On Jan. 26, 1992, the Michigan Historical Museum in Lansing celebrated Michigan's 155 years as a state.

Two record-size smelt were caught in Michigan during the month of March. The first, an 11-1/2 inch fish was taken from Lake Michigan and two days later, an 11.8-inch smelt was landed in Keweenaw Bay in Baraga County.

This ordinance shall be known and cited as the "Winsor Township Pension Plan Ordinance."

SECTION 2:

Pursuant to Public Act // of 1989, as amended, the Township of Winsor hereby creates and establishes an annuity pension plan and program for the pensioning of its officers and employees, and for such purposes, also hereby authorizes the township supervisor and the township clerk to contract, in the name of the township board, with any company authorized to transact such business within the State of Michigan for annuities or pensions.

SECTION 3:

The annuity or pension plans created, established and contracted for under this ordinance shall cover each person within the following classes of offices and employees

- (X) All members of the township board
- (X) All township fire chiefs
- (X) All township maintenance personne (X) All township assessors.

SECTION 5:

Each person so covered under the annuity or pension plan shall have a vested right or interest in such plan immediately from the date the plan becomes effective for such person.

The Township of Winsor hereby ratifies and confirms the validity or pension plan in existence with Manufacturers Life Insurance Co. since June 1, 1970.


