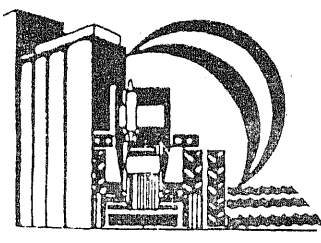

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## Thumb Weekly News Round-Up

### MAN CHARGED IN SHOOTING

A Huron County man is in custody awaiting charges on a shooting incident that occurred at 3:52 a.m. Sunday in Sebewaing that left one person injured.

According to Huron County Prosecutor Leslie A. Hagen, the shooting took place at a home in the village of Sebewaing, and a 27-year-old Sebewaing resident was apparently shot with a 12 gauge shotgun.

The victim was taken to Bay Medical Center in Bay City for treatment, but he was later transferred by helicopter to the University of Michigan Hospital.

A 27-year-old Sebewaing resident was taken into custody as a suspect and the alleged weapon was recovered.

"The investigation is still going on. There were people on the premises when it happened, and they all have to be contacted before any more information can be released," said Hagen Monday. She could offer no more information at this time on the motive for the shooting.

The Sebewaing Police Department and the Huron County Sheriff Department are conducting the investigation.

According to Hagen, she hoped to issue charges against the alleged assailant by Monday afternoon.

This is the second shooting incident in nine months in this the normally quiet community.

Donald Carter of Sebewaing is lodged in the Huron County Jail awaiting sentencing Dec. 11 for the shooting death of his wife in June.

### CASEVILLE PARK USER FEES OVERTURNED — FOR NOW...

Huron County residents might not see user fees after all at the Caseville County Park this summer. Beach goers should be able to smile this year because the controversial fee appears to be a dead issue, since a motion to continue it died on a 3-3 vote by County Commissioners this week.

Commissioners who voted "yes" to continue park fees were Robert Hogan of Bad Axe, Julia Heilig of Ubyly and Robert Witherspoon of Port Hope; those who voted "no" were R. Dale Wertz of Bay Port, Bruce Kuhl of Sebewaing and Chairman Martha Thuemmel of Port Austin.

Last summer the county spent \$10,000 to construct toll booths at the Caseville Park, to collect daily charges for beach use. While this round stops the fees for now, other proposals seeking park fees may come up for their approval.

### HERITAGE/CRAFT MEETING FEB. 11

The next planning session for the proposed Thumb Area heritage/craft cooperative is planned at 7 p.m. next Tuesday, Feb. 11, in USA High School Woodshop, according to Supt. William D. Dodge, who is heading up organizational efforts. Eleven prospective members attended the first session in December, and Dodge says interest is growing.

Historic items from early fishermen in the area, including fish decoys, lures and other items, developed by early settlers, are being listed and catalogued, Dodge stated.

Dodge and other organizers hope to develop a good retail sales outlet in the Western Thumb, and perhaps a mail order business could follow. All potential crafts-people are invited to attend and add to the excellent ideas that were advanced for products and sales at the original meeting, Dodge says.

### HURON SPENDS FOR ROADS

Huron County residents will see some new road signs, and motorists and emergency vehicles will find traveling in Huron County a little easier in coming years.

County Commissioners this week approved spending \$25,000 for a road sign upgrade program, as first-year spending on the three-year project. Tentative plans are to spread costs over a three-year period, but commissioners have made no firm financial commitment for future years.

The \$25,000 will provide new signs at 350 county road intersections. In all, about 850 more local intersections will need signs in the future.

