

Recalls are healthy for lawmakers...

he moaning and groaning we've been bombarded with in the past two weeks about the inequities in the recall of two state senators has primarily been starting in one place -- the state legislature. If you ask most common citizens, they're not upset at all with recalling lawmakers.

As in anything, this system could be abused. But we're far from mishandling and abuse right now. In fact, maybe a recall or two (or three) are needed before elected state officials realize Joe Average Citizen is indeed fed up with escalating spending -- and is determined to do something about it.

First things first. The main gripe we've heard about recalls is that a small band of citizens are picking on certain, selected lawmakers. Sen. Philip Mastin (D-Pontiac) and Sen. David Serotkin (D-Mt. Clemens) were the first legislators who had recall petitions validated. Mastin lost by a 2-1 margin on Nov. 22. and Serotkin lost even more strongly on Nov. 30 -- even though both men outspent petitioners 10-1.

Well, more than 24,000 people signed recall petitions for Sen. Mastin and 27,000 people said they favored recalling Sen. Serotkin! That's two-thirds the population of Huron County! That's no narrow, small band of average citizens. An even larger number cast votes in the special elections, so this isn't some group of 25 or 100 people carrying only a grudge.

Some people say recalls are being led by ultra-conservative Republicans who are targeting Democrats in marginal districts Perhaps part of that's true today, but the recall process is open to anyone who finds enough like-minded people opposing what their elected leaders are doing -- in Lansing or elsewhere.

"They (lawmakers) can't understand what's happening," says John Lauve, a General Motors engineer leading a state drive to recall Gov. Blanchard. "They are used to the Lansing mindset; that there is the Democratic Party, the Republican Party and the special interest groups. They don't know how to deal with the

people.
"The ballgame has changed," he says. Perhaps it seems unfair that Sens. Mastin and Serotkin were recalled only because of their support of Gov. Blanchard's state income tax increase -- but that's just the tip of the iceberg. A total of 600,000 people have signed petitions to vote again on Gov. Blanchard himself, even

When the voters become unhappy with their performance -- either after twoor four-year terms (or after 10 months) -- they have the right to vote to change that elected leader.


Some persons say fear of recall will slow down lawmaking efforts and will stop important votes on sensitive issues. We don't see it that way. Less lawmaking is better for our state, in all honesty. And votes representing the will and best interest of the majority of electors in any district will be appreciated by those voters.

Yes, maybe recalls are scary for lawmakers. But they're heartening for voters. They provide encouragement that -- after all -- we voters ARE in charge. That's the way it's supposed to be, anyway. Life is a gamble, as is elected office. The lucky players and the good players win more times than they lose, that's all.

DEAR EDITOR, Some time ago, Ed Foster and I were talking about how many blacksmiths there once were in Pigeon, I could

 only remember four of them. One was Frank Gotthardt on Berne Street. He lived in the house where Harold Thick now lives and had his shop south of his home. He shod horses and fixed wagons.

Berne Road was a busy road at the time. He sold out at auction sale and moved to Tennessee, Although I was a little boy. I was at that sale. Bill Scribner was the auctioneer, but I was too young to buy anything. Bill Hoppe had a shop where the Gulf gas station

now stands. I used to hang around there a lot and got water for him and his brother, Herman, at the house where Mrs. Lorenz Clabuesch now lives. Then there was Dan

Fisher. His shop was west of where Kretzschmer's Home Center is today. He was an old man, but a good blacksmith. When I worked for Otto

Rathje, I took his team in to get them shod and I had to help him hold their feet, so he could shoe them.

Then there was Lou Dondineau. His shop was just

east of where the Library is. My father used to take his horses there to get shod and get their hooves trimmed. Once he had his horses in

there, and I had gone with him up town that day. A man had a shoe repair shop next door and a lot of people used to go in there and visit with the shoemaker. My father and I were sitting there waiting for our horses, when all at once we heard two men yelling at each other.

They called each other names and made up a lot of them. We went over to see what was going once. They were in front of our team and were shaking their fists at each other.

There was an old man trying to part them and I guess our horses never saw a couple men so mad at each other. There was a woman standing close by and her face was red.



