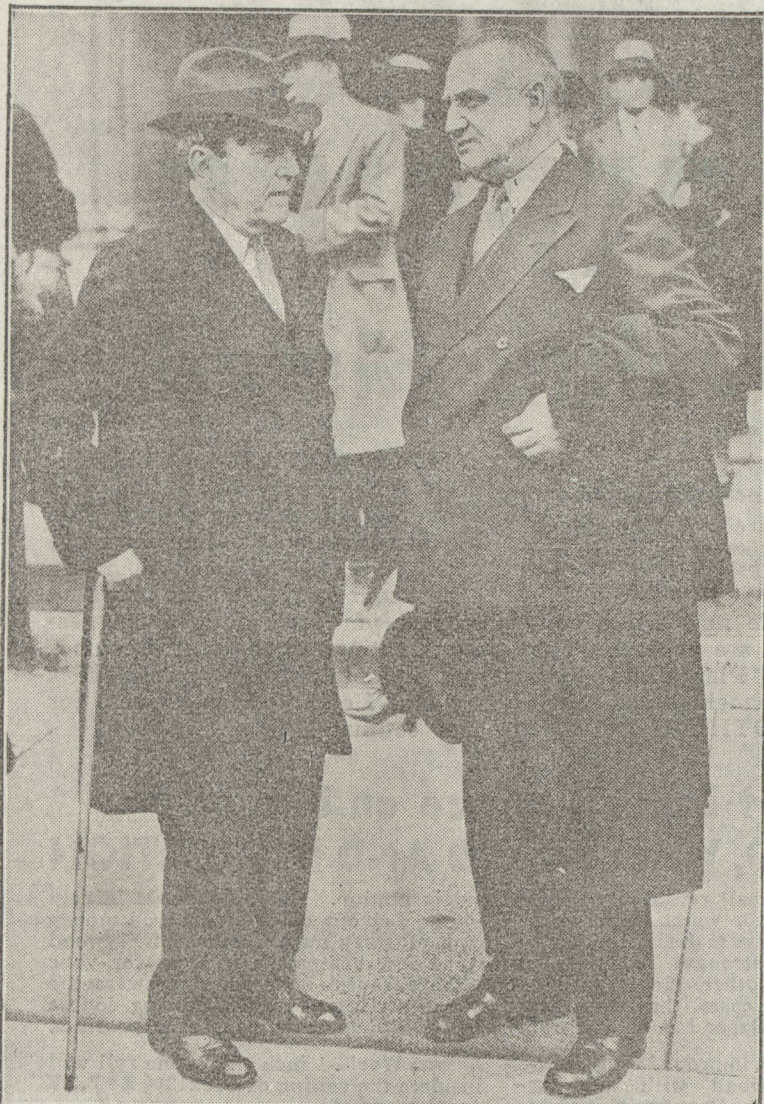

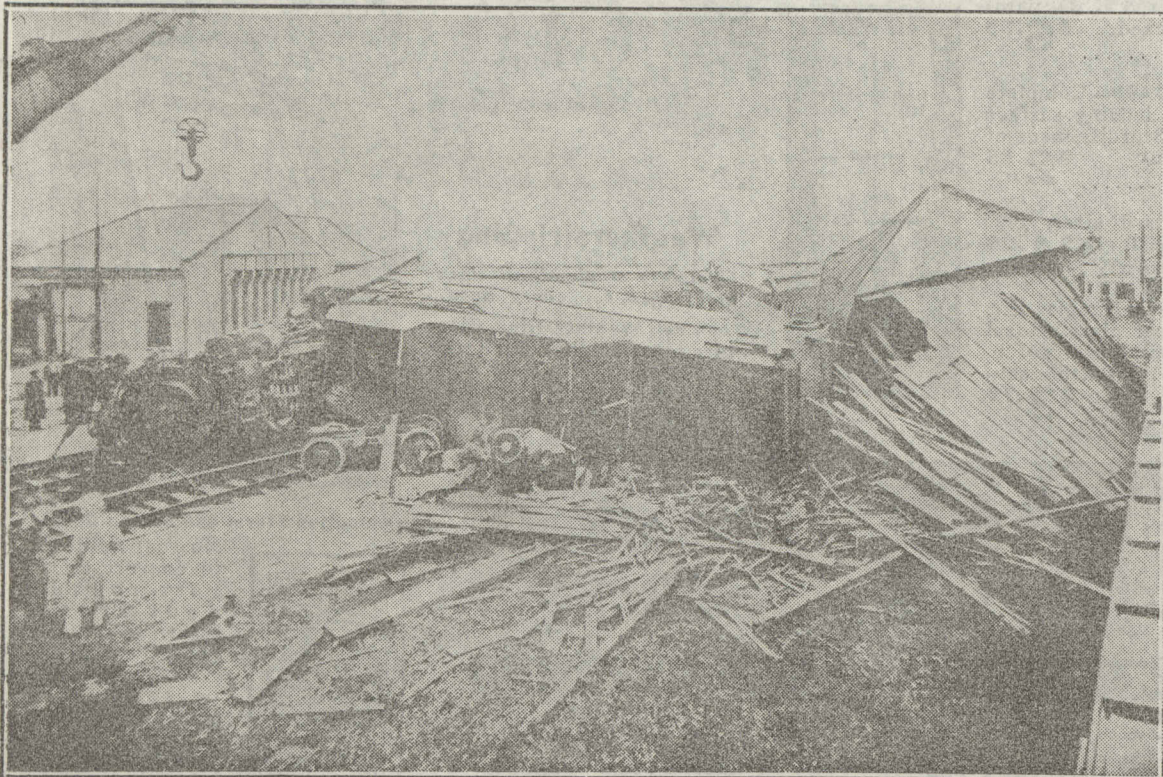

Bellanca low winged craft in which Col. James Fitzmaurice will start London to Melbourne