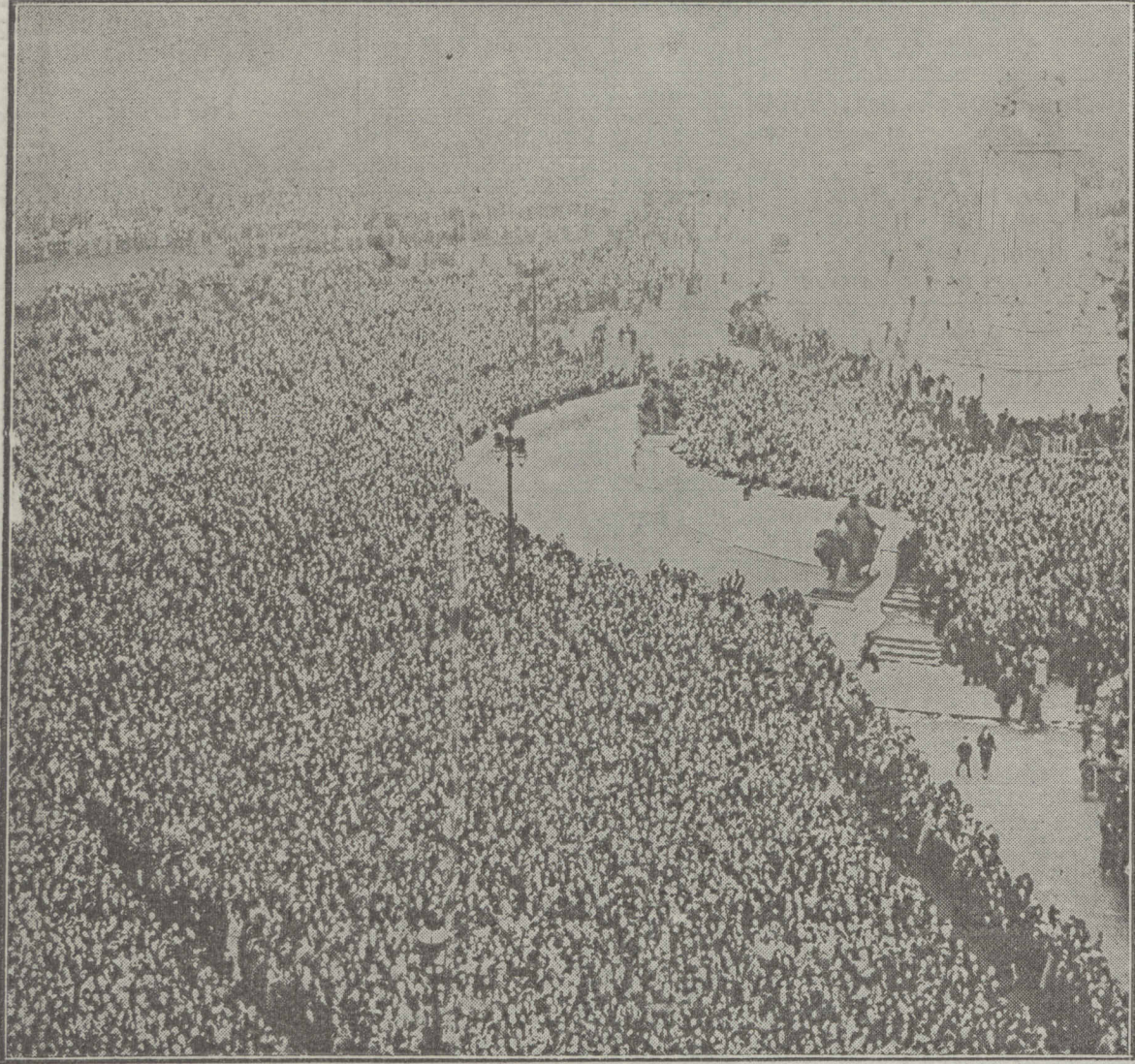


Slaying of Youth Complicates Tulsa Murder