Many of the signs in rural areas are made of wood and nailed to utility poles, sometimes several feet from the roadway, officials note. Some signs have faded badly over

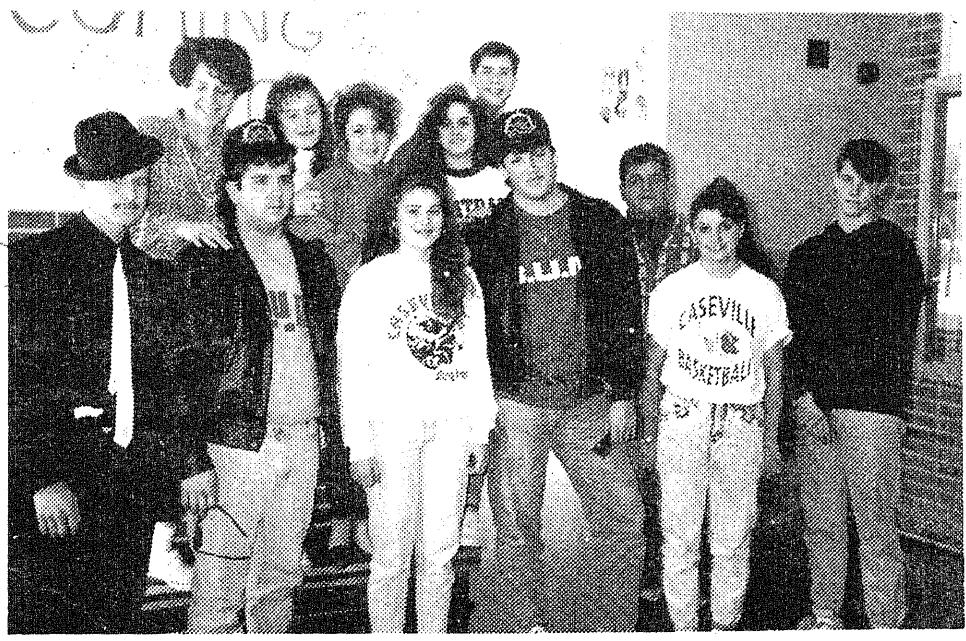

## 'Gettysburg' in play regionals

Can today's students write a "real" play?

This year, Laker High School students Will Eichler, Kristin Southworth, Greg Nimtz, Danielle Damen, Ben Lang, Liesl Eichler, Tom Motz and Heidi Schwandt got together to write a play called "Gettysburg."

At district competition on Jan. 25, this same student-written play received a "one" rating to qualify for regional competition at Auburn Hills Avondale High School.

Other schools in regional competition will be Avondale High School, Rochester

High School, Ann Arbor Huron High School, Sterling Heights Stevenson High School and Southfield High School.

If this play is rated highly at regional competition, the theater students will qualify for state finals at Central Michigan University on Feb. 14 and 15.

The play has been receiving rave reviews from faculty, students and the public, following its performances, according to Laker Drama Advisor Mike Terrill.

"People seem to be amazed at the quality of the play as

well as the emotion appeal the student actors bring to the stage," he says.

The play follows the Stone family of Niles, MI and the impact the Civil War had on their life. The plot is based on the actual story of the youngest "Yankee" at the battle of Gettysburg, who actually was from Michigan.

The community is invited to one last "encore" performance of "Gettysburg" next Wednesday, Feb. 12 at 7 p.m. at Laker High School.

What is being called the largest drug bust in Huron County's history has led to the arrest of a 41-year old Sheridan Township man.

More than \$124,000 in cash and materials were confiscated in the raid last Friday morning.

Paul Douglas Dean of Bad Axe was arrested at a house on Ivanhoe Road, after members of the Thumb Narcotics Unit, the State Police and Huron County Sheriff's Department searched the house and discovered drugs, weapons, money and other paraphernalia.

According to Sheriff Michael Gage and State Police Post Commander Lee MacDowell, seized in the raid were:

■ 296 grams, or 10 1/2 oz. of cocaine valued at over \$36,250;

■ 40 lbs. of marijuana valued at \$60,000;

■ cash totaling \$28,000; and

■ several handguns, long guns and a machine gun.

Huron County Prosecuting Attorney Leslie Hagen said that Dean was arraigned Friday afternoon, and charged with one count of possession with intent to deliver 225 grams or more, but less than 650 grams of cocaine, one count of possession with intent to deliver marijuana, and a felony firearm charge.

If convicted, Dean could face a mandatory minimum sentence of 20-30 years for cocaine possession, along with a maximum penalty of four years on the marijuana charge, and a mandatory two years on the weapons charge. Dean may also face a federal firearms charge because a Thompson .45-cal. sub-machine gun was seized in the raid, Hagen said.