The information about bean promotion was given by Jim Byrum, executive secretary of the Bean Commission, who reported on MBC activities with fast-food companies. Byrum said that more than 50% of all meals are now consumed "away from home," making broader use of beans in eating places all the more important. He named Wendy's, Joan of Arc, Arby's, Hardees and Steak and Shake as companies which switched recently to use of beans -- in salad bars, chili, as baked potato topping, and other methods, including a "red bean and rice" dish Byrum told how the Commission is developing preparation methods through micro-wave and crockpot use. He also said product development of soups, pies, pastry shells and dips were other means for preparing and selling more

The key words in greater use involves good products, with simple recipes that are quick and easy to use, Byrum stated. This means that "you don't have to soak beans overnight anymore," he added, and told that during 1983, the Commission had distributed more than a half-million folders, leaflets and recipe books to explain how beans can best be used. The farmers have a role to play, he added, stating that "If you see Great Northern beans in a restaurant soup where you're eating, don't call me -- tell the manager that you want Navy Beans in the soup and point out that Navies are grown by Michigan Farmers."

In making his last appearance as a Commission member, Elenbaum said that he was proud that during his tenure there have been "better relations within the industry," and that there is better understanding among canners, processors and producers. In his remarks, Elenbaum emphasized that he had no fears that other states offer greater competition to Michigan bean producers because "they can't do it for any less than we can." He pointed out that "We can compete, and we will compete," adding that the one way to be the bean leader is with



"quality and dependability." The industry needs more consistency in acreage, Elenbaum said, because that would provide better price stability. In three years Navy Bean prices on the same date have gone from \$25 to \$9, to \$23,50. The man who served three years as Bean Commission Chairman said he had been "tossing around an idea," concerning bean prices, and feels that a starting point in acreage planning could be based on a bean price "of 10 times the market price on corn." Other states have beanpromotion agencies, he insisted, and what growers must consider is "what would happen if there were no MBC?"

Dale Kuenzli, former vo-ag teacher in Elkton and now president of Valley Marketing Co-operative of St. Johns, said flatly that "no one can tell where prices are going," but added that "supply and demand are in close proximity." He explained that Michigan will have about 3,775,000 bags of Navy Beans, Canada 825,000 bags and the Red River Valley 750,000, plus a carryover of somewhere above 1 million, for a supply of nearly 6.5 million bags. Improved harvesting techniques in bringing in the Dark Red Kidney crop drew Kuenzli's commendation because 'better quality means more sales." However, he said he

When is the most dangerous time in the life of dentures (sometimes called false teeth - but not by dentists)? The most dangerous period is when your dentures are out of

handled carefully when they're out of your mouth. Dropping them even a few nches into a washbowl can break them. Hold your dentures over a towel or a basin half-filled with water. Then, should they slip from your hand, there will be a cushion to help prevent damage.



Wildlife parenting

Being a father of three children and a counselor in the high school setting, I have more than an average interest in parents and parenting. Recent conference topics and professional journal articles expound the theory that many of the problems of today's youth are directly related to the style of parenting they receive when growing up. If thisis true, man could benefit greatly by observing wildlife. Here, in the animal and bird kingdoms, God has implanted such a strong parenting instinct, wildlife parents forsake food, safety and even life itself for the well-being of their offspring. A good example was recently presented to me while bow hunting in the Reed City area.

I had agreed to help my brother Charlie set up his deer camp for the rifle season in exchange for a couple of days of bow hunting on his leased land. The weekend before the rifle season's opener found me heading towards our meeting place in Clare while battling the remnants of an early snowstorm. We made our connection at Jay's Sporting Goods, a stop-over I always plan on any trip up north, and proceeded across the state on U.S 10. We arrived at his camp late in the afternoon and without unpacking, headed straight for the woods.

Although I did see seven deer that even ing, the raw wind and bitter cold were too much for me, and I headed for the trailer house while I still had hunting light left. The temperature dropped to 10° that night, and our fear of using a faulty gas heater in the trailer caused us to experience a true winter survival test. Morning found the temperature well below, and even though we hunted hard, we were unable to get any deer within arrow range. Sunday had warmed up considerably, and after a leisurely breakfast we were both eager to hunt.

