News policy deserves explanation

People see the many words and occasional pictures of persons involved in legal battles every day on TV and in newspapers. Once legal proceedings have begun, in most cases, the media is able to write accurately about those activities without fear of retribution or retaliation.

That's what our system of laws says. In brief, a person is entitled to his or her privacy until that person is involved in a lawsuit or other legal wranglings. It makes sense, but such a system can cause frustrations, expenses and difficulties, too.

This brings to mind the legal question now facing the Michigan Supreme Court, asked by the Battle Creek Enquirer newspaper. It is asking the court to rule the paper accurately reported the arrest of a man as a rape suspect, and thus is protected from a libel suit by the man — who was later cleared of the crime.

In past cases, the truth of the matter (the fact that the person indeed was arrested by police) has prevented any libel judgments against the media, so long as the display and writing of the story appears not to be done in a malicious manner. This is a very crucial part of the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, granting citizens (including newspapers) freedom of speech and freedom of the press.

Newspapers in the past were exempt from libel in such cases if they accurately reported the situations, didn't single out individuals (writing about some, keeping others from print) and made corrections on a timely and accurate basis, if corrections were needed.

Now, the Battle Creek man's attorney says the newspaper should be liable for damages, since it has the responsibility to make sure its story was fully truthful. He says the paper practiced "reckless journalism" and claimed his client had seen the "almost total destruction" of his personal reputation following publication of the rape story. All this even though he indeed HAD been arrested and indeed had been considered a suspect in the crime — and the paper simply had published those facts. Plus, the paper carried the story when he was cleared of the crime by police.

The circuit court decision favoring the Enquirer was overturned in 1984 by the state Court of Appeals, and many newspapers are watching this case closely. The Supreme Court decision isn't expected for several months.

We hope a newspaper's right to publish legal proceedings — such as arrests or indictments, regardless of their outcome — will be preserved.

Our own handling of such matters is an example of the media's careful treatment of criminal and civil cases. The Progress-Advance doesn't publish names of persons charged in misdemeanors until — and only if — they are found guilty or plead guilty to such charges. We don't have adequate staff to cover all courts regularly.

The name of a person found innocent of misdemeanors or some felony suits will not have his or her name published, in most cases, in our pages. That way, no innocent record must be corrected — for dropping of charges rarely is viewed (and gossiped about...) as widely as are the original charges.

Felonies such as rape and murder are another matter, however. Due to the severity of the crime — and the public's rightful interest in whether suspects have been apprehended — we publish such names after charges have been made. And only then.

Following that, we synopsise such proceedings as changes occur — not giving you full-blown, "word-for-word" testimony which exceeds good taste and judgment — although other papers may not do so.

Our pledge for more than two years has been to accurately and completely cover all such legal proceedings pertaining to local courts and/or local citizens being tried in other courts. We attempt to show preference toward none, and we pledge to withhold no names whatsoever, regardless of the consequences. We believe this is what our public deserves — and what they also demand.

But as the Battle Creek situation shows, even publishing the truth can be difficult or — possibly worse — expensive and dangerous, for no apparent reason.

 Voelker, as sophomore, is the son of Otto and Anita Voelker of Pigeon.

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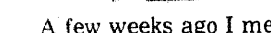
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**ROSES and THORNS**

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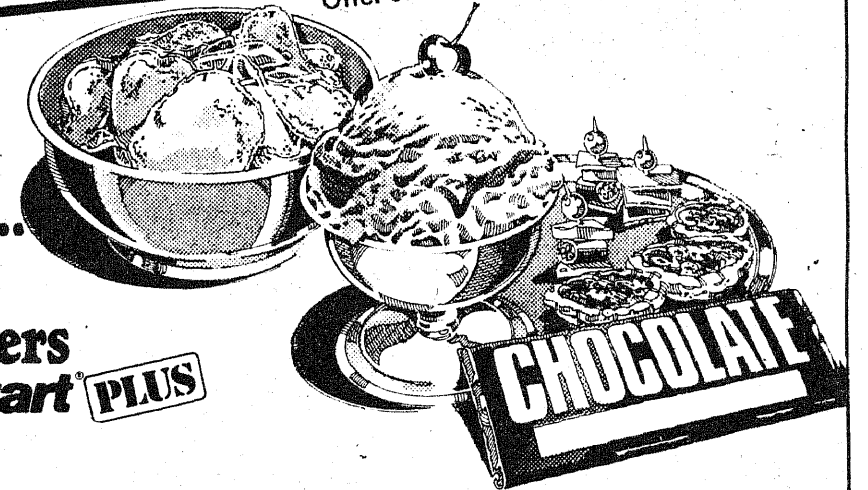

