




TEN YEARS AFTER





QUENTIN ROOSEVELT'S GRAVE, an American shrine at Chamey, near where he fell, is a Mecca for visitors to the war sections of France.




THE RAVAGES OF WAR have not been effaced from the church of the village of Lucy le Bocage. In front of the ruins tourists view the memorial to the soldier dead.