flight photographed during test at New York before shipment to England.

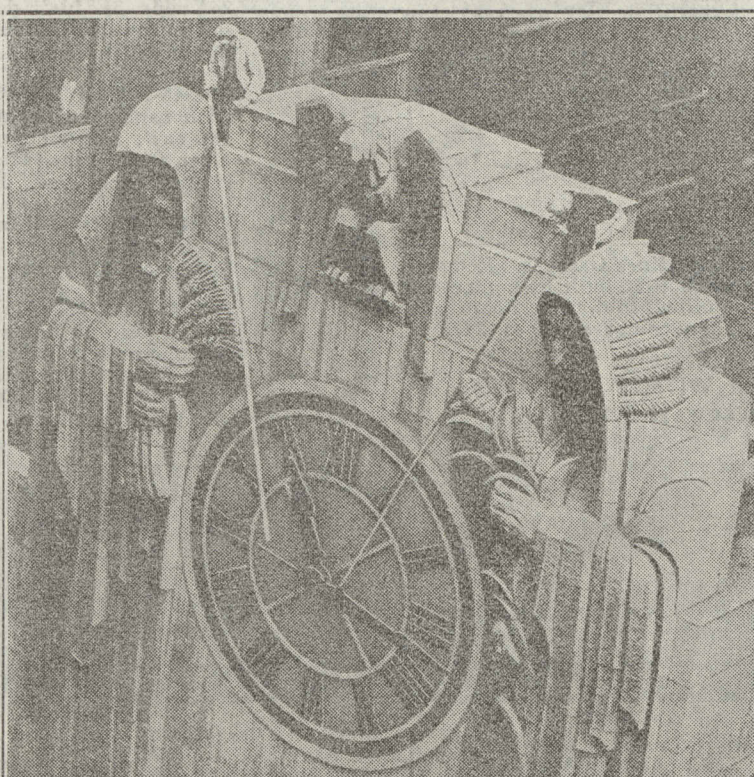


BUILDING TRADES CONFLICT TO GO ON FLOOR OF LABOR CONVENTION.