Mystery—President Roosevelt Attends Annual Gridiron Banquet

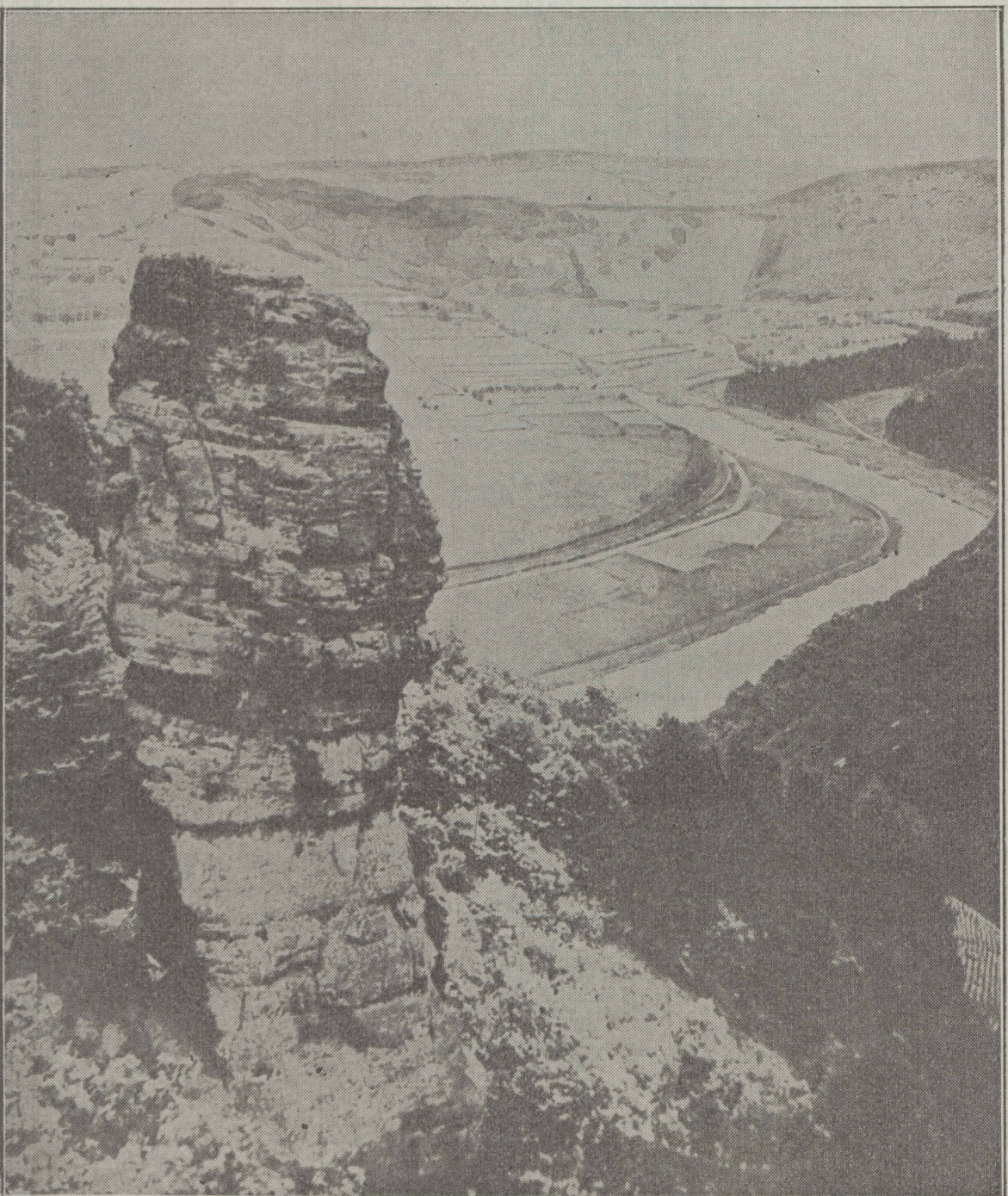