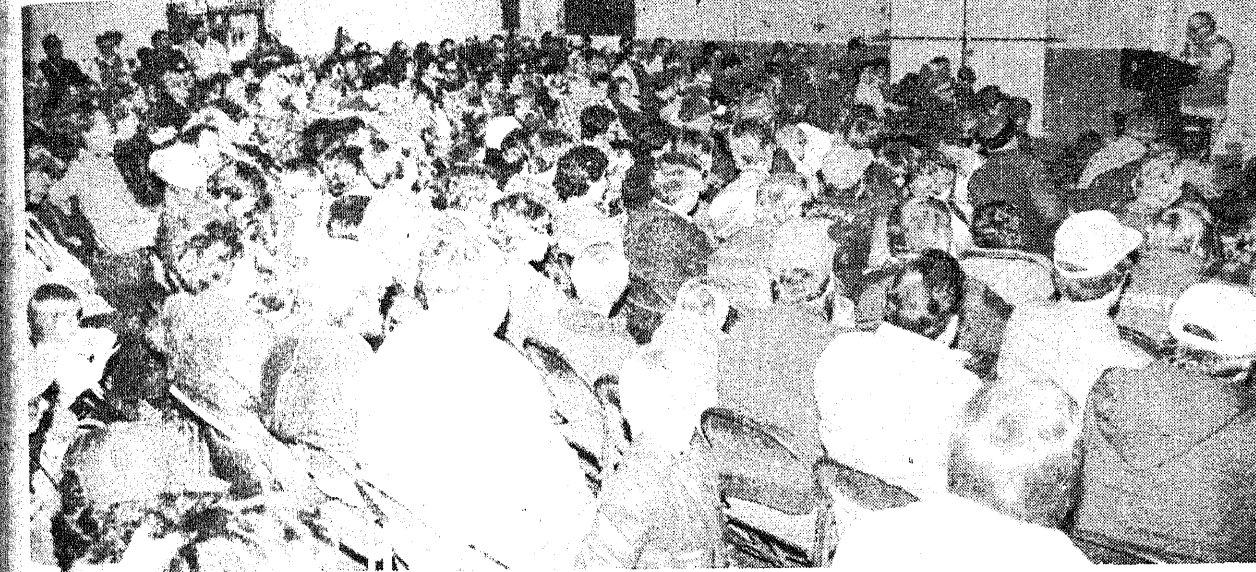

# Karls

David Mains is now the head of a daily radio ministry called "Chapel of the Air" that comes over Family Life Radio in Midland every morning from 7:30 to 7:45 a.m. This ministry is coordinating a 50-day experience across the nation (they are on over 300 stations nationally) with the title: "What would your church be like if Jesus Christ were an active physical member of the congregation for 50 days?"

This project involves hundreds of churches -- whoever wanted to send their pastor to this seminar -- and begins Feb. 9 for 50 days through Easter Sunday.

There are a number of facets integrated into this series. I mentioned one of them last December which is called the Sunday Search. Another facet deserves public disclosure and this one is called the Seven Secret Acts of Christian Love.

Not only is this concept a healthy command in Scripture (James 2:8 "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" etc.), but love in a church or community marks all times of genuine revival. It is worth repeating. Love in the church or community marks ALL times of genuine revival.

When Christ becomes an active physical member of any group and his presence is truly recognized, people are soon influenced by his spirit. In my personal prayer diary this morning I was captivated by John 10:17. "The reason my Father loves me is that I lay down my life." I had thought God loves regardless of any special reason. But anyway, John 15:13 says "Greater love has no one than this, that one lay down his/her life..." So logically Jesus is saying that the reason his Father loves him is that he displays the greatest love.

It is a good formula that receiving God's love is attained by practicing loving others deeply. Enter the seven secret acts.

Since we are about the experience Christ's bodily presence, the natural response is to seek his direction regarding acts of love we can do on behalf of others. In the course of the 50 days each person is to do and record seven such acts of love for others.

