BEAUTY ANSWERS

MRS. W. H. W.: Too bad you did not take hold of that double chin when it was a small thing. Left alone and unchecked they always proceed to enlarge and wrinkle, and the cure, naturally enough, takes much longer. First, you have to acquire the habit



of holding your chin up. Whether you are sitting, standing, walking, or running, hold it up. Practice this exercise: Press your head back as far as you can, then forward slowly on to chest, then to right side and to left side as far as possible. Do this five times, gradually increasing to twenty or thirty. Then every night massage the chin with a good skin food and finish off with an ice rub over the affected part.

WINTER HEN FEEDING.

The feed bill for your chickens usually determines whether you are a successful poultryman or not, and it is one of the most important items to be considered by those who expect to keep chickens this winter. During the summer months there was plenty of green feed and insects for the flock and the feed bill was greatly reduced, but the problem is quite different in cold weather. If poultry is fed right during the winter months it pays, but if fed wrong, it is an expense. Green feed is just as essential in the winter as in the summer, and in order to keep down the heavy expense of buying grains you should begin planning now for the winter supply of vegetables for the flocks.

In gardens where the vegetable crop has been gathered seed may be sown to provide green food for the poultry. If it is not practical for the flock to range on the garden, the young plants can be cut and fed. Vegetable tops, parings, and other vegetable refuse that otherwise would be thrown away supply valuable green feed for hens. Lawn clippings are also valuable. They may be fed as soon as cut, or be allowed to dry or cure, and be stored in bags for the winter. The clippings keep in good condition. When needed they should be soaked for a few minutes in warm water. They can be fed alone or mixed with some mash or table scraps.

Probably the most common green feed used by poultrymen is sprouted grain. One of the most successful chicken fanners in the middle west remarked not long ago that the poultry raiser who has not yet adopted sprouted oats as a part of the hen's bill of fare, especially during the winter months, is not only depriving his stock of food which would be relished and which is most valuable in feeding and egg production, but is also overlooking one of his best opportunities to save on the cost of feeding during cold weather.
