According to Chamber President Mike LePage, the car give-away is designed to bring even more shoppers to Pigeon during the Christmas season and to add excite-

ment and a festive atmosphere to downtown Pigeon during the holidays.

In addition to the Grand Prize Adult Drawing, the popular childrens' toy giveaway has been set for each Saturday from Nov. 28

through Dec. 19.
"We've got to do some things in a big way to keep people shopping in town," explained LePage. "Other towns have water, a resort status or some other draw. We have to really work to keep shoppers here.

DETAILS: He and other Chamber Board members have been working on details for the promotion. Tentative plans include building a 'stage" to use for the drawings, in which 10 padlocks will be displayed and each one of the 10 finalists will receive a key to try to open their lock.

Of the 10 finalists, two will be lucky qualifiers for the final drawing on Dec. 19. Each of the 10 weekly winners will receive a gift certificate of Pigeon Money.

New tickets will be drawn each week, so a total of 10 finalists will try their luck at the "special padlocks."
"This should be a fun and exciting event for the whole community, as we watch two people each week qualify for the brand new car," says LePage.

Kretzschmer named to Ag Commission

Vernon Kretzschmer of Bay Port has been ap-pointed to a four-year term on the Michigan Agricul-ture Commission by Gov.

James Blanchard, Kretzschmer, 55, is a longtime farmer and local ag businessperson, and will serve on the five-member board which oversees operations of the Michigan Department of Agri-culture. The Ag Commission establishes policies and appoints the director of the \$50 million Ag Department.

He was named to the post Friday, to succeed Robert Chaffin of Ithaca, who did not seek re-appointment. Also named by Gov. Blanchard on Friday was Dr. S. Leon Whitney of Detroit, who was re-appointed to another Ag Commission

Kretzschmer's appointment is subject to State Senate confirmation, which is expected, according to the Governor's office.



30,000 CHICKENS DIE: Fire of undetermined origin Thursday night destroyed a 48-by-270 foot barn at the Arlin Swartzendruber farm, 230 S. Bay Port Road, Bay Port which housed 30,000 chickens. His brother, Leland, reported the fire at 10:37 p.m., as he prepared for bed, in his residence about a halfmile north of the chicken coop. When Fair Haven Township firemen arrived, the single-story coop building was engulfed in flames, believed started in electrical work.

Fire tankers and men from Pigeon (Winsor), Sebewaing and Owendale fire departments assisted at the scene for about five hours. No other buildings were lost, including an adjacent hog farrowing building. Damage was estimated at more than \$140,000 by firemen. Investigation is continuing.

YOU CAN'T WIN - The family of a Port Huron area woman is suing the police officer who DIDN'T arrest the woman during last year's Port Huron to Mackinac pre-race

The family is saying the city police officer should have arrested the woman after observing she was intoxicated, one hour before she was struck by a car and killed, as she walked in the road of the busy Pine Grove Avenue (that's M-25)

The officer had observed the woman and a friend about 1:45 a.m. that night, amid all kinds of activities by 100,000 persons looking over the sailing boats before the race. The officer should have stopped and arrested her, the dead woman's family now says.

"She lost her life because of the irresponsibility of a policeman who didn't do his job," the woman's father says, in explaining the lawsuit.

HURON ROAD VOTE TUESDAY Huron County voters will cast ballots next Tuesday, Sept 29 in a special county-wide election for Tuesday, Sept. 29, seeking a 1.3-mill tax increase for maintenance and construc

tion of county roads and bridges. The three-year plan would generate about \$878,000 each year, and could continue the third and fourth years of a master plan to improve bridge and road upkeep. Of that figure, \$206,000 would be earmarked for villages and cities in the county -- leaving a \$673,000 figure for county-wide

primary road work. The first two years of funding came from county general funds, but no fund balance now exists from which to draw such money, County Board of Commissioners members say.

Road improvements in the 1988-90 resurfacing program in clude Caseville Road from M-142 to Sebewaing Road, Stein Road from M-25 to Bay Port, Bay Port Road from Stein to Canboro, Filion Road from Caseville to Gagetown, Gagetown Road from Filion to Berne, Berne Road from Gagetown to Sturm and Sturm Road from Richardson Road to the railroad tracks, among others. The millage election will cost about \$14,000 to conduct.



WE WERE SO READY FOR SCHOOL at our house this year due to the delayed school starting. Waiting through Labor Day and starting the day after meant that summer's end was settled and minds could turn to education without any interruption of unfinished summer business.