Someone may need money which you can provide. Another person might need your prayer support. You may have a skill such as cooking, carpentry or writing which could be deployed on another's behalf.

However, there is a catch. When possible, these acts are to be done in secret. The recipients are not to know who is responsible for this graciousness. Jesus says in Matthew 6:1: "Be careful not to do your acts of righteousness before others to be seen by them. If you do, you will have no reward from your Father in heaven."

One other catch is that at least two of the seven deeds should be done for people outside the church, especially those who have nothing to do with the Christian faith.

Now the question emerges, what is so hot about secrecy? Why is there no heavenly reward for non-secret acts?

The most obvious reason was given by Jesus when he stated that public acts receive enough reward from the people who see it and praise the doer of the act (Matthew 6:2).

The other reason really surfaced at the Wheaton seminar. Six churches were prototypes for this 50-day experience and have already completed the series. These six churches then hosted six seminars across the nation for pastors to receive the series instruction and examine what happened in a local church because of the series.

College Church in Wheaton had done the series and we heard from many people in the church. One such experience centered around a man who had a very biting and critical attitude. It seemed not one person's name could be mentioned without this man offering some word of criticism about that person.

Well, this critical man received several acts of Christian love and all of them were done in secret. Some of the acts required great sacrifice and love and the criticizing man was really touched. He wanted to thank the generous person for such deep generosity. But he had no idea who the generous person was.

As a result the criticizing man became very careful about how he commented on others for fear he just might lash out at the one who was so generous to him. He was so frustrated at first that he could not simply thank one person and return to his old nature. He necessarily had to work at developing a new nature. And he did.

Need I say more.

