Si Quaerius Peninsulam
Arnoenam Circumspice

On Jan. 26, 1992, the Michigan Historical Museum in Lansing celebrated Michigan's 155 years as a state.

After a long, and sometimes stormy struggle, during which three foreign flags flew over the territory, the beautiful peninsula we call our home took its place as a part of the United States of America.

Now that spring has finally sprung and the winter cobwebs are brushed away, thousands of "Michigan-drunk" will hop in their cars, trucks, vans, motorhomes, motorcycles, bikes, boats or hiking boots to travel around the countryside in search of beautiful places to see.

But, as the title of this article implies (I'm sure you Latin buffs have already figured it out), you may not have to travel far.

Michigan may be the best place for this year's vacation. Why? First, because it's close, and second, because it has it all.

Its borders are four of the five Great Lakes giving it over 3,000 miles of shoreline, and the lakes themselves hold 1/5 of the world's fresh water supply. There are 33,000 miles of streams, nearly 11,000 lakes, great expressways to get you there, and thousands of campgrounds so you can stay for awhile.

Our state is a geologic phenomenon. Buried by ancient seas, it is made up of "saucer stacked" layers of sedimentary rocks, which outcrop near Bay Port, Alabaster, Alpena and Rogers City and sink thousands of feet under the glacial till near Mt. Pleasant.

In the Upper Peninsula the remnants of the Laurentian Mountains, reduced in size by eons of erosion and the grinding forces of the glaciers, stand as sentinels to the hardness of both the land and the people who inhabit it.

The rich farmlands of the south give way to the pine studded sandy soil of the north and finally to the rocky outcrops of the U.P. Each region has a uniqueness which causes its natives to defend it to the hilt, and this uniqueness makes each a nice place to visit.

So, where do you go? And what do you do when you get there?

If it's wilderness you like, head for the Porcupine Mountains in Ontonagon County. There you will find the best backpacking in Michigan, even if you're a little timid to stray to far, don't miss viewing the Lake of the Clouds from the escarpment trail. It's just a short hike from the parking lot.

If the groomed trails turn you off, check out the Sylvania or McCormick tracts. These are hiking regions for only the most hardy.

If wilderness isn't your bag, the western side of the state has Sleeping Bear Dunes National Shoreline. Miles upon miles of pristine shoreline awaits your footprints. Excessive use has already begun to deteriorate the fragile conditions. Stay in one of the many parks nearby, or if you like a little pampering head south to Frankfort and treat the lady to a romantic evening at the historic Victorian Frankfort Hotel.

If you like canoeing, try the AuSable, Manistee, Pine, Pere Marquette or the Muskegon. There are plenty of other rivers, but these are big, fast and have ample liveries to meet your needs.

Own a big boat? Take a cruise to the North Channel. You are able to boat camp in many secluded bays and never see another person.

If crowds are to your choosing, head over to Beaver Island, or just make the rounds from port to port.

Lots of activities abound in Thunder Bay, The Straits of Mackinac, Little Traverse Bay or Grand Traverse Bay.

If you don't own a boat, you can rent a dory, or pick up passage on a three-masted schooner.

May is the start of the vacation season. Why don't you get a little jump on the rest of the crowd and head out next weekend?

Don't know where to go? Explore a little. Sometimes, the spot just around the bend in the road is the most perfect of all.

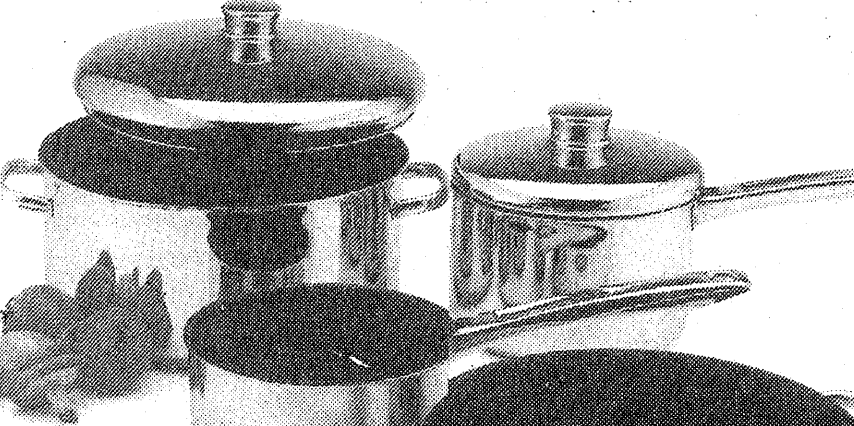

Hagen announces candidacy

Leslie A. Hagen has announced she will seek reelection for the office of Huron County Prosecuting Attorney.