Dean faces a preliminary examination in front of Circuit Court Judge Richard Knoblock Thursday morning, and is lodged in the Huron County jail until then.

Several other people were at the Ivanhoe Road residence, but were not taken into custody, she added.

Sheriff Michael Gage said that under a forfeiture law, all the cash seized at the raid will be turned over to the Thumb Narcotics Unit and will be used to continue investigations into illegal drug sales in the Unit's four counties of operation. The TNI includes forces from Huron, Tuscola, Sanilac and Lapeer Counties.

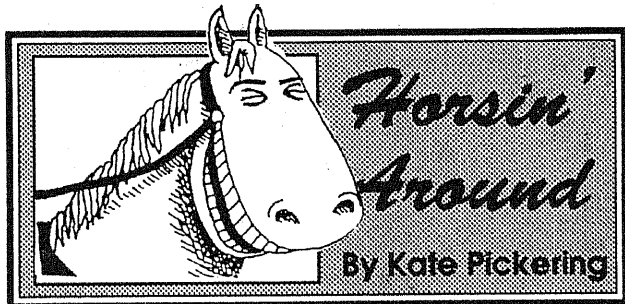

## Campaign against AIDS downplays abstinence

### 190 HORSES

"I have a dream. I ride . . . 190 horses . . . at once!"

These words - spoken in low, sensual tones by some nameless, faceless man - is interspersed with fast moving footage of a narrow winding trail that courses through a green and watery wooded swamp!

Man I love that commercial, but I can't honestly tell you which car it is for . . . in fact, I'm lucky I can say it's for a car at all, because for me - the whirling footage of brushy forest, the sight of that narrow path, and the sound of those pounding hooves does not inspire the desire for a car! That commercial, instead, takes me back in time . . .

It was late August 1991, and my sister and I - being in the right place at the right time - managed to get ourselves an invite to an "invitation-only" trail ride. Our rather rugged and robust host for this warm and humid summer evening's ride had decided to lead our small, intimate group through some seriously unsettled back woods located south of Port Hope.

It began harmlessly enough, our eager and happy horses all bouncing off zestfully across a wide, spacious field. The field came abruptly to an end and we descended a treacherous, rocky, slope, splashing across the shallow, clear river running at the bottom. We wound along the grassy river bank, a happy and talkative group of horse enthusiasts, until we ascended another steep incline and crossed a seldom traveled dirt road. It was then that we headed into the foreboding, dense forest.

Shortly after the river crossing I began to notice the speed of our ride increasing in small but progressive increments. We had gone from saunter to walk to jog to canter, and we now entered the woods at a hand gallop. This made me a little nervous, the trail being dark and narrow, and the territory being unfamiliar. But like a champ my horse was pacing himself, using his energy with all the skill and know-how of a well tuned athlete. His breathing was rhythmic and regular, and his skin would dampen, then dry, indicating to me that his in-born cooling system was in perfect working order. He moved along the uneven ground of the rock strewn path picking his feet up quickly, and placing them down again carefully, just as tireless, sure-footed and dependable as a mountain goat. I glowed with pride and admiration at his unquestioning strength and courage (just like I "glow" every second of every minute that I am aboard him!)

It was then that I realized a silent challenge had been issued! I believe our host was trying to gauge the strength and courage of his guests, for wordlessly our hand gallop through this treacherous forest turned into a full gallop. Those who couldn't keep up would be lost - and those who could would indeed be challenged by the obstacles which lay ahead - long stretches of watery swamp, short patches of deep mud, downed trees to jump over, hair pin curves to negotiate, and rocks and debris the entire distance. Common sense told me to pull up and spare my horse, despite the ridicule that might follow once back at the trailers, but my horse told me something different. He told me he was up to this challenge . . . hell he was above it, and it would take much more than a little bush-whacking to see us ground to a halt! I looked behind me, and the determined look on the face of my sister's hearty horse told me that he and she felt exactly the same! No stopping us now!