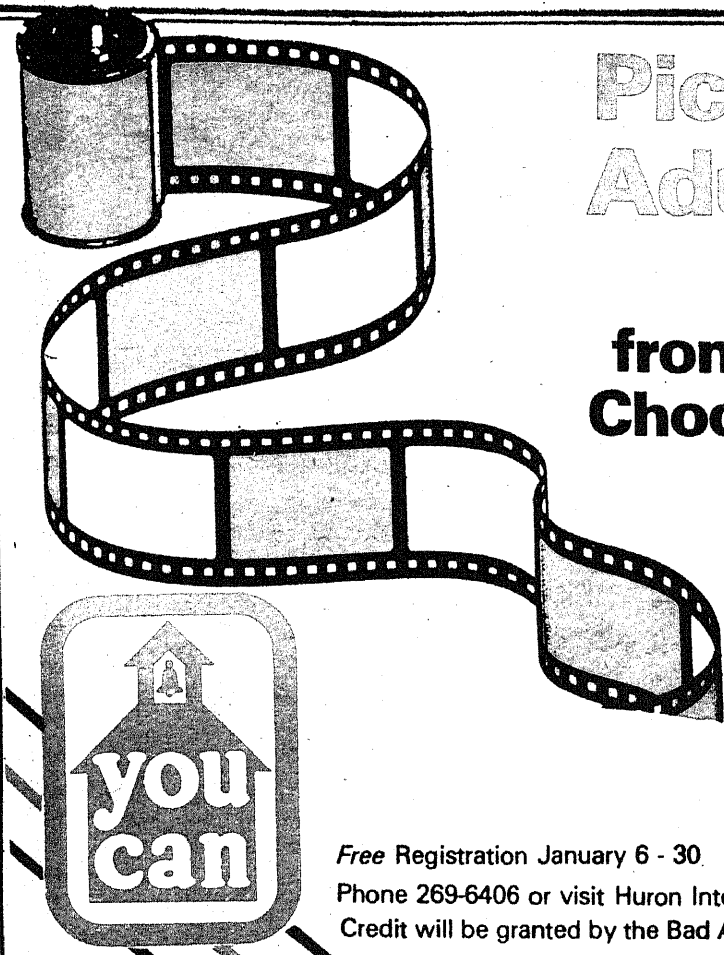

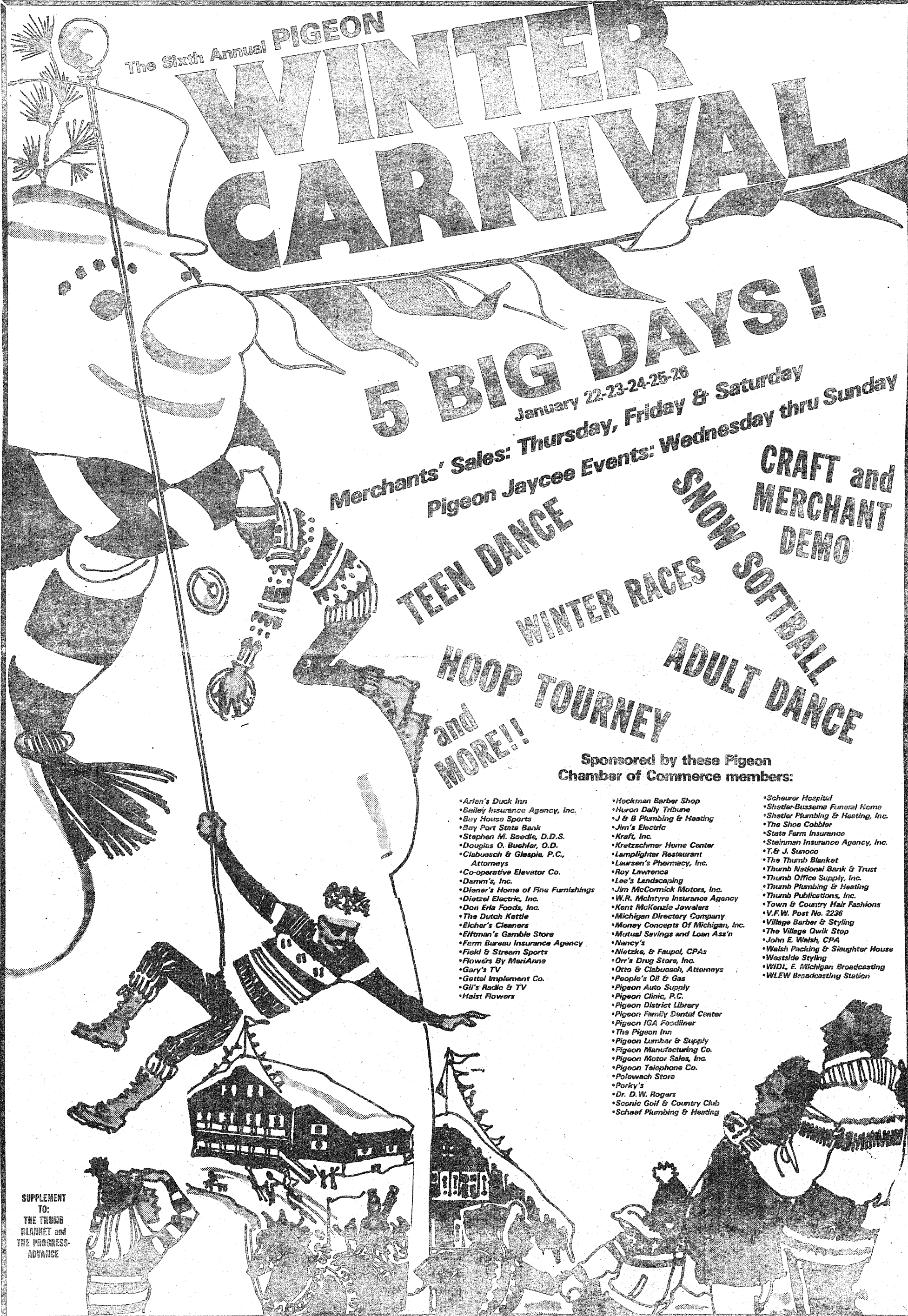

## And Remember These Cold Weather Medical Tips

1. Many light layers of clothing are warmer than one heavy layer.
2. Dark clothing will keep you warmer than light clothing.
3. To prevent heat loss through your head, wear a hat.
4. Tuck the ends of your scarf into your coat. This prevents accidents that happen when a scarf is caught in doors, car, elevators, etc.
5. Wear boots in bad weather.
6. Wool socks also do well in bad weather. They retain much of their heat when wet.
7. After a long cold spell, warm days are deceptive. Bundle up because its colder than it feels.
8. Frostbite can happen quickly so keep extremities such as ears and hands well protected.
9. For minor frostbite, soak the area in warm water. Do not rub it.
