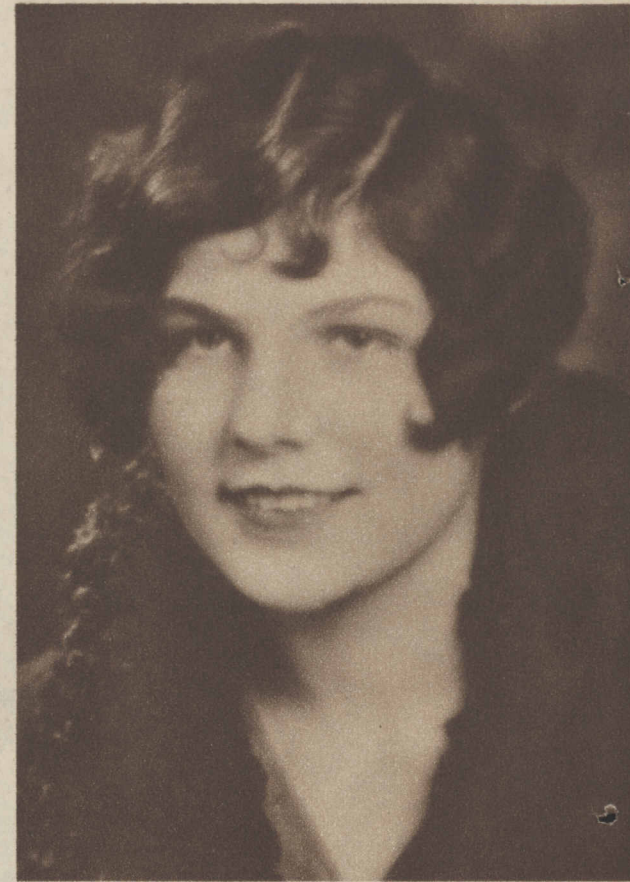


MISS J. M. CHAMPAIGN, ILL.