I hope that others felt the same - we liked the wait until Labor Day and hope that we can try it again sometime.

Tearly everyone who drives an automobile revenue sharing funds are nearly gone now. and you'll see that adequate funds must come from SOMEWHERE to maintain local roads.

A multi-year request to repair weary bridges failed two years ago. This request by the Huron County Road Commission is more wellrounded, and nearly every county resident will certainly benefit somehow from it.

The 1.3-mill request is being sought for three years. It will generate \$878,000 annually, of which \$205,000 will be set aside for local village street work. Pigeon will get \$19,727, Elkton \$15,998, Caseville \$16,577, Port Austin \$13,827, Kinde \$5110, Owendale \$2350, Sebewaing \$25,774 and Bad Axe \$50,8100 for example. That's an improvement, since rural and town folks use those roads and streets.

The remaining \$673,000 will be used where it's truly needed most -- on township rural roads and bridges. Tens of miles of pavement break-ups will be remedied, bridges will be strengthened and replaced -- and safer motoring will result.

The improvements will be around for many, many years after a few more dollars of millage are approved. This is one millage request which everyone benefits from, and it's one which deserves everyone's support.

Your "YES" vote on Tuesday will pave the road for an even better way of life here at the tip of Michigan's Thumb. Everyone will be better off, on safer, improved and more durable roads, streets and bridges.

The soft colors of an early fall morning made a pleasant greeting as I slipped through the narrow opening of my mountain tent and rustled through the wooden grub box for the coffee fixin's. I had arrived late the night before, and with only one day to fish I wanted to make the most of every daylight hour.

My plans were simple. Phone calls the week before had pinpointed the early fall Steelhead run on the Big Manistee River near a favorite campsite of mine. So I planned to spend the entire day in a series of holes that covered a couple hundred yards. This prime fishing water was just a stone-throw from camp so I skipped breakfast and would catch an early lunch if hungry. Right now, all I wanted to do was

Everything was perfect, except for the fish. As it often happens with the anadromous species - migratory fish that ascend rivers to spawn - the old: "here today - gone tomorrow" adage held true to

If there were any fish in the holes I worked, they were not interested in any of my offerings. Different leaders, amounts of split shot, types of flies, color of flies, I pored through my entire gamot of fishing knowledge and didn't produce one measly strike. By noon I was fed up and seriously considered packing up and going home. In the end I did pack up, but decided to give another river a few miles south a last-ditch

try.

The Pere Marquette, or PM as it is known locally, is a beautiful, dam-free toward. river running westerly in its course toward Lake Michigan. Once known for its famous Brown Trout fishing, it now has become one of the premiere fly fishing streams for Steelhead in the country. I would have headed for it first, but a local, perhaps try-ing to keep the fish for himself, informed me a couple days earlier that the fall run had not yet begun in earnest. I decided to give it a try anyway. Besides it was on the way home.

I finally slipped into the water at 4 pm. With about 3½ hours of fishing time left I did not dally when it came to selecting sites or fishing water. I had turned the truck down the first dirt road that announced a public access, and broke the "getting ready" record for donning waders and rigging fly tackle.

I was a few miles downstream from Baldwin, right on the edge of the "club country". Some members can get downright nasty if they catch you trespassing on their land, but I wasn't worried for the dry summer had kept the river low and very wadable, especially in this section.

I popped on a mayfly nymph of my owr design and strung 4 split shots a couple feet on top. Flipping the bug into the head of the first hole, I thrilled to the familiar "taptap-tap" of the lead striking the small stones that made up the bottom. The first pass was a flop as were the next 10, so I moved downstream to the next dark recess

My nymph got halfway through the next run before it hung up on the bottom. I reeled in the slack line and gave it a big jerk. I was met with a wild eruption of spray and a silver fish, as bright as a newly-minted coin, flip-flopping a couple feet in front of my nose. How I landed him I'll never know, but land him I did along with 2 more just as bright and full of fight as the first

I waded out of the river at a quarter past 8. Tired, dripping wet from landing fighting fish, and tinglingly warm with the excitement of stumbling on a fishing "hot spot" that wasn't supposed to be so hot.

The fish had been very cooperative. striking violently at my nymphs, and hooking themselves in the process. Most outfought me and won their freedom via broken lines and straightened hooks. Of the 3 I landed, all had won their freedom.