It seemed like a hundred miles that we careened through that creepy woods, since with every step I issued forth a little prayer that my horse wouldn't wrench an ankle or fall ass over apple cart. But soon enough I saw daylight at the end of the tunnel-like trail, and out into a breezy, sun-drenched grassy meadow we all burst forth, tugging at our horses mouths, bouncing and sliding to a halt! We lived!

So, pass on the expensive import car if a ride like that is something you'd like to experience. You don't need a hundred and ninety horses to achieve that sensation - all you need is one good one!

Of By-Gone Days

Sometime ago I went down Maxwell Rd. and went past the place where our county school used to stand. A lot of pleasant memories came to my mind.

There were over 50 of us in that one-room school. We only had one teacher for all eight grades and we always had good order in the school. The teacher used to have control over the pupils. She could use the rubber hose on us if we needed it and the parents stuck up for the teacher.

I remember once my father took us to school and he told the teacher if his children didn't behave, she should let him know and he'd take care of us.

We didn't even have a gravelroad to walk on. We'd walk between the ditch and the fence and when the snow got deep, we'd walk down the road. There was no such thing as a snowplow. 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# Woods & Waters

## CALL OF THE WILD

Last weekend, while browsing in a gift shop up north, I was drawn to a small print hanging on one of the walls. It was set deep within the confines of a beautiful, light oak frame and masterfully matted in shades of teal green and soft tan.

It wasn't the frame-makers composition that held me entranced for several minutes, but the print itself, for the masterful cameraman-artist, in my opinion, had managed to frame the perfect depiction of wilderness. From the title of this article, I'm sure you think the print must have had some Alaska or Arctic connotations.

After all, Jack London, did use it for his now-famous book on life in the northland. Or perhaps some of you conjured up visions of wolves, or tough dogs, that pull sleds and fight like a champion. If you did, you were wrong. For even though those thoughts do relate to wilderness in its truest sense, they were far from the picture at hand.

The print I viewed was of a bird. A once common bird in our fair state, it now has been driven by encroaching civilization to the brink of disappearance.

Of all the bird species indigenous to Michigan, this bird best symbolizes the beauty and wilderness of the north country. Its Latin name is *Cavia immer*, but most of us know it only as the Common Loon.

You're like me, once you have heard the exotic loon language you will never forget it. To some it may be distressful, especially at night, while you huddle in the down sleeping bag on a remote Upper Peninsula lake.

Fishermen or backpackers have sworn that it sounds like a woman laughing insanelly. To others, it is calm

and soothing, a thing of tranquil beauty. For many, it is a call in the wild that exemplifies the true wilderness experience.

I was not only captivated the first time I heard a loon in the wilds of our beautiful Upper Peninsula, but also the first time I saw one. It is a large bird with distinctive plumage.

It has a jet-black head, a snow-white belly, a back that is both checkered and spotted with stripes around the neck. All of these vivid colors are set off by a pair of brilliant red eyes.

The plumage described is worn by both the male and female during the summer months when they reside in the northern portions of the United States. In the winter, when they migrate to the

southern coastal regions, they change to dull mixtures of grays and tans.

The loon is a diving bird, relying on vision and its fast swimming speed to gather food. Since the bird must see what it is trying to catch, clear, clean water is mandatory. Because of this fact, loons are a perfect indicator of pollution-free water.

Another unique characteristic of the Common Loon is its solid bone structure and the density of its body. These two traits, plus its "torpedo shape" makes it one of the best divers in the bird kingdom.

If you approach one resting on the water, you may be surprised at its ability to submerge silently. They ride low in the water to begin with, and sometimes only the neck

and head are exposed. While they may be great in the water, they look rather ungainly on land, and in the air. They need a water runway for takeoffs and landings and the short wingspan in relation to its body weight makes flying, an effective, although laborious task. Once on land, it waddles comically.

The nests are always built close to the water where the female lays a clutch of two eggs. While both the male and the female attend the nest, it is often left alone during the course of the day.

This makes the eggs susceptible to predators and the propagation of the species difficult. Studies within the past several years indicate that the Common Loon is losing ground in the population game. The loss of habitat or the degrading of the present habitat are two of the most common causes.

