The Successful Home Garden

Home Forcing of French Endive. With the growing popularity of witloof or French endive, the seed houses are placing the chicory roots on the market, ready for home forcing. The heated basements of city and suburban houses are admirably adapted to this form of winter gardening.

The roots can be started from now on at any time during the course of the winter. It requires but two weeks to force the first leaves to edible size; subsequent crops but ten days. planting 180 roots in lots of forty-five each at four intervals of three days each, a family of five lovers of witloof may have a continuous supply of crisp fresh leaves till the first spring crop of lettuce replaces them. A bed measuring 3x4 feet will contain them.

Witloof is prepared in many ways, but principally as a salad, like lettuce. It is slightly bitter, but a taste for it is readily cultivated. If the bitterness is objectionable it may be eliminated by successive boiling in two or three separate waters.

Roots used for forcing are taken from storage after a period of not less than two weeks' rest. A bed or box may be prepared on the floor with common garden soil.
