers, and effects from unreasonable search and seizure shall not be violated. The Black Shirts are violating the right as it never has been violated before.

Technically Mr. Black's statement regarding the resolution was accurate. The organizations the senators are after were specifically named not in the resolutions but in the questionnaire he sent out under the authority of the resolutions. If the senator wishes the public to believe that his lobby committee has not specifically announced the victims of its dragooning, his intent is to deceive. The essential point is whether the senate for political reasons is attacking certain organizations known to be op-posing the reelection of Mr. Rooseveit. The an-swer is Yes. The proof is in the questionnaire of which question No. 2 is as follows:

"Please give an Itemized statement of all sums contributed since Jan. 1, 1934, to the Crusaders, the Crusaders National Organization, Inc., American Liberty League, Sentinels of the Republic, New York State Economic Council, Amer ican Federation of Utility Investors, Inc., American Taxpayers League, and all other organiza tions of like or similar character, or to any person or organization for the benefit of any of the aforementioned organizations. In giving this statement please show each amount contribu the date of each such contribution, and the pur pose for which made in each instance." There are a number of "pleases" scattered through the questionnaire, the glove over the iron flat. The tone is peremptory, an acknowledgment is requested, and it is asked that the

answers be given under oath. The resolutions are general, the use of their authority specific. The zenators called their shots. They said they were after such and such men, all of them against Mr. Roosevelt. Among lobbies and political organizations not mentioned was the Ku Klux Klan. Why doesn't Mr Black include that organization? Probably because it elected him in Alabama and he knows too much about it. Mr. Black and his associates selected and named the persons to be attacked with intent to intimidate. The questionnaire, although insc lent and charged with malevolence, was only the beginning. The seizure of telegrams by commit tee subpena and through the Federal Commu-nications commission followed—a wholesale raid on private effects and papers, outrageously unreasonable search and selzure, violating constitu

Mr. Black's utterances are in keeping with his tional rights. acts. In his assault on the floor of the senate upon Mr. Rooseveit's political opponents he was angry enough to say that if he had any idea a federal judge would issue an injunction against the senate to prevent unreasonable search and seizure of a citizen's papers he would long ago have introduced a bill to take that jurisdiction away from the court.

When a man in the position of United States senator so far loses his head as to say that he would stop the courts from enforcing the bill of rights he has served warning on the entire cour try that every protection of American citizenship is in danger of being destroyed in this administration of Roosevelt. What more impressive admonition could any American require? The bill of rights is the guaranty to the people of this country, that they cannot be visited by Brown Shirts, that they cannot be secretly arrested and thrown into fall or herded into concentration. camps, that they cannot be persecuted by government officials. In other words, so long as the bill of rights stands they can't be fed castor oil or have their teeth knocked down their throats by a dictator's ruffians.
