NEWCENTURY EARNS PROFIT

NewCentury Bank Corp. earned profits of \$44,000 for the first quarter of 1986, up considerably from the \$11 million loss in 1985's last quarter, according to Clifford VanDyke, chairman and chief executive officer.

Net income dropped \$1.36 million from the same period last year, but VanDyke says the company is making progress "in our efforts to restore the organization to normal operation." NewCentury lost \$19 million in 1985, due mostly to ag loan losses.

NewCentury stockholders will vote May 1 whether to approve the corporation's proposed merger with First of America Bank Corp., of Kalamazoo. NewCentury has local offices in Elkton, Caseville, Bad Axe, Kinde, Ubyly and Minden City. First of America has offices in Sebewaing, Owendale, Gagetown, Bad Axe and Harbor Beach.

198 YOUTH JOBS OPEN

Nearly 200 local job positions are being offered in the 1986 Michigan Youth Corps program, according to Gov. James Blanchard.

Huron County positions total 47 summer jobs for young people, while 85 jobs are available in Tuscola County. Sanilac County offers 66 jobs this year.

In all, 12,500 unemployed 18-to-21-year-old men and women will gain work experience in the Youth Corps - part of an estimated 80,000 young people looking for work this year. Pay is \$3.35 an hour, working at parks, offices, schools, hospitals and along rivers, lakes, drains and highways.

Work projects start June 2 and end Sept. 31. Applications are available at Department of Social Services offices and Michigan Employment Security Commission offices.

HOLDSHIP NAMED AT CENTER

Ubyly High School Principal Richard Holdship has been named Principal of the Huron Area Skill Center, now under construction on M-53 southwest of Bad Axe. Holdship spent 17 years as a teacher and four years as Ubyly High Principal.

A special meeting of the Huron Intermediate School District's Board of Education is set for Tuesday, April 29 at 8 p.m., at the ISD office in Bad Axe, to discuss furniture bids recently received.

The new Skill Center is scheduled to open this fall for classes.

O-G SEEKS 6 NEW MILLS

Owendale-Gagetown School District voters will be asked June 9 to approve levying 6 mills for one year - plus renew 9.75 mills for five years - to provide general operating funds for the district.

The Owen-Gage Board of Education approved the two millage questions last Monday. Supt. Ronald Erickson said the district has not had a millage increase for five years, and noted the millages will barely keep the district even with expenses.

COURT PROCEEDINGS

Those three 17-year-old youths who are charged with causing more than \$3000 in damages April 6 at Unionville Elementary School have been bound over to Tuscola County Circuit Court on charges of malicious destruction of property over \$100.

The youths damaged and destroyed a reported 35 windows, plus doors and building panels. One has been a USA School junior and the other two are USA sophomores. All have been expelled for the remainder of the school year. No trial date has been set, pending arraignment. Each is free on \$7500 bond.

Ronald Davis, 37 of Caro, has been sentenced to 15 months in federal prison, following his March 4 guilty plea to misusing \$123,706 in bank funds. He was charged with misapplying and converting the money while an Assistant Vice President of Peoples State Bank of Caro. Davis is free on bond until May 7, when he begins his term.

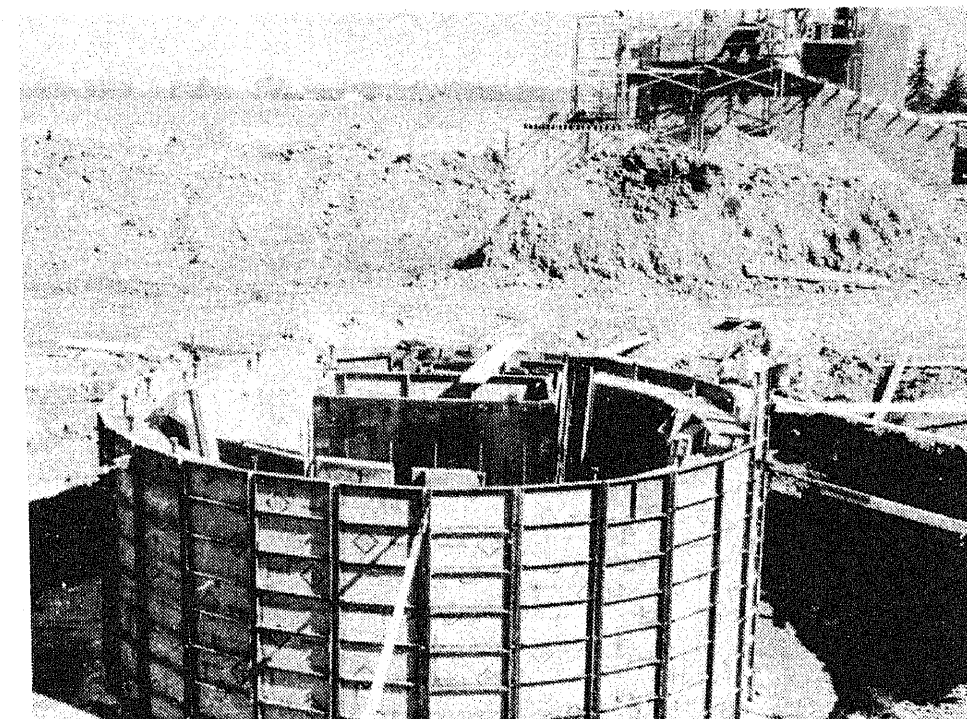
In Huron County District Court, Judge John Schobel heard these pleas and made these determinations in recent activity:

Brian Nitz, 24 of Sebewaing, pled guilty to furnishing alcohol to minors, following an April 5 incident in Sebewaing; ordered to pay \$100 in fines and costs;

Dina Sprague, 17 of Bay Port, pled guilty to a charge of larceny under \$100, following an April 4 incident at a Bad Axe drug store; ordered to pay \$75 fines and costs;

Darren Lutz, 19 of Sebewaing, and Leota Zywicki, 55 of Caseville, both pled guilty to charges of impaired driving; ordered to pay \$400 fines and costs and loss of driving rights for 90 days.

In Arenac County District Court, Richard Heine, 30 of Pigeon, pled guilty to drunken driving; sentencing is set for May 7, and he faces other charges in Huron County, court records show.

SUMMARY OF PARENTS' COFFEE HOUR
Gifted Children Coordinator for the Huron Intermediate School District, Mrs. Shirley Edwards, presented a program on Gifted Children for 21 parents in two coffee hour sessions last Tuesday.
Because of a drop in state funds, programs for Gifted Children have been short-lived until this decade, when more interest and state funding became available. The HISD hired two gifted children consultants in 1982 and the money also provides for local programs and funds for Summer Institute Programs for high school sophomores and juniors for a two-week program.
Mrs. Edwards gave advice for parents who think their children may be gifted. She says that parents can help provide a "passion for learning," because the schools cannot do everything for your child. Parents who think their child is gifted may not be correct, as parents often do not see their youngster in comparison with others.
Here's a checklist to use:
1) Arrange toys and other possessions, putting the same kinds of things.
2) Creates make-believe playmates as he or she plays house or different games.
3) Learns easily, so you have to tell him or her something only once.
4) Asks "Why?" often and really wants to know the answer. Is curious about lots of things, from a tiny insect and how it's "made" to a car and how it works.
5) Sticks with a task longer than others do. Won't give up easily.
6) Collects things, likes to organize them and doesn't want anyone to mess them up, but doesn't always collect neatly.
7) Can carry on a conversation, and enjoys it. Wants your ideas and likes you to listen to his or hers. Uses big words and knows what they mean.

THIS WEEK'S Thumb Area Outdoor Report

Spring fishing rolled into full swing during the past weekend. Pier fishermen found numerous Browns and Steelheads in the Port Austin vicinity, while trollers were plying the waters off Harbor Beach in search of Kings and Cohos.
Perch were active at Harbor Beach with nice-sized fish being the rule rather than the exception. Perch were also hitting off Bay Port and Sebewaing.
Smelt dippers worked the shoreline around the Oak Beach region and took plenty of the little silver fish between 10 pm and midnight. Smelt were also running in good numbers off Rock Fall Creek on the east side of the Thumb, and Willow Creek near the tip of the Thumb.

For the time being, the DNR is operating without the services of a permanent director. After the resignation of Dr. Skoog, the 7-member commission appointed Gordon Guyer, of East Lansing, to serve as interim director until a permanent director is selected. While Guyer assured the commission that he will not be a "lame duck" administrator, one wonders what kind of an impact he will have on a department that is in desperate need of a strong director. Guyer has also said that he is not interested in being a candidate for the permanent job, but that, also, may be a smoke screen.

A heated debate is shaping up over the right of the DNR to sell Salmon eggs to a private firm. Attorney General Frank Kelley announced that the DNR did not have the legal authority to continue its 3-year-old contract of selling the fish to Tempotech Industries in Hart. Snagging enthusiasts hailed the announcement, because they feel that a return to snagging rather than sales will be the best way to control the Salmon population on several rivers.
However, a recent bill introduced by Sen. Phil Arthurhult, R-Whitehall, will permit the state to sell, through a contract with a private firm, millions of pounds of fish and Salmon eggs annually. Arthurhult said his bill should hand the DNR the authority it needs.