Charlie decided to go back to his favorite stand, but bored with the promise of long hours in a cramped position, I chose to walk a good portion of the 320 acres were were hunting. My movements succeeded in driving a small buck toward my brother but he was unable to get a shot. I spotted at least five more deer in my ambling morning stroll, but each slipped away before the range narrowed to a point that was in my and my bow's, limitation. I finally was able to sneak within shooting range of a small buck and two does that were feeding in an open area. My misjudgment of range, plus an instinctive shooting style caused my arrow to sail over the buck's back and I was greeted by three bouncing white flags departing through the Aspen thickets. Upon closer inspection of the spot, I found that the deer were feeding on the remains of some carrots left my another bow hunter. I built a small ground blind, to break up my outline, and decided to spend a couple of hours

waiting in ambush I spent the first hour becoming attuned to the surroundings and was just beginning to enjoy the solitude when I caught a glimpse of a single deer working its way down a slope located south of my blind. The relaxation of my afternoon in the woods ended, and all my nerve endings came on instant alert. I shifted both my bow and my body to the most comfortable position, and slowly lowering my head on my chest, assumed a posture that I could hold perfectly still for 20 minutes or so.

Nothing happened. The deer had melted out of sight just as rapidly as he or she had appeared. I held my position for another 10 inutes, and then with my body screaming to be flexed and exercised, started to rise to a kneeling position. No sooner had I begun my first movement when I became aware of three deer moving directly towards my blind. Easing back down, and with strong protest from my cramped muscles, I assumed my former position and waited.

As the deer approached the edge of the Aspen stand through which they were traveling, I could make out a doe and her two yearling fawns. The one closest to her was a button buck, and because I couldn't see any headgear on the second, assumed it to be his sister. The doe stopped and surveyed the opening. She was now using all her senses to bring together a mental picture of the grassy spot that lay before her. It was obvious that both she and the fawns knew of the carrots, because every so often her eyes would rivet on the small depression

in front of my blind that held the tasty

morsels On two different occasions, one of the fawns would break past the doe and move from the protections of the Aspens. Each time she would emit a short, low-volumed snort which sent her offspring scurrying to their dutiful spot at her rear. Her nose was constantly twitchingt, trying to pick up some hint of scent which would tell her that danger was near. Her eyes were bent forward and cupped like a satellite dish, straining for a vibration that would transmit a picture of what was going on. All the time she was scenting and listening, her head was jerking back and forth in order to let her eagle-like eyes drink in the complete visual aspect of the area around the carrots. It was necessary for her head to move, as members of the deer family to not have good peripheral vision and must have their head pointing in the direction they want to see (a good point for deer hunters to know).

The doe spent at least 20 minutes collecting information from her eyes, ears and nose before she was satisfied that no danger existed for her and her twins. During this time I had remained motionless, and the slight breeze that struck me in the face had kept my tell-tale man smell out of her radarke nostrils.

She turned, and as if motioning to her children, started walking toward the carrot pile. The distance between the deer and my blind quickly lessened -- 50 yards, 40 yards, 20 yards. When she was 10 yards from the blind and screened by a small tree growing n the right corner, she suddenly stopped. Something had alerted her. I doubt if it was my scent as the breeze was still steady in my face. Perhaps the strange figure squatting in the pile or debris was unnatural. She let out a high-pitched snort and the fawns

I slowly raised my eyes and was met by ner piercing glance. She remained riveted n that position for a couple of minutes and then dropped her head and stomped her right front foot. The sound of the sharp hoof coming in contact with the frozen ground echoed off the rise behind me, and her head pivoted back in my direction to see if her challenge had somehow unnerved me into moving. I remained motionless, scarcely breathing.

She now was circling the blind, crashing a hoof to the ground in uneven intervals hopingt to provoke me into giving away my position. I'm sure that she didn't really know what or where I was, but some instinctive feeling was making her uncomfortable and she was going to find out what it was. All the time that their mother was going

through her paces in an attempt to discover if danger was present or not, the fawns did not move. If their nostrils were filled with the tantalizing odor of he waiting carrots, they gave no indication that they would ever disobey their mother.

The doe was moving away from me now, defiantly, as if to say, "I know you're there, but you don't scare me." She was still stomping and staring, and cupping her ears forward, while all the time her muscles were tense and ready for instant flight should anything happen. She had had enough. One loud bark from her partially open mouth and the fawns moved quickly to her side. Then with all the regality of a departing queen, she and her fawns disappeared into the trees.

Talk about parenting, she gets my vote for "Mother of the Year."