Hagen, 28, has served as Prosecutor since Jan. 1, 1991. She previously served as a Midland County Assistant Prosecuting Attorney and has also been employed with the Michigan State Court of Appeals in Lansing.

"The focus of the prosecutor's office should be directed at reducing the level of crime in the community. Our ability to attract business and keep our families safe is at stake. In that regard, the Prosecutor must be a leader in the fight against crime," said Hagen.

"I am proud of the productive working relationship my office has enjoyed with local law enforcement." In 1991, the prosecutor's office handled 922 criminal cases compared to 726 cases in the year 1990. In addition, there were 110 juvenile petitions filed in 1991.

Hagen has also concentrated on youth and education during her tenure in office.

"I have participated in drug and alcohol awareness programs in all of the county's public school systems. Also, I have been a part of many special school projects and student enrichment programs."

Hagen was recognized by the State Bar of Michigan as the 1991 Outstanding Young Lawyer. She also won the District 11 Business and Professional Women's Young Careerist Award in 1991.

In addition to her duties as Prosecutor, Hagen serves on the Board of Directors for the Port Austin Community Players, the Port Austin Reef Light Association, and Youth for Christ — North Huron Region. She is also active in the Bad Axe Rotary and the Business and Professional Women's Club.

Hagen is a member of the National District Attorney's Association, the Prosecuting Attorney's Association of Michigan and the Huron County Child Abuse and Neglect Council.

A life-long resident of Huron County, Hagen is a graduate of Ubyly High School and Alma College. She earned her Juris Doctorate from Valparaiso University School of Law.

Hagen will seek the Republican nomination in the August Primary election.

WINSOR TOWNSHIP, MICHIGAN PENSION PLAN ORDINANCE

An ordinance to create and establish an annuity or pension plan for the officers and employees of Winsor Township and to authorize the township supervisor and the township clerk to contract, in the name of the township for such plan; to define those classes of officers and employees who shall be covered by such annuity or pension plan; to set forth the respective per centum shares which Winsor Township and the officers and employees shall contribute to the premium or charges arising under such annuity or pension contract and to further provide for the deduction of contributions from officers' and employees' compensation; to establish the time at which existing and future employees shall become eligible for such plan and to further establish the normal retirement date for all employees; to provide a method for non-coverage of an officer or employee of the annuity or pension plan; to set forth a date wherein each person covered under the annuity or pension plan shall have a vested right or interest in such plan; to ratify and confirm the validity of any annuity or pension plan in existence on the effective date of this ordinance; and to repeal all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith.

The Township of Winsor, Huron County, Michigan ordains:

SECTION 1:

This ordinance shall be known and cited as the "Winsor Township Pension Plan Ordinance."

SECTION 2:

Pursuant to Public Act 77 of 1989, as amended, the Township of Winsor hereby creates and establishes an annuity or pension plan and program for the pensioning of its officers and employees, and for such purposes, also hereby authorizes the township supervisor and the township clerk to contract, in the name of the township board, with any company authorized to transact such business within the State of Michigan for annuities or pensions.

SECTION 3:

The annuity or pension plans created, established and contracted for under this ordinance shall cover each person within the following classes of officers and employees:

- (X) All members of the township board
- (X) All township fire chiefs
- (X) All township maintenance personnel
- (X) All township assessors.

SECTION 5:

Each person so covered under the annuity or pension plan shall have a vested right or interest in such plan immediately from the date the plan becomes effective for such person.

SECTION 6:

The Township of Winsor hereby ratifies and confirms the validity or pension plan in existence with Manufacturers Life Insurance Co. since June 1, 1970.

SECTION 7:

This ordinance shall take effect on the date of its publication. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

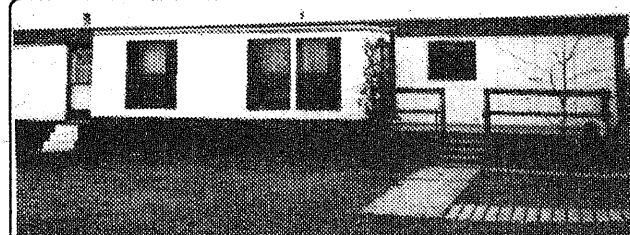