As the human population encroaches so does their trash and the raccoon who feeds upon it. However, the raccoon is also the greatest enemy of the loon, its nest, and especially its eggs. Increased boat traffic and acid rain also magnify the problem.

But the Common Loon has many friends. The DNR, along with universities and private groups have dedicated themselves to saving this species and the necessary habitat needed for its insurance. This summer, while hiking around a northern Michigan lake, I had an opportu-

nity to stumble on a loon's nest. Both the male and the female created a water-splashing display intent on driving me away.

While the show was enjoyable, I felt very guilty for it threatened too many times the adult birds will vacate the nesting site and, in many cases, the lake itself. I quickly retreated and viewed the birds from a safe distance with the aid of binoculars. This lake was within easy driving distance from my home and a perfect spot to camp for the night and enjoy Michigan's "Call of the Wild".....

## Outdoor Report

2/5/92

Ice fishing success was scattered during the past weekend. Loads of anglers dotted the frozen Bay from Thomas's to Caseville. Reports indicated that fish were generally small and activity light. However, some mild hot spots occurred near Fish Point with both perch and walleyes being landed. Several fishermen reported great results off Rose Island and others hit some nice perch between the south shore of Sand Point and North Island. Ice was generally safe in most regions of the Bay.

Some new legislation recently approved by a House committee would require hunters to remove the carcasses of animals they kill during any hunting season. The proposed law will put to an end the practice of hunting for heads or fur. The bill will now go to the full house. If the bill is passed, Michigan would join Alaska, Colorado, Oklahoma, and Wyoming as states who have similar laws.

Recent surveys released by the DNR indicate that Michigan's moose herd is doing very well. If you remember, between 1985 and 1987, 59 moose were captured in Ontario and turned free in the Marquette region of Michigan's Upper Peninsula. Constant contact with the animals through various means, including radio collars attached to the animals, has provided data which estimates the herd to be near 350. The DNR would like to have 1,000 moose in the Upper Peninsula by the year 2000.

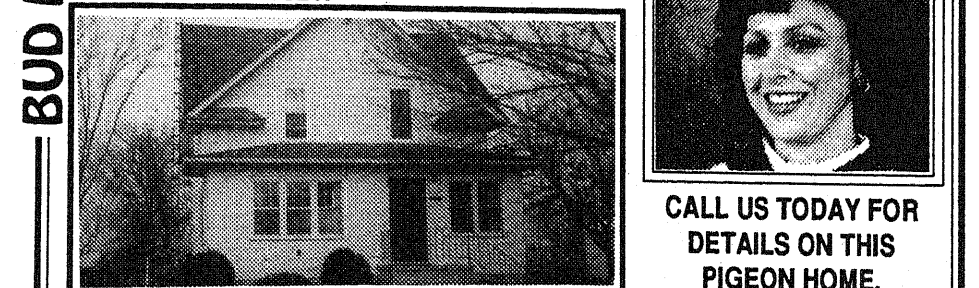

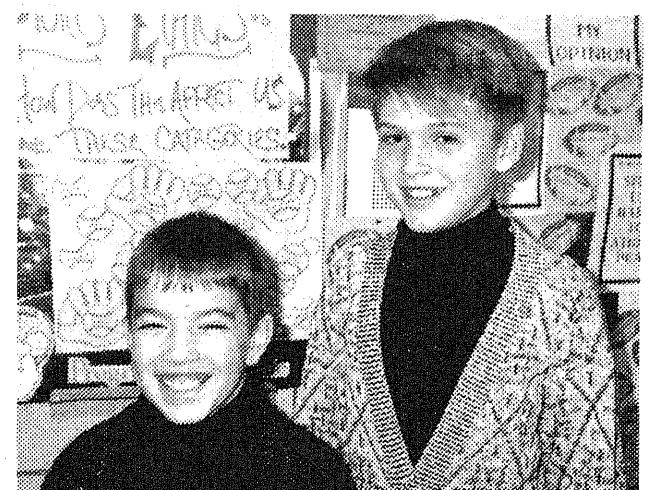