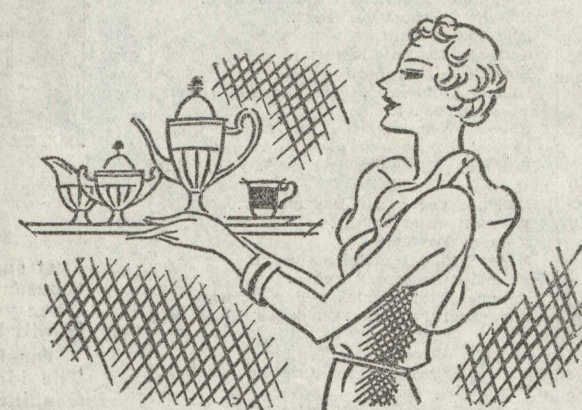

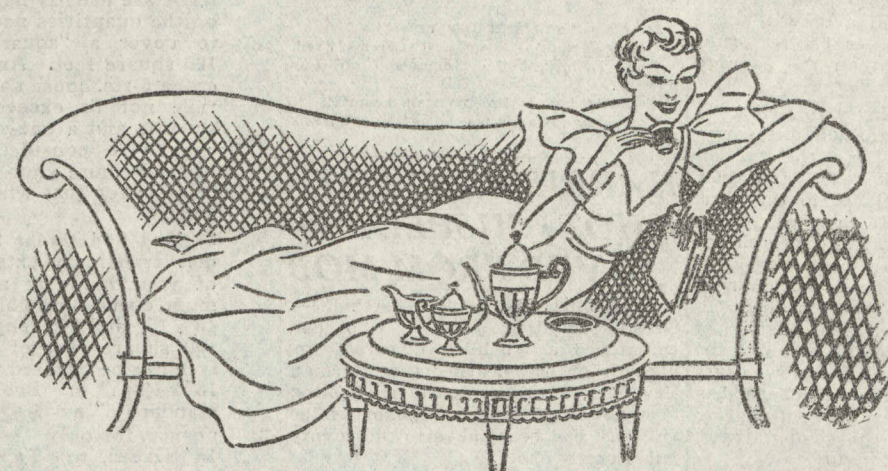


GIANT CLOCK SET BACK; DAYLIGHT TIME ENDS.

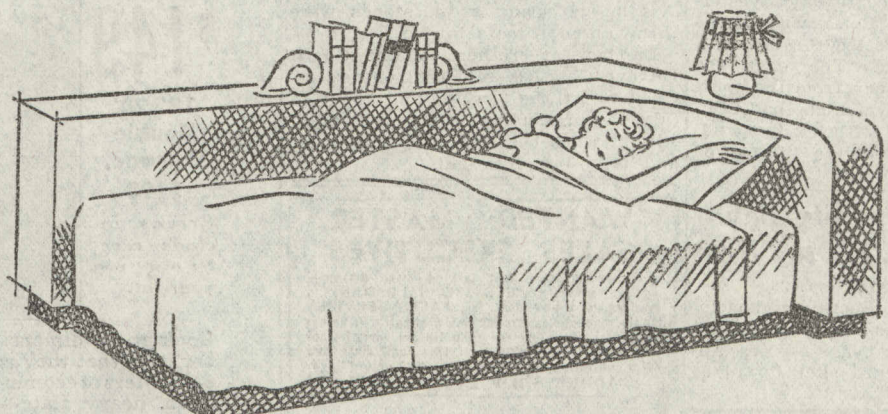

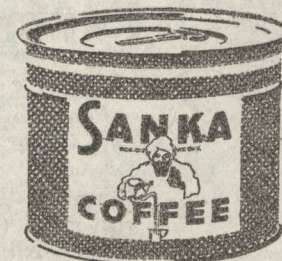