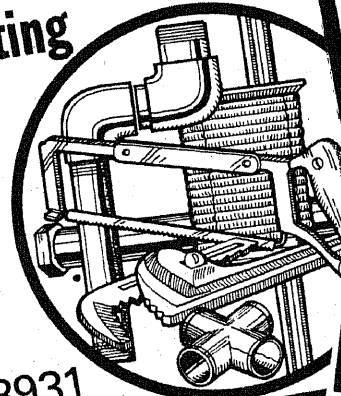

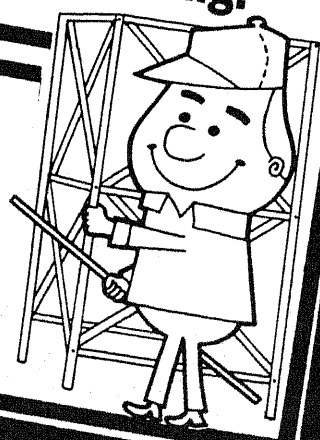

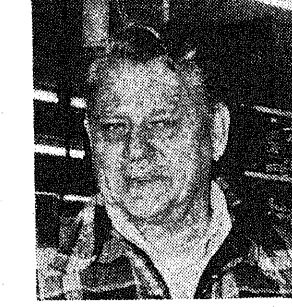

A float on history

Opening weekend of the Michigan Trout season is, for many, a rite of spring. Regardless of the weather, or fishing conditions, the last Saturday in April ushers in a brand new season of nostalgia. Someone once said that the greatest fishing is done in books and bars. However, there are still a few of us, myself included, who feel the greatest fishing trip you have ever been on is the one you're on now. So it was a couple of years ago when I had the opportunity to fish the last Saturday in April on an AuSable River boat. Not only would there be nostalgia, but fishing out of one of these boats would be like a float on history.

The AuSable River was not the only Trout and Grayling stream in Michigan, but for some reason, it was the only one that actually created a specific type of fishing craft that was almost used solely on the river.

The exact date of the invention of the boat is lost in history. And for that matter, there may not be an exact date, but rather a progression of one idea on top of another until the final product is achieved. Whatever the case, the AuSable River boat has lasted, unchanged, through generations of time.

The boat, like other things that endure the test of time, is both practical and beautiful. Meant to be a stable fishing platform for gentlemen fly fishermen, it is a study in design.

The boat is long, ranging from 18 to 24 feet, has a flat bottom and sweeps upward at both the bow and the stern. It is maneuvered from the stern seat by means of a pole. The operator plants the pole against the bottom and steers the craft by moving the stern from side to side. Unlike the canoe, in which the bow is brought to bear, the river boat is very ungainly for the novice, but in the hands of an expert it becomes poetry in motion.

With a stern that sweeps upward, the boat handler can hold the large craft motionless against the river current by merely holding the pole against the bottom. The unique design allows the rushing water to spill beneath the craft instead of pushing against the stern, as it would in a normal boat. In the early days before roads and boat launches crisscrossed the area, skilled boatmen would float a fisherman down the stream and then turn around and pole upstream to the starting point.

The length of the boat was established to place a good deal of distance between the front swivel seat, on which sits the fly casting fisherman, and the rear seat which holds the constant ducking guide. The boat

has a shallow draft, and the slightly-slanted sides are a mere 6 inches above the waterline.

The early boats were made of mahogany teak and oak, which were the common woods for boat builders. Modern day craft are now made of marine plywood with mahogany and oak trim. The use of plywood results in a stronger, lighter boat than the original. Covered with the standard green paint on the outside, imitations are hard to tell from the originals.

Other accoutrements include a live well beneath the front seat, a motor mount board on the stern, and the traditional eyelet through which passes the rope that is hooked to the drag chain.

For my trip, I hired a guide who taught school during the winter months. His knowledge of Trout and riverboats was obvious immediately, and all during the trip he spewed out a constant stream of historical facts concerning the river.

The fishing was average for an opening day, but the conditions were superb. The guide pointed out holes and positioned the boat, so I could fish each one methodically. I was comfortably dressed in tennis shoes, khakis, and a short-sleeve shirt. I didn't have to worry about waders, or snags, or getting out of the river to walk around holes too deep to wade through. As a matter of fact, all I had to do on this trip was concentrate on fishing.

The fate of the AuSable River boat is in tremendous shape. Plans from some of the originals are available in books about the area, while others are guarded jealously from prying eyes. A local once told me he thought there were more river boats in operation now than at any time in history.

The Grayling, a fish responsible for the fame of the AuSable River, may be gone, but the boats that fished for them will continue to slip along the river's surface for years to come.
